

TRAVEL EXPERT TO SPEAK HERE AT LIONS CLUB

Ray W. Clark, manager of the Danmore hotel, in Portland, Oregon, and director of the Pacific Northwest Tourist association, who for many years has taken a very important part in the building up of the tourist travel to the Pacific northwest, will address the Lions club, Tuesday noon, at the Willard hotel, June 11.

Clark recently returned from a meeting of tour directors and newspapermen, held in Rapid City, S. D. A four-day session was held by the Black Hills association under the direction of Ray Bronson, manager of the Black Hills and Badlands association. At this meeting Clark secured facts and data pertaining to the 1940 tourist crop, which he will use as the topic for his talk.

Clark will explain the fact that the tourist dollar reaches every cash register in the city; he will also tell about the methods used by other states to lead and at the same time secure more of the tourist business; he will also mention some of the new "fly by night" advertising stunts which are being presented to business men in this section of Oregon. This is "See America and Travel America" year and the travel has just started for this year. Clark will also tell some of the plans being made for next year in connection with the tourist travel.

The trip made to Rapid City was a motor-log for the "Oregonian," using an official AAA car of the Oregon State Motor association, with the following men composing the party from Oregon: Charles Legler, president of the Oregon City chamber of commerce, Ralph Guyne, manager of the Oregon City chamber of commerce, Lee Bostwick, travel editor of the "Oregonian," and Ray Clark.

An invitation is extended by the Lions club to all businessmen of the community interested in the tourist trade.

At the luncheon of the club held Tuesday, June 4, S. P. Miller, commander of Post No. 8 of the American Legion, was the speaker and used the community service program of the Legion as the topic for his talk. He stressed the work done by the Legion for the youth of the nation, in connection with Boy Scouts, Sons of the American Legion, Junior Legion baseball, boy's state and oratorical and essay contests. The Labor Movement

MACHINERY FOR PEACE

The establishment of orderly and responsible relations between employers and employees is the first and primary task of industrial as well as political statesmanship. Enlightened public opinion has long recognized that before we can achieve and maintain industrial peace we must create conditions under which labor will be able to act and bargain collectively with dignity.

The building of this machinery is an urgent social responsibility of this generation. How can the workers win prestige and integrity if the very name "union" is made to mean something hateful and contrary to community interest? To the extent that there is stigma on labor organizations, it becomes the concern of all citizens to relieve honest workers from any unjust criticism and assist in lifting the organizations of workers to the dignity of business and professional groups. Their self organization is an urgent need for the social dignity and self respect of the American community of which they form a not inconsiderable part.

Organized labor maintains that it is manifestly unfair to brand all unionism as a lawless and morally indefensible trespass on the American way of doing things. Unions are no better and no worse than the men employed in industry. Unions, labor admits, are subject to criticism, but often enough stand in need of help quite as much as they need censor. In any event, unions are here to stay and with the protection now being given by the government of the United States in the safeguarding of the principle of collective bargaining, labor unions can be made into responsible social institutions.

Chicken Pie Big Favorite For Summer Outdoor Affair

Chicken goes to the country in summer, too. However, up in the mountains or along the shore, you may be feeling lazy. So use quick-frozen poultry to save time of plucking and cleaning.

Chicken pie tastes good in the country air, especially with cheese biscuit circles on top. Use a quick-frozen fricassee chicken (or a fresh killed fowl, if you prefer) for this meal in a dish.

Chicken Pie With Cheese Circles

One fowl (4 pounds) cut in pieces, 4 cups boiling water, 1 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons chicken fat, 4 tablespoons flour, 3 cups chicken broth, pepper.

Place chicken in kettle, add boiling water to half cover, add salt, simmer for 2 to 3 hours or until tender. Remove from heat and when cool remove chicken from broth and separate meat from bones.

Skim off chicken fat and place in refrigerator to chill. Mix chicken fat and flour to a smooth paste in a saucepan. Place over heat, add broth gradually, stirring constantly, and cook until thickened. Season and add pieces of chicken. Pour into baking dish. Place cheese circles on top of hot chicken mixture; bake in a very hot oven (450 degrees F.) for 20 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

Cheese Circles
One and one-half cups sifted flour, 3 teaspoons powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons shortening, or chicken fat, 1 cup milk, 1-3 cup grated American cheese.

Sift together flour, phosphate baking powder and salt; cut in chicken fat or shortening with two knives or pastry blender. Add milk, stirring until a soft, but not sticky dough is formed. Place dough on floured board, pat out to 1/4-inch thickness and cut into rings with doughnut cutter, or form into 2-inch rounds. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake as directed.

For fried chicken, try a garnish of fruit brushed with melted butter and broiled until lightly browned. Use well-drained spoon-size cubes of canned pineapple and canned apricots alternated on wooden skewers interspersed with halved maraschino cherries for added color.

Place three cubes of pineapple and two apricot halves on each skewer. Brush with melted butter and broil on each side until lightly browned. Serve at once while piping hot. This is an easy trick and gives the summer meal added filip.

Passing Through

Klamath visitors.

THE "worst six miles of road in the state" was negotiated by State Treasurer Walter Pearson and L. D. Griffith, clerk of the state land board, when en route to Klamath Falls through the remote areas of the Cascade range Wednesday.

The state officials ran into this bit of bad road somewhere in the hills east of Eagle Point. Low gear was used for most of the driving on the stretch of rocks, ruts, mudholes and what-not.

Treasurer Pearson has made three trips to Klamath Falls, looking over property on which it has been proposed the state land board lend money. He said the board has established sound practices of careful appraisals before money is lent.

Treasurer Pearson has the distinction of being one office holder who isn't seeking reelection. Appointed by Governor Martin, he decided not to run for reelection, but instead ran in the last primary for democratic nomination for state senator from Multnomah county. He was nominated and will be on the ballot in the fall.

Bull-voiced William Dalrymple, regional director for the CIO, knows first-hand the history of the labor movement in the United States. Called here by the current Klamath basin labor flareup, Dalrymple traced the growth of the organization at a meeting of laborers Wednesday night at the IWA hall.

Chatting informally in his rooms at the Hotel Elk, Dalrymple recalled that he joined the labor movement before the turn of the century, joining the mine workers' association in the middle west.

"One strike I worked through lasted four and a half years without a break," he declared. Dalrymple, who left Wednesday night for Portland, became well known on the Klamath basin labor front when his thunderous voice highlighted several sessions at the recent IWA convention at the army.

WAR WON'T ALTER REALTY, CLAIM

PORTLAND, June 7 (UP)—The war will have little effect upon real estate values in America, David B. Simpson, northwest vice president of the National association of Real Estate board said today.

Simpson said the supply of real estate remains constant and is not affected by foreign wars. He predicted use of industrial

and commercial buildings would expand because of the American defense program and that new industrial buildings would be constructed.

He told the opening session of the annual convention of northwest realtors that business has been carried on as usual since the war began. He forecast a world trade war following the present European conflict, regardless of who won.

Simpson said greater employment inspired by the defense program would increase the housing demand.
