Soy Bean Culture, Seed Discussed at Grange Meet

Improved pastures and forage crops, as well as weed control, were the main subjects of discussion at the monthly meeting of the grange agricultural committees Monday night, with 10 committee members being present.

A discussion of soy bean culture indicated that as yet it is doubtful whether any varieties are adapted to conditions of the Klamath basin or would prove equal to present crops grown here. Samples of hardy varieties have been secured and distributed by the county agent's office for trials.

Rotation grazing produces more feed than do single pastures. Under rotation grazing, some pastures are allowed to get a good start before being pastured. Increased returns are from 30 to 50 percent by this method. It was shown that grass and alfalfa mixtures at the Washington station gave good hay crops and that smooth brome and crested wheat grasses outlasted all other grasses under dry land conditions in the Palouse country. Ladak alfalfa was recommended for all dry lands of that area, which would probably apply equally in Klamath county.

It was pointed out that there was good demand for clean brome grass seed and growers might well attempt increased production of this crop. This is considered the best grass for the middle west and all seed houses are anxiously trying to locate good sources of seed. Prices are usually high.

Discussion brought out that spoiled sweet clover hay is deadly to livestock and should never be fed, as it contains some poisoning material not yet thoroughly understood. Experiments at

the Union Experiment station indicated that rye grain when fed with wheat, half and half, gave excellent results in fattening cattle. Better gains were secured with higher dressing percentage and the steers in lots fed in this manner topped the market.

It was pointed out that good results are now being secured by many Klamath county farmers in their weed control efforts and that summer fallow and various chemical treatments give good results when properly handled.

The meeting adjourned to meet the first of July in the civil service room, Federal building, at 8:00 p. m.
