The Dorris-Klamath Lumberjacks will face an invading Mt. Shasta baseball nine Sunday on the Dorris diamond in a game promising the toughest competition for the locals in the Northern California league to date.

Topping the list with five straight wins, the Mt. Shastans will bring some of the best ball-players in the circuit to Red Tolbert's gardens. The result, Klamath railbirds predict, will probably depend largely on the arm of Clyde Carlstrom, who is booked as probable starter on the mound for the Jacks. On the bench, ineligible this game but ready for action the week following, will be Jack Shaw, from the pitching staff of the University of Portland, who has just been signed by Tolbert. Fryer will work behind the plate, Duracha at first, Brooks at second, Goldbar at short, Jack Lloyd at third and Bernadou, Elystone and Roy Wheeler in the outfield.

\$25,000 Posted For Conn Fight

SEATTLE, June 8 (UP) — Boxing Promoter Nate Druzman, long at odds with his New York contemporary, Mike Jacobs, announced he had offered a \$25,000 guarantee to Light Heavyweight Champion Billy Conn for a title defense against Al Hostak of Seattle.

Hostak is recognized as middleweight titleholder by the National Boxing association, authoritative in 46 states. Druzman's offer followed a breakdown of negotiations to clear up the middleweight muddle by matching Hostak with the holder of the crown in New York and California — first Cefirino Garcia and then Ken Overlin.

Druzman said the bout, if Conn accepted, would be fought in Seattle "within the next 30 or 40 days."

LITTLE FIRES 69 TO BALANCE SNEAD, SMITH

CANTERBURY GOLF CLUB, CLEVELAND, June 8 (UP) —

Playing the finest golf he has shown since he was the scourge of the amateurs on both sides of the Atlantic, Lawson Little fired a sub-par 69 Friday to go into a tie with Sammy Snead and Horton Smith for the halfway lead in the national championship with an aggregate of 141.

Little's three-under-par performance enabled him to pick up five strokes on Snead, who soared from his record 67 of the opening day, to a 74, and three shots on Smith, who followed his 69 of yesterday with a par 72. Both Sammy and Horton missed chances to lead the field by butchering the par three 17th hole. Snead took a five on this treacherous one-shotter and Horton, greatest putter in the game, missed a one-foot putt and took a four.

Little was one of two men able to break 70 today. The other was big Frank Walsh, and his round, which was featured by magnificent iron play, placed him just a stroke back of the leaders with a 36 hole total of 142.

Close behind the leading threesome, and in position to strike in the run down the payoff stretch of 36 holes tomorrow were 18 dangerous sharpshooters. Walsh was one of them and none was more than five strokes off the pace. In at 143 were Benny Hogan, the pre-tournament betting favorite, and Sam Parks, 1935 winner and a completely rejuvenated golfer.

Bracketed at 144, and ready to take advantage of any show of last round jitters by the leaders, were such shot makers as Ralph Guldahl, twice a champion; Leonard Dodson, a gambling fool; Dutch Harrison, the Arkansas traveler, and Vic Ghezzi.

The 145 group listed such stout finishers as Gene Sarazen, Craig Wood and Lloyd Mangrum, and a shot back of them were Henry Picard, the defending champion Byron Nelson, Jug McSpaden and Ed Oliver.

Skippers Set For Regatta

CHAMPS WILL COMPETE IN MOTOR RACES

Entrant blanks for the outboard races in Sunday's regatta are filled with names of some of the coast's most outstanding pilots.

Holders of coast, national and world records will compete in the many events listed to get underway on the Upper Klamath lake course at 12:45 p. m. Sunday.

Two new drivers from Portland were signed Saturday as entrants began arriving at Klamath Falls from all parts of the Pacific coast. They are Jack Offelt, "M" hydro and "C" service runabout, and Warren Nash, "M" hydro.

Another noted driver entering his first Klamath regatta this year is Bill Tinney of Bend, who held the national "A" hydroplane championship in 1938.

Harold Ashley of Marysville, Calif., holder of all-world's records for straightaway and circle courses and present "C" service hydro national champ, will be among the favored competitors.

Ward Angilly of Marysville, who holds practically all Pacific coast records for "C" racing runabouts and "C" hydros, will be here with his famous set of "Sweetheart" boats.

An unusually large list of local drivers will be in the races this year, headed by Joe Roads, who will enter all "C" class races. He won the Pacific northwest championship last year at Anacortes, Wash.

Don Stansil, the nation's No. 3 driver in the "F" runabout professional class, will be on hand. He also ranks as the Pacific coast's second best driver in the "F" hydro class, winning this honor at Lakeport, Calif.

Red Melhorn, Cliff Hogue and Sid Peterson will all enter the "C" service hydro race, and Heinie Fluhrer will compete in the "C" hydro, "C" runabout, "F" hydro and "F" runabout events.

Negro Hangs Up New World Mark

COMPTON, Calif., June 8 (UP) — Long John Woodruff, powerful Pittsburgh negro, established a new world's record of 1 minute 48.6 seconds tonight in capturing the special Compton invitational 800-meter run and Hal Davis, Salinas junior college sprinter, tied the American mark in the 200-meter dash in defeating Stanford's Clyde Jeffrey.

Woodruff, who flew from Pittsburgh to compete in the special event, turned back the pride of the west, Paul Moore of Stanford, by a full eight yards. Ruble of the San Francisco Olympic club was third and Smith of the USC frosh was fourth.

Woodruff's time was a full second under the standard established in 1937 by Elroy Robinson of the Olympic club.

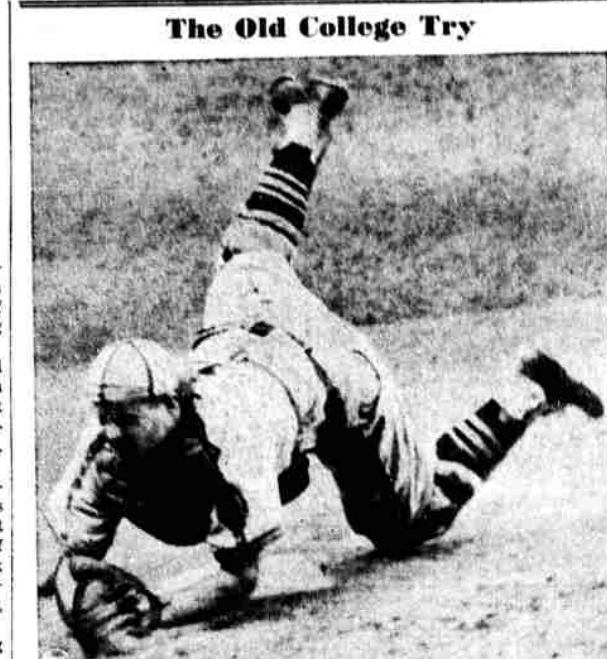

Pelican Bay Softballers Groomed for Loop Opener

Pelican Bay Lumber company, one of the seven new softball teams entered in the Klamath Softball association's 16-club 1940 circuit, stands ready for the opening contests of the summer's program tentatively set for Monday night, June 17.

According to Manager Walter Buchanan the Lumbermen are rounding into shape nicely, and if his boys hold up fairly well under fire he expects the team to win its share of games. A number of practice sessions during the last month has furnished Buchanan with ample material and he believes that he has at last decided on his starting lineup.

Ira Zirkle, second base, Marvin White, third base, and Ralph Ramos, pitcher, will form the nucleus of the Pelican nine. All three have had several seasons of play in the local softball league. Zirkle alternated at second base and centerfield for the Kesterson club the last two seasons. White put in a season at third base for the Knights of Columbus two years ago and Ramos has been hurling for a number of different teams, pitching for the Klamath Billiards in 1937 and for Lowell's in 1938 and 1939. In 1937 and 1938 he helped his team to the Klamath city championship.

Kenneth Paulding, former Timber league star from Raymond, Wash., has clinched the first base job, according to Manager Buchanan. A switch hitter who can play shortstop, Paulding is slated for an important place in the batting order because of his hitting strength. Zirkle at second base and Frank Weber at shortstop will form the keystone combination with White rounding out the inner defense at the hot corner.

Bob Anacker, ex-KUHS football star, and the Harper brothers, Jim and Paul, are billed for first line duty in the outfield. All three are seasoned hardball players, having played on various bush league clubs for a number of summers. Anacker and Jim Harper bat from the left side of the plate, and together with Paulding and M. R. Smith, utility man, who also is southpaw hitters, form a strong batting order against right-handed pitching.

Catching for the Pelican squad will be handled by Joe Weber, brother of the shortstop. Ramos will be relieved on the mound when necessary by Fern Bellotti, a promising hurler. Fred Ross, a southpaw first baseman, "Pete" Petersen, also a guardian of the initial sack, and Joe Bellotti, outfield reserve, give Manager Buchanan ample replacement material.

Buchanan announced Saturday that he is trying to secure the services of Nello Giovannini, former University of Oregon football great, to play the shortstop position on his team. With Nello in at this important position the Lumbermen will have a stronger infield both afield and at the platter.

The Pelican Bay club will be dressed up in new red and white uniforms for their season's opener. Buchanan stated. Players will wear red trousers with a white stripe down the side. Shirts are red, too, while caps are white.

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CARDS FIRE MANAGER AS DODGERS GAIN

Ray Blades is out and the Brooklyn Dodgers are in. The responsibility for the major leagues' first managerial crackup of 1940 should be spread in a lot of directions, but the Dodgers will have to shoulder their share of the blame, because they are doing everything the St. Louis Cardinals were supposed to do this season.

It was more than a coincidence that Friday as the Cards fired Blades and hired Billy Southworth, the Dodgers drove back into first place in the National league with a 4-2 eleven-inning conquest of the Cincinnati Reds.

Brooklyn gave a stirring show at Cincinnati, winning on a two-run homer by Dolph Camilli in the eleventh and stopping Hucky Walters' undefeated streak at nine games.

The Cardinals, under the temporary handling of Coach Mike Gonzalez, squeezed past the New York Giants 3-2, with the help of five double plays, and advanced into fifth place.

Another swap in positions in Friday's general upheaval in the National league saw Pittsburgh finally get out of the cellar and the Boston Bees drop in. The Pirates pounded out 18 hits to crush the Phillies 10-4. The Chicago Cubs beat the Bees 5-3 with Bill Nicholson hitting his third homer in two days.

The New York Yankees handed Cleveland and Bob Feller a 5-4 beating, bunching four singles for two runs in the ninth.

Cleveland's setback preserved the Boston Red Sox' half game lead in the American league although Hal Newhouser baffled the Boston with seven-hit pitching that enabled Detroit to win 7-1.

Washington edged out the Chicago White Sox 3-2 and squeezed past the same club in fifth place in the standings.

Rookie Al Brancato took care of the Philadelphia Athletics, beating the St. Louis Browns 3-2 by driving in all the A's runs on a triple, a double and a single.
