

Club Given Charter at Impressive Ceremony

Venturists Form Newest Service Organization of Klamath Falls; Mrs. O'Neill Speaks

Marching under a large trellis, beautifully entwined with green bows and blue flowers, charter members of the Venture club of Klamath Falls, entered the large banquet room of the Willard hotel, Saturday night, June the first, to soft strains of music played by Mrs. George W. McIntyre.

The occasion was the banquet and installation given the new club by the Soroptimist club of Klamath Falls, under whose sponsorship the new service club was formed. About seventy Soroptimists, Venturists, and guests gathered around the tables. Between the sides of the hollow square formed by the tables the Venturists were seated at a table forming a large V. Each Venture girl carried an old-fashioned nosegay, which, when she reached her place, was laid in a receptacle in front of her, forming part of the table decorations.

The decorative motif was carried out in the colors of the new club, blue and white, the committee having used the native wild flower for the blue motif attractively arranged at intervals along the long tables which were lighted with tall blue candles.

At the head table, a lovely white ship, "The Venture," laden with blue flowers, formed the centerpiece. This was hand-made, even to the miniature cables, the work of Mrs. Sylvia McClelland. The trellis was the handiwork of a public spirited citizen, who, interested in the new service club, contributed this. Flowers banking the stage were from the gardens of Mrs. Rose Poole and other members.

The impressive installation was a candle ceremony conducted by Frances Finical, northwestern regional director from Seattle, assisted by Mary Jayne Helfrich and Catherine Masten of the Portland Venture club. The theme of the ceremony was passing on the light of service by the club to the community, the candle of the first Venture girl being lighted from the flame of Miss Finical's candle, and each Venture girl in turn passing on the light to the next member.

Following installation of the charter members came the installation of officers of the new group, after which the presentation of letters, telegrams of congratulations, and gifts was made by the toastmistress, Mrs. Frank Howard, assisted by Lola Marie Whisenant, acting as page. The gifts were received by the Venture club president, Miss Dorothy O'Sullivan, with a gracious speech of acknowledgment.

Among the gifts was a lovely guest book from the Portland Venture club, a book on parliamentary rules, from Mrs. Mary Catherine Lewis, Venture club president of the American Federation, a supply of club stationery from Mrs. Charles Whisenant, counsellor of the new group, and a beautifully bound clipping book showing a venture ship on a blue ocean, from Mrs. Lois Biell Sandall, regional director of Soroptimist clubs. Other gifts consisted of a loose leaf minute book, and an American flag from the Klamath Falls Soroptimist club.

O'Neill, who gave an impressive talk entitled "Woodrow Wilson" in which she tied up the eventful days of the former President Wilson with conditions today. In her own inimitable way Mrs. O'Neill drove home grave truths, softened by her whimsical comments.
