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LIBRARY WOMEN SPONSOR KNITTING

MERRILL — Mrs. Howard Boyd, Klamath county Red Cross official present for the meeting of the Merrill Library club Thursday, urged assistance of local women in preparing garments, both knitted and sewn to be sent to refugees of war stricken Europe. As a result of her address members of the club will organize classes for future work.

Mrs. E. Trotman, chairman for Merrill, with Mrs. E. E. Kilpatrick will co-operate with Mrs. Maud Heaton, president of the club in getting the work under way in the immediate future.

Mrs. Boyd stated that hospital bed sheets, convalescent robes, men's bed gowns, children's and women's dresses and layettes are needed as well as men's socks, children's stockings, sweaters and shawls in the knitted garments.

The first shipment of wearing apparel sent from the United States has reached Finland where it was gratefully accepted. Another shipment is to be ready by September 1. One full boatload of Red Cross offerings, including also hospital supplies and numerous other small shipments have already been sent abroad.

Mrs. Heaton appointed Mrs. O. V. Reeves, Mrs. R. L. Dalton and Mrs. E. E. Kilpatrick to serve as a committee to check on wiring in the new clubhouse, nearing completion.

Women's Wish Materializes As Bieber Starts Park Work

BIEBER, Calif.—At the last "ladies' night" of the Bieber chamber of commerce, the women present were invited to speak their minds. Mrs. Gwen Klein said she wished that Bieber had a park. Subsequent speakers echoed her wish.

Now the park is materializing. Ten acres of public ground in the east end of town belonging to Lassen county is being fenced to steel posts and woven wire. Holes have been dug and the hard subsoil loosened with dynamite shots for the planting of a border of eighty young elm and ash trees, which are on hand.

Connection has been made with the waterworks district mains. It is planned to plant half the fenced tract with grass, trees, flowers and shrubs and develop

the other half as sports field and playground.

SEATTLE BRIDGE OPENS NEXT MONTH SEATTLE, June 10 (AP)—The longest floating bridge in the world, and the first to be built of reinforced concrete, will be opened to traffic early next month.

The span, 6561 feet long, crosses 20-mile-long Lake Washington, Seattle's "back-yard," which has been a natural barrier to a direct route to the interior.

The graceful structure, lying flat on the water, brings the vast hinterland of eastern Washington, with its huge stores of fruit, grain, minerals and timber 14 miles nearer to Washington's largest seaport.

WASHINGTON, June 10 (UP) Miss Harriet Elliott, consumers representative on the president's national defense commission, has promised American housewives that they would not be plagued by the high cost of living, the bugaboo of world war days.

Preliminary steps toward such "household-kitchen defense" were taken Saturday, she said, in a meeting with government officials. They decided that the country's existing standard of living must be maintained and even improved to keep the nation physically fit to cope with preparedness burdens.

Mr. Roosevelt has assigned Miss Elliott the task of watching price trends in consumer goods; protecting standards of living and being prepared with a program should prices of consumers goods tend to skyrocket.

ALLIED NAVAL STRENGTH GREATER THAN AT WAR START

LONDON, June 9 (AP)—An official source stated Saturday that "the balance of naval strength in favor of the allies is now far greater than at the outbreak of war."

The statement said: "Since the beginning of the war in addition to reinforcements of warships in all classes except battleships the navy has been strengthened by more than 50 armed merchant cruisers and more than 1500 minor war vessels and auxiliary craft of which 88 have been lost."

"The French navy is a very powerful and rapidly growing force. The allied fleets have been reinforced by active cooperation of Polish, Norwegian and Dutch naval forces."

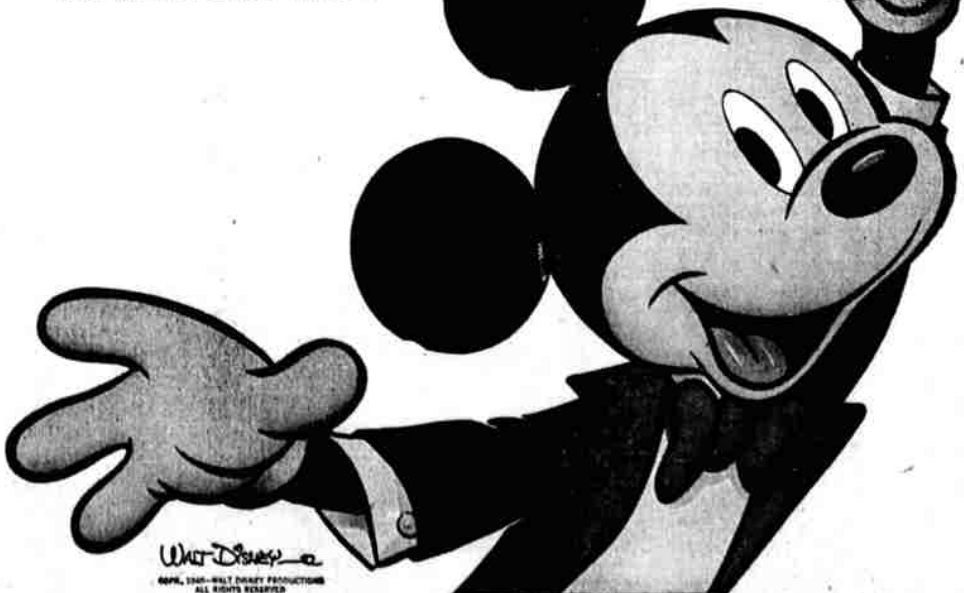
