

IL DUCE SENDS TROOPS ACROSS FRENCH BORDER

Assistant axis between Berlin and Rome.

It came as Adolf Hitler's Nazi forces were closing in on France and gravely imperiling Paris itself.

Before making his definite announcement of war on the allies, Mussolini called upon "combatants on land, sea and in the air, blackshirts of the revolution and of the legion, men and women of Italy, of the empire and the kingdom of Albania"—to listen.

He said Italy had tried in vain for peace.

After every sentence, the gesticulating premier was cheered by demonstrators who long have asked for war and have menaced allied nationals lingering on in Rome in the face of certain war.

He declared that "the allies should have accepted the proposals of Hitler before the Polish campaign" which began the war last Sept. 1, two days before the actual declaration of open hostilities by the allies.

"A great people is ready to face its destiny and mark its own history in the future," the premier said.

"We want to break the chains that suffocate us in the Mediterranean."

"This gigantic struggle is only a phase in the development of our revolution," he said.

"Century vs. Century"

"This asserts itself against the struggles—the rich nations."

"It is a struggle between young and progressive people as against the decadent people, the struggle of one century as against another century."

"The dies are now cast."

Mussolini's voice rose at times to the breaking point as he drove his points home.

"In a memorable meeting at Milan I declared that friends will always help each other," he said, apparently referring to the Rome-Berlin axis.

His words evoked fresh explosive cries.

"In this great historic event, we turn our thoughts to the king-emperor."

Soul Mates

Again there was a long interruption as the masses roared.

"The king of Italy has always interpreted the soul of Italy as wanting to join her soul with that of Germany," he said.

"Totalitarian and fascist history for the third time is on its feet again ready to strike."

"We will give a new era of peace to Italy to Europe and to the world."

"People of Italy run to your arms!"

Fresh waves of applause swept the piazza.

"Take up your cause, all your valor!"

Mussolini spoke for about 14 minutes.

For long after he spoke the crowd continued to roar.

cept those offered by the ways and means committee.

House consideration, scheduled to start tomorrow, is expected to require one to two days.

The effect of the procedure is to expedite the bill's expected passage and to prevent any major reduction in any of the various tax increases proposed.

WASHINGTON, June 10 (P)

The house military committee approved legislation today increasing the authorized strength of the regular army from 280,000 to 400,000.

The measure also would permit the president to call out the national guard, during the recess of congress, for "use or training" within the United States or its possessions.

Before voting, 18 to 8, to approve the national guard permit, the committee defeated, 14 to 10, an amendment which would have permitted use of the guard anywhere within the western hemisphere.

Americans for effort, courage, sacrifice and devotion.

Mr. Roosevelt brushed aside the secrecy surrounding his communications with Premier Mussolini of Italy to relate how the government had tried to avert Italy away from war.

He said he had proposed that if Italy would refrain from going to war, he would be willing to ask assurances from "the other powers concerned" that they would execute faithfully any agreement made to effect readjustments desired by Italy.

"Unfortunately," he asserted, "the chief of the Italian government was unwilling to accept the procedure suggested."

Liberal Economics

The president said, too, that he had expressed his administration's willingness to try to cooperate with the Italian government when the appropriate occasion arose for creation of "a more stable world order through the reduction of armaments, and through the construction of a more liberal international economic system."

But by choosing to preserve what it terms its "freedom of action" and to fulfill what it states are its promises to Germany, Mr. Roosevelt said, Italy had "manifested disregard for the rights and security of other nations, for the lives of the peoples of those nations which are directly threatened by this spread of the war" and had evidenced an unwillingness to attempt to achieve its aspirations by peaceful means.

ed briefly by the Moscow radio tonight without comment. Official circles were silent on Italy's action.

ISTANBUL, Turkey, June 10 (P)—The Turkish government tonight prepared to declare a state of alert, placing the nation virtually on a wartime basis, as official quarters reported the government determined to fulfill mutual assistance pacts with the allies.

OTTAWA, June 10 (P)—Canada's house of commons tonight voted approval of a Canadian declaration of war against Italy.

LJUBLJANA, Yugoslavia, June 10 (P)—Despite Premier Mussolini's declaration that Italy would not molest neutral neighbors, the Yugoslav government tonight called up technical troops in large numbers and ordered further fortifications work immediately on both the Italian and the German frontiers.

BELGRADE, June 10 (P)—"If Yugoslavia's frontiers are violated, Russian intervention is expected on our behalf," sources close to the Yugoslav government said tonight.

BUCHAREST, June 10 (P)—The crown council of Rumania was called into session for tomorrow at which it was expected a reaffirmation of the country's neutrality will be proclaimed in the war now spread to the Mediterranean. Rumania's strengthened her defense forces on the Yugoslav and Russian frontiers immediately.

Three other men were also killed.

GERMANS PRESSING ON WESTERN FRONT

(Continued from Page One)

at the defenses guarding the city from the north.

"From the sea to the Argonne the battle continues more and more violently," said the high command's morning communiqué while more than 100 German divisions, some 1,800,000 men, tried to wrest victory from the stubborn poilus.

At one place they had driven an armored wedge into the lines within 35 miles of Paris.

The French were resisting powerfully all along the front as the battle went through its sixth day.

In the titanic struggle to save their homeland against the biggest German offensive of the war, the French had dropped back yesterday to a main line along the heavily wooded Bresle river, which empties into the sea at Eu—A line extending through the Oise valley to the Marne plains south of the Aisne.

Today the center of the Weygand line was still falling back to meet the threat to its left flank from the mighty German tank column which broke through to the Seine.

But the right flank was reported striking back around the Argonne.

The Germans were using not only masses of infantry and their force of armored vehicles, but were drawing on their strength to the full with big guns and dive bombers and parachute troops trying to smash the French lines with all the ferocity and skill at their command.
