STOCKS FLURRY DOWN, UP AS ITALY ENTERS

NEW YORK, June 10 (AP)—An erratic stock market today greeted the announcement that Italy had taken the long-awaited plunge into the war on the side of Germany.

The list fell 1 to 4 points for leaders in the forenoon—a few inactives were off as much as 10 or 20—as bulletins told of Nazi gains in the drive on Paris, the capitulation of Norway and additional sinkings of British ships.

Part of the afternoon rally was attributed to the belief in Wall Street the market had pretty well discounted the latest Mediterranean development. Also the thought was present that home business was good and rapidly getting better.

Transfers for the five hours approximated 1,000,000 shares.

Prominent on the slide—some eventually cut reactions—were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Union Pacific, Allied Chemical, Westinghouse, Eastman Kodak, American Can, Douglas Aircraft, Du Pont, Dow Chemical and Western Union.

ITALIAN MOVE MIXES CHICAGO WHEAT PIT

CHICAGO, June 10 (AP)—The grain market was thrown into the war and prices shifted up and down rapidly.

Erratic even before the noon-time declaration by Mussolini, wheat prices afterward showed unusual nervousness, shooting up more than 4 cents above early lows or 3 cents or more above previous closing levels, only to back down again and close about a cent higher than Saturday.

Wheat closed 1-1/2 cents higher than Saturday, July 80-81c; September 81-1/2c; corn 1-1/2c higher, July 63c, September 61-1/2c; oats unchanged to 1/2c higher.

WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, June 10 (AP-USA)— Orders for substantial quantities of graded territory wools have been placed in the Boston market at advanced prices the bulk of the business was on one half and three eighths blood grades, although other grades received a fair demand. Combings, three eighths blood territory wools were sold at 77-80c, scoured basis. Graded half blood wools were sold at 86-88c, scoured basis for staple combing lengths, and at 83-85c, scoured basis, for French combing lengths.

MOUNT HOOD, June 10 (AP)— Skiers of the Cascade Ski club, Portland, took all first places in Sunday's Golden Rose downhill championships, final event of Portland's Rose Festival and closing winter sport tournament of the season for Mount Hood.

Olaf Rodegaard plunged down the course in 2 minutes, 48.4 seconds to win the men's race. Maryanne Hill took the women's race in 2 minutes, 48 seconds. Reese Stevenson annexed the junior title. His time was 2:05.2.

Portland Drops Series to Stars

Hollywood took both games from Portland yesterday, winning the first 3 to 2 and the second 8 to 2. A pitching duel between Hi Bithorn of Hollywood and Ray Harrell of Portland featured the first game.

In the seven-inning nightcap Hollywood registered six of its runs in a big second inning splurge to take the series six games out of seven.

Portland's opponents for this week, the Oakland A's, defeated Seattle four games to three and maintained their standing as the circuit's number two club. In Sunday's double-header Oakland won the first 4 to 1 and Seattle took the second, 2 to 1.

Henry Pippin, on the mound for Oakland in the opener, pitched his second victory of the week and held Seattle scoreless in every inning but the second.

Bill Walker, Seattle southpaw, turned the situation around in the abbreviated nightcap. He issued just four hits and allowed Oakland to score only in the second inning.

At Sacramento Los Angeles won 5 to 3 in the opener but the Solons came back for a 10 to
