Jean Fugate, pretty little 17-year-old horsewoman, is entry No. 1 as candidate for queen of Klamath Buckaroo Days, registering early Saturday morning.

Miss Fugate is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arden Fugate of Merrill and is sponsored by the Merrill Service club. She was born April 7, 1923, in Portland, and for the past three years has lived in the Merrill valley where she attends high school. Her horse, Kid, is being groomed for an excellent performance at the riding test show to be presented at the Klamath county fairgrounds Sunday afternoon, June 16, at 2 p. m. Fans who have followed the rodeo for the past few years will remember the excellent show of horsemanship shown by Miss Fugate in the 1938 tryouts.

Eileen Schneider, 18, member of a pioneer Bly family, is the Beauty-Bly entrant in the race for queen honors. Third entrant in the contest is little Nora Crume who will represent the Sprague river district. Miss Crume registered Monday afternoon.

Yet to be heard from are the Klamath Falls, Fort Klamath, Dorris, Tulake, Malin and Chiloquin districts. The public is invited to attend the riding tests Sunday. There will be no admission charge, and as usual a "little rodeo" will be presented by a group of local buckaroos who plan to enter the events during the coming four-day show, July 3, 4, 5 and 6.

RACING PIGEON LANDS ON SHIP 800 MILES OUT

PORTLAND, June 11 (AP)—Local bird fanciers said the Portland racing pigeon which alighted Sunday on the deck of the steamship Lurline 800 miles at sea off Los Angeles set an almost incredible record.

The bird was released Saturday at Sacramento, Calif., by Henry C. Yeager, Portland. Yeager, upon receipt of the wireless report from the Lurline, said the bird, which covered an estimated 1500 miles, probably had been caught by strong winds and drifted hundreds of miles from its course.

None of the other 12 birds released at the same time had reached Portland.

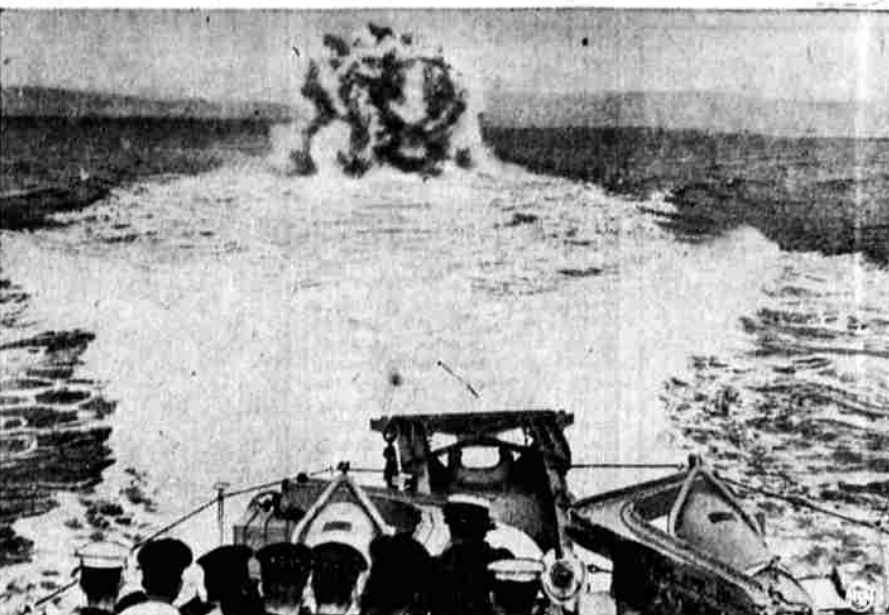

JOBS for JUNE GRADUATES

UNCLE SAM is America's largest employer. On his payroll are nearly a million American citizens.

About one-third of these are in the postal service. Nearly 90,000 work in the department of agriculture. Contrary to public belief, seven of every eight federal employees work outside of Washington, D. C.

Every year more than half a million persons file applications for civil service positions. Less than half of these pass the examinations. Many who fail to pass do so because of inadequate preparation.

In addition to clerical and trades examinations, the civil service commission holds many examinations for professional and scientific positions. These positions require the same kind of training and experience which thoughtful citizens demand of professional workers in private employment.

When you go to a private physician you want one who is competent to do a good job. That is what Uncle Sam expects of his employees.

About 40,000 persons receive federal appointments each year. The examination requirements are practical. They are also sufficiently high to obtain employees fully competent to render satisfactory service to the American people.

When a person is appointed to a federal position, there are a number of ways to get ahead. These are not particularly different from the requirements met by successful individuals in private life.

1. Do your present job well. Countless individuals in the federal service hold high administrative positions who not many years ago were pounding a typewriter or adding columns of figures. They did good work. Promotions followed. Today they reap the reward of doing their first job better than their competitors.

2. Prepare for the job ahead.

Some day, perhaps soon, the job ahead will be vacant. Then the boss will look around for someone to fill it. The position may require special knowledge; get this knowledge. It may require training in a business school or university; get it.

Find out what you need to fill the job ahead and prepare accordingly. Be ready when the opportunity comes.

3. Always be dependable. When Elbert Hubbard wrote "A Message to Garcia" he emphasized a daily need in every American office and home—dependability.

When you give your word, keep it. When you are assigned to a task, finish it in a satisfactory way. Get a reputation for being dependable and it will bring cash returns and satisfaction returns.

4. Safeguard your health. An employee who is constantly reporting sick is not much of a business asset. Modern competition requires the services of energetic employees capable of regularly doing a full day's work. This is possible only if an employee guards one of his most precious possessions—his health.

5. Get along with people. This is a social world. Most workers must mingle with other workers. There is a knack in dealing with others in a businesslike but friendly manner. The employee who can at all times get along with his associates has mastered one important element of success.

University of Oregon Confers Diplomas on 14 Klamath County Students

A record number of University of Oregon students, 771 in all, of whom 14 are from Klamath county, received diplomas and certificates at an impressive ceremony Sunday evening, when the institution held its 63rd annual commencement exercises at McArthur court.

The list included two doctor of education degrees, three doctor of jurisprudence, and 73 master of arts or science. Among the total are 49 doctors of medicine from the University of Oregon medical school in Portland, which this year for the first time held its own ceremony in the new auditorium.

Dr. Donald M. Erb, president of the university, delivered the commencement address on "The Price of Freedom," while Dr. James R. Branton, head of the university department of religion, delivered the baccalaureate sermon Sunday morning on "Education and Social Responsibility." Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of higher education, represented the state system of higher education, and Edgar W. Smith, Portland member of the board of higher education represented that group.
