STORE BURGLED IN SILVER LAKE

SILVER LAKE—Robbery of Martin's store early Monday morning netted the bold thief \$20 in currency. Entry was made by prying two locks from the front door. The safe was rifled, the lock having been wrecked with an ax taken from the store's stock. The cash register received the same treatment. None of the stock was taken and two dollars worth of pennies from the cash register were left piled on the counter.

The proprietors, Mr. and Mrs. Guy Martin, live in a house near the store and Mrs. Martin heard the ax blows just as dawn was breaking. Supposing it to be one of her near neighbors cutting kindling, she did not call her husband. The robbery was discovered some hours later. The crime is the first of its kind in this small and usually law-abiding community.
