

SMOKING TO BE PROHIBITED IN SHASTA FOREST

MT. SHASTA CITY — Under authority delegated by Regional Forester S. B. Show, Supervisor M. H. Davis, of the Shasta national forest, announces that smoking will be prohibited within the Shasta national forest from June 15, 1940 until further notice except at:

1. Improved places of habitation.
2. Prepared camp grounds.
3. Areas posted as smoking areas.

This prohibition is made effective under the provisions of section H, regulation T-1 of the department of agriculture, which reads:

"Reg. T-1. The following acts are prohibited on lands of the United States within national forests:

"(H). Smoking during periods of fire danger, publicly announced by the regional forester upon such areas as may be designated by him, which may include roads and trails and improved camping grounds, but shall not include improved places of habitation."

The period beginning June 15, 1940 is hereby declared a period of fire danger, which period shall be deemed to continue until notice is published to the contrary. The attention of the public is also invited to the Siskiyou county ordinance which prohibits smoking on forest lands within Siskiyou county during the period June 15 to October 15, except:

1. Within cities or towns or other places of habitation.
2. Upon paved state or county highways.
3. Areas outside national forests not supporting inflammable vegetable growth within a distance of 30 feet.
4. Outside national forests but within vehicles not in motion and which contain ash receptacles.
5. Established camp grounds.
6. Such other areas designated and posted by the United States Forest service as smoking places.

Trinity and Modoc counties have similar ordinances prohibiting smoking during the period July 1 to October 15 each year.

PARIS DROPS OUT AS SOURCE OF NEWS BROADCASTS

NEW YORK, June 13 (AP)—Approach of the battlefronts has eliminated Paris as a source of short wave relays by American networks at least for the time being.

Both NBC and CBS report that with the transfer of French censors and the ministry of information to Tours their representatives have gone along. After missing a broadcast or two, Paul Archinard of NBC and Eric Severeid of CBS were able to obtain radio facilities in the new French capital for their regular relays to America.

The regular Paris short wave station, Paris Mondial, was still being picked up in this country, the NBC and CBS listening posts reported. It was transmitting its usual newscasts.

In an effort to increase early morning broadcast service to many rural areas, the federal communications commission has authorized daytime and limited-time stations to begin operation at 4 a. m., local standard time.

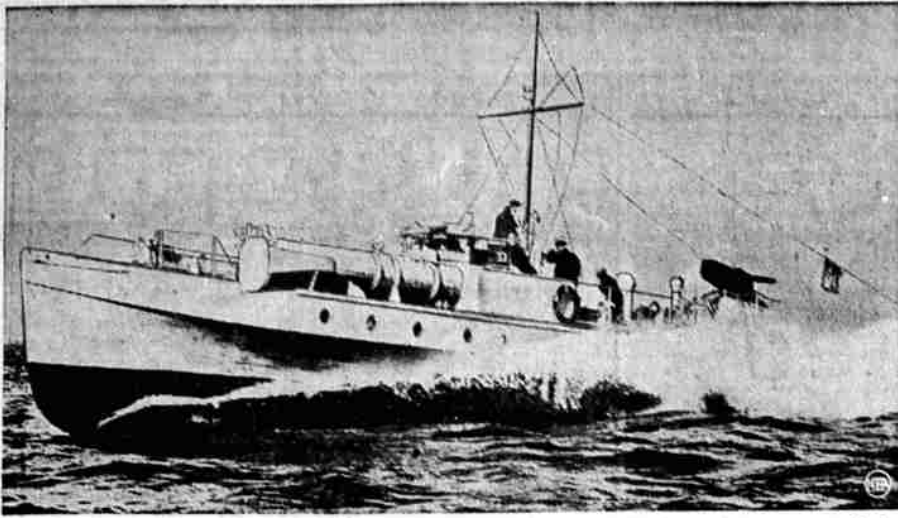

JOBS for JUNE GRADUATES

Frequently young people fail to secure employment for two reasons. First, they have no definite objective in mind, and second, they do not present their experience and qualifications to the best advantage.

It is very difficult for an employer to become enthused about a young man's prospects when he is uncertain about what he wants to do. On the other hand, if the applicant has studied salesmanship, and during his summer vacations has clerked in a store, or done house to house canvassing, or sold magazines, and is definite in his desire to get into sales work, the employer obtains a much more favorable impression.

The young man who sits across the desk from you and in an eager, and earnest manner endeavors to persuade you of his capacity to do a given job, arouses a definite interest

and makes the most favorable impression. While the young man who is indecisive and not certain whether he wants to do a certain thing creates an unfavorable impression on the employer.

Personal appearance, conduct and poise are important factors in evaluating applicants for jobs. Carelessness in appearance at the time of the interview indicates a lack of respect for the job in question and creates an impression of indifference.

The young man who earned a substantial portion of his expenses in school or who has used his summers constructively to equip himself with some type of experience in his chosen field has a distinct advantage over those who use this time only as a vacation period.

Some young men do not get jobs because they give one the impression they are just shopping around, rather than trying

to find the type of business in which they can build a career.

For example, a young man may be too much concerned about small initial differences in starting salary. He inquires about such things as retirement plans rather than endeavoring to impress upon the employer that he has the industriousness and the capacity for hard work that is so necessary for future success.

Some fail to obtain jobs when they make written application, because of their carelessness in properly filling out the application form.

The application form is an invitation to the prospective employer to sell himself to the employer. If he is careless about any information regarding his education, business experience, etc., he handicaps himself by making an unsatisfactory first

impression. Carelessness in spelling, grammar and clarity are often present in the written application of those who do not get jobs.

Many employers request a photograph of the applicant to be attached to the written application. Here again the job applicant often does himself an injustice. He will send only a snapshot or attach a cheap, hastily taken picture that often has little resemblance and never does him justice.

In these small but nevertheless important ways too many young men seeking work fail to create the best possible impression. In these days of keen competition for employment, they should not overlook any opportunity, however slight, to sell themselves to a prospective employer.

ITALIANS AT S. F. SPLIT BY BIG WAR

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13 (AP)—Carmelo Zito, editor of an Italian language newspaper here, asserted today that prominent San Francisco Italians were spreading fascist propaganda in northern California and teaching fascist policies to Italian children in "after hours" schools.

Zito, talking to interviewers, said Italy's entrance into the European war had split San Francisco's large Italian colony into two sharply opposed factions, but he said only 10 per cent of the 60,000 Italians here were fascist sympathizers.

Zito, who left Italy several years ago because he opposed Mussolini's policies, is editor of Corriere Del Popolo, which cir-

culates in the densely populated North Beach Italian sector.

Zito said he had gathered textbooks used to teach children in after school hours, and that they were full of pro-fascist passages, such as:

"Duce, if the fatherland needs us, call us and we shall come."
"When I am big and when at last I am a soldier, I too, as my father, shall fight for the fatherland."
"I shall take many tags and many prisoners. I shall earn I don't know how many medals. This is the duty of all Italian children. This is your duty, too, little Italian child."

LIBRARIANS REPORT READING INCREASE

An amazing and highly gratifying increase in circulation was reported Thursday by city and county librarians who issued the following comparative figures in circulation of books from both institutions within the past few years.

In 1926 the county library circulation was 4000, city, 13,000; city schools, 2000 books. During the past year of 1939, county library circulation had grown to 171,293, including all circulation in the county library system; city library, 103,185; city schools, 50,000.
