

### JOB STATISTICS IN OREGON RELEASED

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—Oregon showed an average monthly employment of 142,060 workers covered by unemployment compensation during 1938, the social security board reported in one of its first studies of payrolls and unemployment.

The Oregon workers covered in the survey earned a total of \$216,815,000 in wages.

The board said the nation's unemployment compensation program, with the regular payroll reports, was sufficiently inclusive to make the data collected in the study a "valuable complement" to other payroll indexes.

It gathered the payroll figures for their interest to labor and business groups, as well as for use in working out problems relating to fluctuations in employment and administration of unemployment compensation.

The board described its new study as "a major statistical by-product" of unemployment compensation.

The breakdown for Oregon showed the covered employment was principally in these divisions:

- Mining 845;
- construction 5292;
- manufacturing 53,198;
- transportation, communication, and utilities, 23,404;
- wholesale and retail trade 38,035;
- finance, insurance and real estate 4446.

The study showed 1938 payrolls in important Oregon industries as follows:

- Textile mill products \$2,025,000.
- Basic lumber industries \$33,240,000.
- Iron and steel and their products \$3,650,000.

### BISHOP REMINGTON AWARDED HONOR DEGREE IN EAST

Rt. Rev. William P. Remington, D. D., of Pendleton, Episcopal bishop of eastern Oregon, was installed as a trustee of the University of Pennsylvania Wednesday at ceremonies in Philadelphia.

At the same time he was awarded the honorary degree of doctor of sacred theology (S. T. D.).

Bishop Remington will represent the alumni of the university on the Pacific coast on the board of trustees.

The doctorate was conferred upon Bishop Remington in recognition of his work for his church, especially in Oregon, and for his service to the university.

As a student, Bishop Remington was a star trackman and competed in the Olympic games of 1900 in the hurdles and broad jump. He also was manager of the football team, one of the founders of the Sphinx society and of the University of Pennsylvania social settlement.

Bishop Remington was born in Philadelphia and at one time taught at DeLancy school there. He saw extensive service as a chaplain in the World war and was missionary bishop of South Dakota prior to his assignment to eastern Oregon in 1922. He is well known in Klamath Falls where he is a frequent visitor.

### COUNTY MAY COME UNDER TENANT PLAN

Klamath county may be selected by a state FSA advisory committee to come under the tenant purchase program of the farm security administration, according to information released Wednesday.

Possibilities of Klamath county being selected to come under this phase of the FSA program were discussed at a meeting of the county advisory committee held June 11. It is understood that the state committee is to meet the latter part of this month to consider several tentatively selected counties, of which Klamath is one. Such loans are made only in certain counties designated by the secretary of agriculture on recommendation of the state FSA advisory committee.

Aside from the rehabilitation program, the farm security administration's most important job is to make loans under the Bankhead Jones Farm Tenant act to tenants, sharecroppers, and farm laborers to enable them to purchase family-size farms of their own. These tenant purchase loans are ordinarily made in counties where tenancy is most widespread or is growing most rapidly. They are repayable over a period of 40 years at three per cent interest.

Only 32 such loans have been made in this state, totalling \$273,268, to date.

### MRS. ROOSEVELT IN FAVOR OF WAR TRAINING

NEW YORK, June 13 (AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt said Wednesday she favored compulsory training for men and women of all ages in civilian lines of endeavor which could, in time of national emergency, be directed toward the prosecution of war.

She said, however, that she still was opposed to conscription for military service.

The president's wife, interviewed before she boarded a Washington-bound plane, was asked if she thought the American Youth Congress would endorse a peacetime mobilization along non-military lines.

"I think," she replied, "that you would find that the youth congress would be in favor of universal service and would object only to compulsory military service."

Mrs. Roosevelt said the nation "should require of every individual six months or a year of equal training, with everyone else."

"I don't care who they are," she added, "and girls as well as boys should be included."

"It would be preparation in case we ever have to go to war. It would be a program of training for skills."

"This thinking that you can
