STOCKS EXTEND RECOVERY PUSH BUT DAY SLOW

NEW YORK, June 15 (AP)—Steels and other assorted war stocks extended their recovery push in today's market but many issues had difficulty in following through.

As in the preceding session, optimistic home business prospects counteracted further depressing war bulletins.

Gains, ranging from one to more than three points at the best, were cut at the close and minus signs could be seen here and there. Transfers were around 550,000 shares.

Favored stocks most of the day included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Crucible Steel, Chrysler, Sears Roebuck, Dow Chemical, Westinghouse, Johns-Manville, Eastman Kodak, International Paper and Power preferred, Loft, American Car and Foundry, Baldwin Locomotive, Kenecott, American Smelting, Consolidated Edison and Santa Fe. Boeing, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft and Sperry were backward. Possible cancellation of plane orders by France was a factor here. While it was thought likely the United States would take practically all available production, it was believed profits would be narrower.

General Motors lagged, although early June retail sales of new cars was put at some 20 per cent larger than in the like period last year. Steels were aided by indications mill operations in some sections would hit 90 per cent of capacity next week.

Bonds improved with Italian dollar loans strong. Commodities were a shade mixed. "Free" sterling gave ground.

Sales of fair volume have advanced prices in 12-month Texas wools. Prices were very firm, but little changed from the previous week in fleece wools. Country packed lots of three-eighths and quarter bloods in mixed lots had the largest demand. Graded combing bright fleece wools received only a very moderate demand, and grease basis prices were steady at 33-35 cents for fine Delaine, at 34-36 cents for half bloods, and at 38-39 cents for three-eighths and quarter blood grades.

WHEAT UP SLIGHTLY AFTER RAGGED DAY

CHICAGO, June 15 (AP)—After fluctuating nervously through the session over a rather wide range, wheat prices today steadied and closed fractionally higher than yesterday.

Prices were about a cent higher and almost a cent lower at various times during the session. Corn sagged more than a cent before recovering partially.

Some of the selling was attributed to dealers evening up accounts for the weekend in view of uncertainties resulting from continued allied reverses. Favorable crop reports also attracted attention. Offsetting this was firmness of securities and prospects of substantial government purchases of flour over the weekend.

Wheat closed 1-1/2c higher than yesterday, July 80-79 1/2c September 80 1/4c; corn 1-1/2c lower, July 61 1/2c, September 60 1/2c; oats 1-1/2c down.

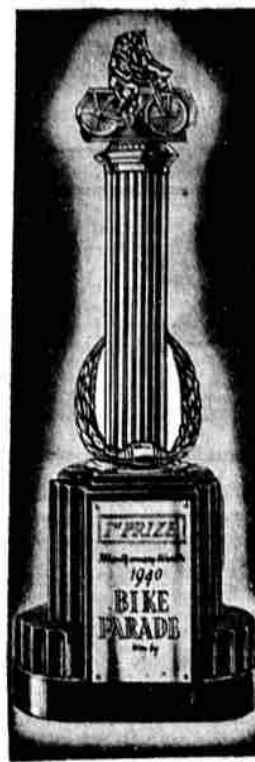
