

Golden Wedding Observed Here

Mr. and Mrs. Edward B. Schmoë Honored On Occasion By Friends and Relatives

Mr. and Mrs. Edward B. Schmoë, beloved residents of the Dairy district, were honored by friends and relatives on the occasion of their golden wedding anniversary Saturday, June the eighth, at their ranch home. Many interesting gifts were presented the couple by those who called and a mock wedding took place during the evening.

Guests were seated at a large table centered with a five-tiered wedding cake which was cut and served by Mr. and Mrs. Schmoë.

Mr. and Mrs. Schmoë were married at the home of the bride near Oakgrove, Missouri, June the eighth, 1890, in the presence of many friends and relatives. They spent the following three years farming in Missouri, and in the spring of 1894, traveled to Oolagah Indian territory where they settled on a large wheat farm. In 1899 they went farther west in their covered wagon, stopping at Blackburn, Oklahoma; Victor, Colorado, and other points. Their fourth daughter, Mary Slagle of Wapato, Washington, was born to them in the covered wagon while traveling through Bryant, Wyoming. The family arrived in Boise, Idaho, in October, 1902, and remained there until May, 1903, where Mr. Schmoë engaged in logging that winter. In the following spring they sold their equipment, and went by train to Quincy, Washington, to take up a homestead. Later, in 1914, they moved to Yakima valley near Harrah, Washington. In January, 1931, they moved to Klamath county and settled on their present home near Dairy. Mr. and Mrs. Schmoë are parents of seven sons, five daughters, twenty-six grandchildren, and eleven great grandchildren.
