The British press urged that everything be done without delay to better the defense of the kingdom.

"The full brunt of the war must now fall on this island," said Lord Beaverbrook's standard. The paper urged that the British Isles be converted into a "floating fortress."

The News declared that "if the nation rises as one man to the towering height of the struggle there will be no need for dismay."

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or the federal courts. The secretary urged continuation of industrial relations with the Portland chamber of commerce and announced 33 unions had been

added to the Federation since last June. He also predicted new efforts by President Roosevelt to unite the AFL and CIO.

At the opening of the morning session, Archie Rice, chairman of the local convention committee, introduced Ralph Waggoner, president of the Central Labor council. Waggoner in turn called on the local speakers.

D. E. Van Vactor, city attorney speaking for Mayor Richmond, called the federation "100 per cent American" in welcoming the visitors to the city. The remark brought applause. City Police Sergeant Leigh Ackerman also sounded a welcome from the police department.

Bosworth Speaks
H. P. Bosworth, Jr., president of the Klamath county chamber of commerce, greeted the delegates and expressed the hope they will find time to visit surrounding spots of interest. He told them that Klamath county increased from 3970 population in 1900 to more than 40,000 in 1940. He cited the county's natural resources and the cooperative spirit of its people.

Wilson Wiley, local attorney, made a talk on the national labor relations board. He discussed factors which disrupt markets and labor payrolls and said the shifting industrial conditions make labor disputes inevitable. It was in the hope of devising a way out other than futile industrial warfare, he said, that collective bargaining was developed and the labor law was devised to diminish the cause of labor disputes.

John Houston led the delegates in community singing. Rev. Charles Bates offered the invocation.

First resolution introduced at the convention calls for important changes in the state unemployment compensation law. The resolution was signed by members of the federation executive board as individuals, but was not offered as a committee resolution. The proposed provisions include:

Benefits paid shall equal at least 60 per cent of full time earnings but not more than \$24 weekly or less than \$7 weekly. The present law permits a maximum payment of \$15 weekly.

Benefits paid for a maximum of 20 weeks, instead of the present 16 weeks allowance.

Waiting period reduced from three weeks to one week before benefits begin.

There shall be no cancellation of earned credits, but any penalty shall take the form of an increased waiting period. In no case longer than a total of six weeks.

State commission shall no longer have the power to declare any employment seasonal.

That no pooled fund shall be adopted and no employer shall be entitled to a reduction in his contributions below the present rate until the proposed minimum standards have been met.

No lower rates for employers under so-called merit rating or experienced rating system, scheduled to go into effect July 1, 1941.

Two other small nations in the Baltic area, in the north, felt the tread of invaders' boots as Russia's red armies marched into Estonia and Latvia early today in accordance with Moscow's weekend demands, which were accepted by the little Baltic states. Russian troops occupied Lithuania Saturday.

The Soviet move was apparently two-fold.

1. To halt any possible German thrust into the Baltic.

2. To improve Russia's strategic position for possible offensive operations.

Edmond Taylor, a Columbia Broadcasting system correspondent, speaking from the same studio in Bordeaux where Premier Petain spoke, declared: "The French intermediary is expected to be the ambassador of Spain. What the German terms will be, if they will give terms, none of us know as yet."

Taylor added that German troops at that moment were understood to be "not very far away from the place from which the French radio is now operating."
