RIDING SKILL OF BUCKAROO GIRLS TESTED

A blazing hot sun which poured into the arena at Klamath county fairgrounds Sunday afternoon failed to wilt the ardor of several thousand rodeo fans who cheered six of the prettiest little horsewomen this area has seen as they went through their paces in the riding test given candidates seeking the crown of queen of Klamath Buckaroo days.

From a hat held by Mary Alice Serruys, who also served as flagbearer of the day, the girls drew for position. Their names were withheld and not even the communities which they represented were given by the announcer in order that contestants remained unidentified to the judges.

First to appear on the field was Eileen Schneider of Bly, representing the Beatty-Bly community; next girl into the arena was Jean Fugate of Merrill, Merrill Service club candidate; Mary Margaret Scott of Klamath Falls, representing the Klamath Merchants; Charlotte Pangburn, Dorris, town council candidate; Nora Crume, Chiloquin and Sprague river community candidate; and Virginia Hooper, Tulelake, carrying colors of the Tulelake Rotary club.

Points were given for the following requirements: Holding the horse by the head, mount, walk and trot horse, gallop horse, gallop horse figure eight, gallop horse with right foot out of the stirrup in a figure eight, gallop horse with both hands over head, thumbs hooked together, stop horse and dismount. Judges were three out-of-town men whose names were not revealed until after the tests. They were Dr. Verling of Fort Bidwell, Calif., R. R. Lightner of Cedarville, Calif., and Harold Morgan, Alturas.

Opening the day's festivities was the Sheriff's Posse, with Sheriff Lloyd L. Low leading the group of 75 men on horse back. Next in line was the flagbearer, Bill Serruys, followed by members of the posse making their initial public appearance in an exceptionally difficult drill with Pat Ivory as drillmaster.

Introduced during the afternoon by Announcer Bud Ether-

ton, were the queen's chaperones, Mrs. Paul Sharp, Mrs. Eugene Larsen and Mrs. R. R. Proebatel.

Pretty little Mary Miller of Tulelake, daughter of Harry Miller, rancher, gave an exhibition of reining on her cow pony. Making her appearance Sunday was Carol Marie Stebbins, little horsewoman, who aspires to be queen of the rodeo.

A taste of what is in store for the fans during the four-day show, July 4, 5, 6, 7, was the little rodeo put on by a group of Beatty buckaroos using Mac Barbour's string of bucking horses. The boys taking part included Wilbur Hixon, Bobbie George, Guy Johnnie, Boyd Jackson, John Garcia, Chris George, Steve Watah and the Wooden Box campaign representative, Jim Bickers. Pickup men were Jack West, Merrill; Slim Baker of Fort Klamath and George Noble of Langell valley.

Members of the Sheriff's Posse passed the hat among the crowd and garnered in \$79.94 which was divided among the boys who took part in the bucking contest.

Results of the queen's contest were placed in a padlocked container, score sheets to remain in the tin until the night of the queen's ball at which time riding scores and personality scores will be added and one of the six girls chosen as queen of Klamath Buckaroo Days and presented with the white buckskin outfit and the \$300 silver mounted saddle offered by Montgomery Ward and company.

The public is invited to attend the queen's ball Saturday night, June 22, and see their favorite crowned for the July celebration.
