JOB for JUNE GRADUATES

FIRST solemn truth for the young, newly employed person to keep in mind is that each added responsibility in any career requires a bigger person to carry the load.

Hard work, and long, consistent service are points which your employer takes into consideration when he thinks of you in terms of promotion. For the good of his business, the determining factor must be whether you have grown as a person since you started work, or since your last promotion, and are now big enough for added responsibility.

Only the person who enriches himself will grow to meet responsibility and should deserve promotion.

This is not simply a question of training, of education, nor of acquiring more and more information about your job. It is a question of reaching beyond the boundaries of your job, of widening your personal horizon, of becoming broader, richer, more significant as a human being.

The young woman who selects the advertising or merchandising ladders to success in a department store must be able to sell—easily and well. Without that ability she has little chance of success.

If she hopes that her flare for selling will lead her into advertising rather than merchandising, she must be able to write and to get across in newspaper advertisements the dramatic possibilities of the merchandise.

Advertising is salesmanship in print. Successful selling is valuable experience that can lead to it.

If she is to go on from selling into merchandising—to become a junior executive (perhaps head of stock or assistant buyer)—she must also have the ability to manage both merchandise and people. If she is to go on to become a buyer, she must have creative imagination—the ability to see possibilities of developing, improving, and promoting attractively the merchandise on her shelves.

You will notice that, so far, this has been addressed to women in particular. It is done intentionally.

I believe that women's inherent qualifications make them especially suited for department store work in these two fields.

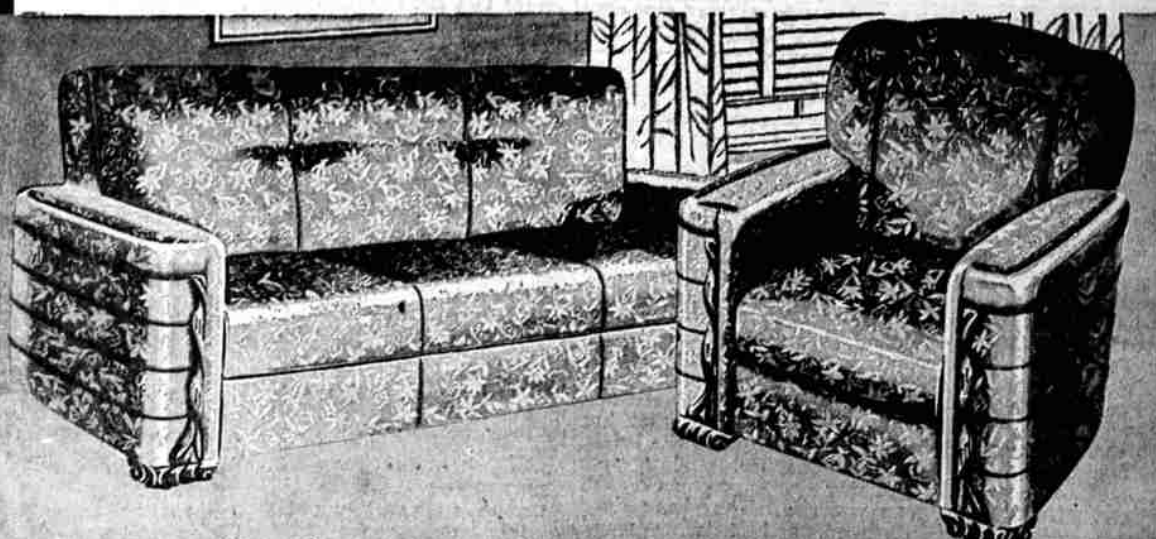
999 ON RAMPAGE

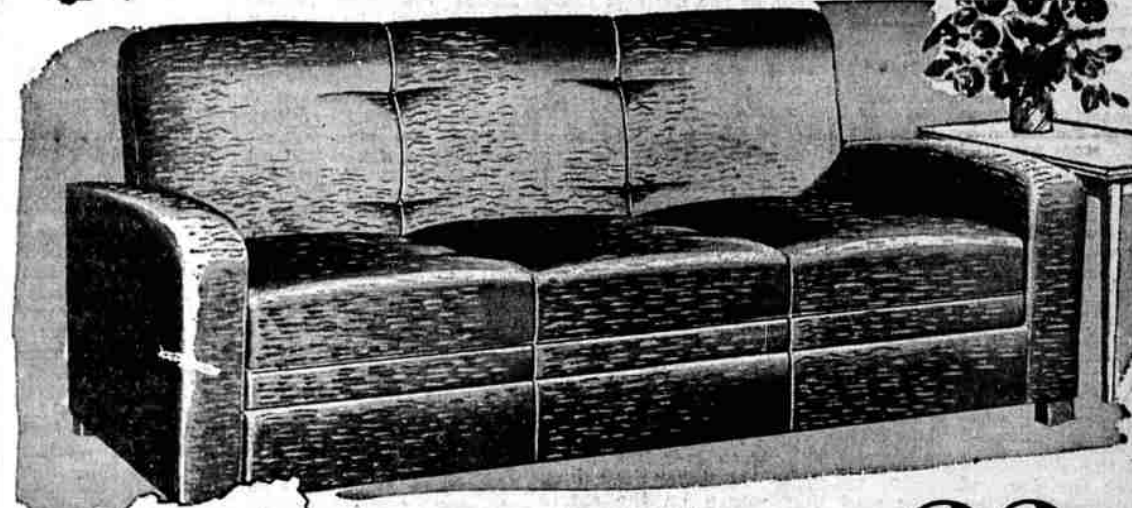

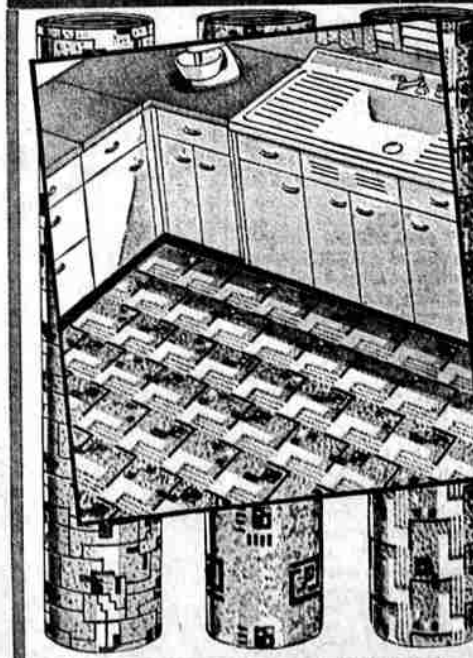
