Paris Accepting German Victors With Good Grace

WITH THE GERMAN ARMY IN PARIS, June 17 (Via Berlin; delayed) (UP)—Paris seemed today to be accepting with quiet resignation and comparatively good grace its new role as a surrendered capital.

It gave the appearance of being more or less normal, insofar as a great city can be said to be normal under alien domination. The first bitterness which must have gripped it when the Germans marched in last Friday looked to be on the wane, for the moment at least.

Smiles
More and more it was a common sight to see Germans and Parisians in conversation. And sometimes the Germans smiled at the French girls, often getting a smile in return.

In their hours off duty the youthful nazi soldiers were scrambling about the city, much as have tourists through the centuries. Guide book in hand, the trooper peers about to get his bearings and identify the sights, sometimes in a casual

manner seeking clarification from the natives.

Parade
Starting early today, cavalry units clattered through the streets in a great parade. The route led past long lines of war material captured from the allies.

If the city gives the appearance of comparative normalcy, it should all the more be stressed that all is not harmony. There were generalized reports of grief and of suicides among terror-stricken Parisians. Resentment and distress are etched on many faces.

One is allowed to deduce that the Germans mean to impress the people that they are in Paris as conquerors. The occasional evidence of that attitude lies mostly in such factors as the tone of voice in which words are exchanged or commands given.

But on the more cheerful side of the picture, food was plentiful so far as the correspondents with the German army could observe. Shops were well stocked and selling freely. Utility services were unimpaired.

ACTOR RICHARD ARLEN ATTACKED ON GOLF COURSE

LOS ANGELES, June 18 (AP)—Actor Richard Arlen's complaint that William Tate, 30, attacked and beat him at the Wilshire Country club golf course led police to detain Tate today on suspicion of extortion.

Police Officer T. F. Mellott said Arlen told him that ten weeks ago Tate met him as he stepped from an airplane at Metropolitan airport and used a pistol to force him into an automobile.

"He kept me prisoner for more than an hour, accusing me of alienating his wife's affections and demanding \$1000 so he could get out of town," Mellott quoted the actor.

"I don't even know his wife. To avoid trouble, I put former Detective Lieut. Frank (Lefty) James to work on the case instead of reporting the incident to police."

"After the airport incident Tate came to my home and threatened to beat me with a club. I have tried repeatedly to convince him that he is all wrong about me, but he would not take my word for it and kept making demands for money."

The first attack on Arlen came yesterday as the actor was preparing to play in the qualifying rounds of the Southern California amateur golf tourna-

ment. Arlen said he was surprised and stunned by an unexpected blow which felled him. Olin Dutra, golf professional, and Arlen's caddy seized Tate. James made a "citizen's arrest" and held him until Officer Mellott arrived. Bing Crosby was among the golfers who witnessed the pummeling.

Abyssinian natives greatly prize empty soup cans and cat-sup bottles. They will give as much as a dozen eggs and a chicken for each empty can or bottle.

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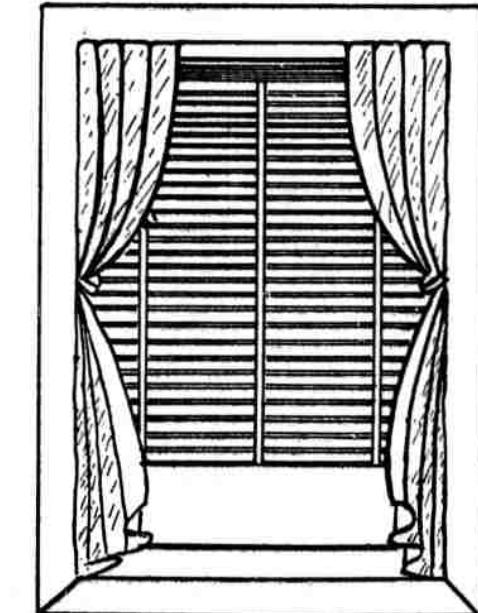
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
