STOCK MARKET AWAITS FRENCH PEACE REPORTS

NEW YORK, June 18 (AP)—A stock market rally faltered today after gains running to 2 or more points had been posted for steel, rails, rubbers and an assortment of specialties.

Speculative contingents seemingly got little inspiration from the European war picture and the buying that appeared was based mainly on continuance of industrial hopes surrounding the fast-growing domestic armament program and augmented British purchases.

The inclination of many traders was to stand aside and await the Hitler-Mussolini peace terms to France.

Dealings contracted to a mere dribble in the final hour and transfers for the full session approximated 700,000 shares.

Prominent on the upswing—some eventually slipped—were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Republic, Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Southern Pacific, Great Northern, Goodyear, Sears Roebuck, United Aircraft, American Telephone, Western Union, Kennecott, American Smelting, Allied Chemical and Lof.

Sluggish were Boeing, Douglas Aircraft, Glenn Martin, Standard Oil of N. J., Texas Corp., and Eastman Kodak.

Chrysler was resistant but General Motors was unable to get out in front. From Detroit it was learned the proposed new contract between "GM" and the unions would cost the company about \$8,000,000 additional a year. Oils lagged as the latest European shift threatened foreign sales of petroleum products.

Rail bonds were higher but recently strong German and Italian loans lost momentum. Commodities steadied.

SUPPLIES ABOVE AVERAGE, REPORT

WASHINGTON, June 18 (AP)—Total 1940-41 supplies were estimated today to be above average, despite severe winter and spring temperatures in eastern and central states.

The agriculture marketing service said that on June 1 reports indicated large crops of pears, cherries and California plums. Production of peaches and California dried prunes was expected to be slightly under the 10-year average.

June 1 conditions indicated an average commercial apple crop and above-average production of California grapes, figs and olives and Idaho prunes. Citrus crops from 1940 bloom, the service said, probably would be well above average in the 1940-41 season.

Small crops were in prospect for apricots, almonds and walnuts in California and for prunes in the Pacific Northwest.

The June 1 condition of the apple crop in 38 commercial states was 67 per cent of normal. It was 69 per cent June 1 of last year.

WHEAT BIDS DRIFT IN NARROW RANGE

CHICAGO, June 18 (AP)—Wheat futures drifted aimlessly over a narrow range most of the session today in a light volume of trade. After opening as much as 1 1/2 cents higher, profit taking turned prices lower and after the first half hour wheat dropped back about 1 cent above yesterday's closing levels.

Just before the close the market again turned slightly higher but most traders turned cautious and seemed content to sit on the side lines awaiting an announcement from the axis powers concerning peace terms for the French.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1/2 cents higher than yesterday, July 77c, September 78 1/2c, and corn was 1c-1c up, July 61c, September 59 1/2c, oats 1-1c lower, soy beans 1c off to 1c up, and rye 1/2c to 1c lower.
