McNary and Rufus Holman to support passage of a bill to deport Harry Bridges, alien leader of west coast labor.

Allen's wire "urgently" requested that McNary and Holman do all in their power to have the senate join the house in its favorable action "as an unmistakable gesture of an

aroused citizenry exercising its power of sovereignty over aliens in our midst. We believe America's duty to herself in this time of crisis requires that she declare and exemplify in no uncertain terms . . . power which is actually the power of national self-preservation."

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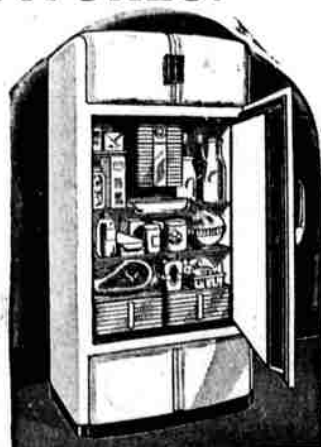
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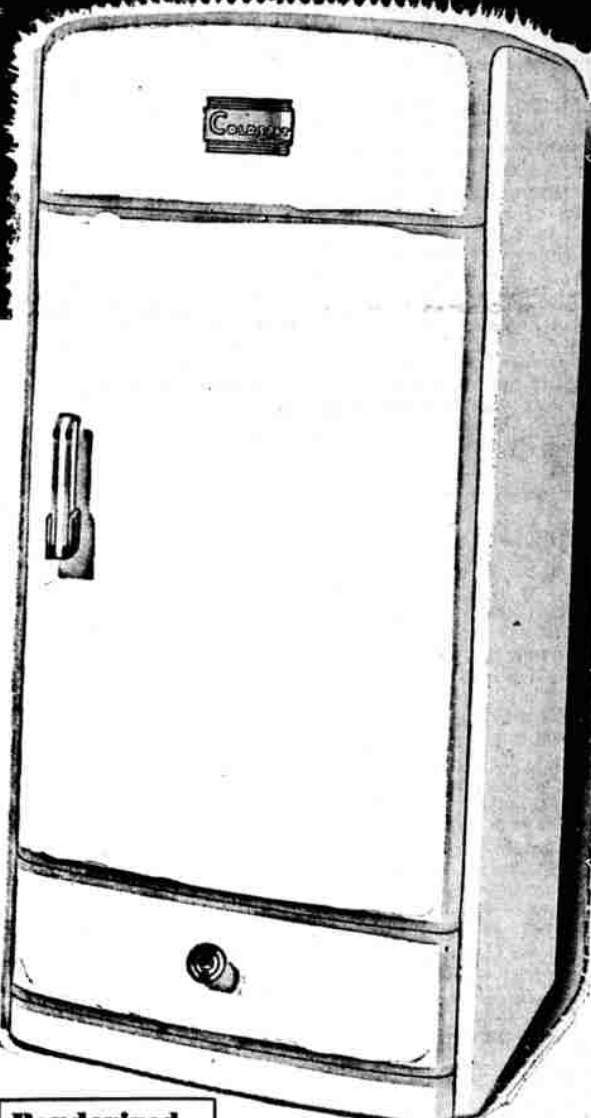

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Easy gliding shelf with safety thermometer.



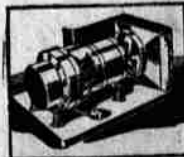
