

HENRY NAMED COUNTY DEMO PARTY LEADER

Democratic county central committeemen organized for the new year at an enthusiastic meeting Tuesday night, electing Jack Henry as chairman to head a slate of new officers.

Henry defeated Tom Chaburn of Merrill, 19 to 14. Henry was nominated by Sam Ackerman and Chaburn was backed by R. C. Hoskinson.

Other new officers of the committee are: Mrs. Agnes LaLonde, secretary; Mrs. Dora Goddard, vice-chairman; Emmert Fossum, treasurer; Jack Benner, state committeeman, and Mrs. Dora Goddard, state committeewoman.

The meeting was opened with M. L. Johnson, retiring chairman, presiding.

After the elections, the committee discussed the problem of filling positions left vacant at the primary election in May. J. E. Fifield, G. C. Tatman and Phil Evans were named by Chairman Henry as a committee to prepare a list of proposed members from the unrepresented precincts.

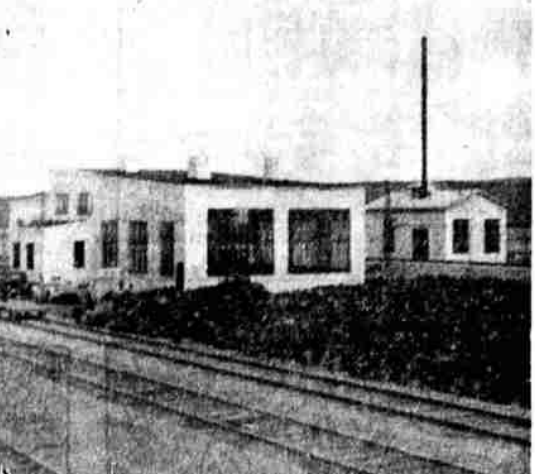
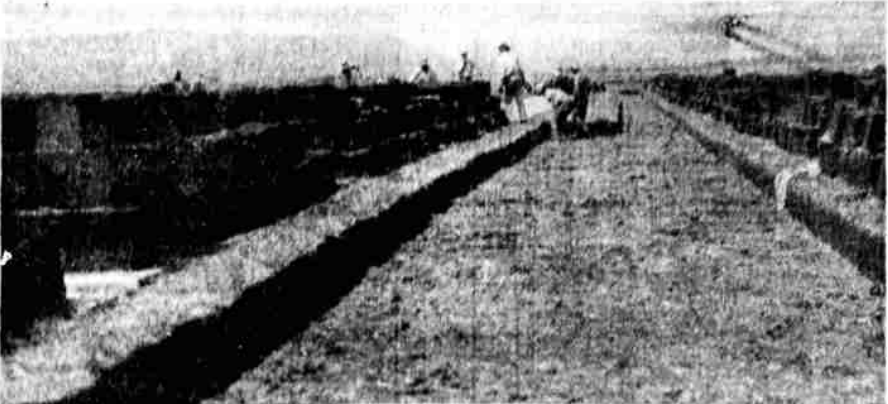

PROMINENT among labor leaders who have been brought to Klamath Falls for the convention here this week is Gertrude Sweet, international vice president of the culinary workers' union and only woman organizer in the field.



Besides taking a lead at the State Culinary Alliance convention here last Saturday, Mrs. Sweet is active in the state federation of labor convention underway at the Fremont school.

Title of the organization of which she is vice president is so long that most labor people call it by initials only. It is the Hotel and Restaurant Employers' International Alliance and the Bartenders' International League of America. She is vice president of the ninth district, which comprises the five Northwest states.

Mrs. Sweet approves both the resolution adopted Wednesday morning for prevention of women working as bar tenders, and another resolution yet to be acted upon, calling for repeal of the state liquor law.

She strongly believes that if women are allowed to work as bar tenders the condemnation of the public will be aroused and there will be agitation for the return of prohibition.

SCIENCE TREATING PLANT DISEASES

SEATTLE, June 19 (AP)—Science launched a new move in agriculture here today by demonstrating a method to cure a diseased plant of what had been a mortal plant illness.

The universal method of treating plant and crop diseases has been prevention. Sick crops were never cured until recently in Virginia it was discovered that benzene fumes would cure a tobacco plant of the highly destructive and costly disease known as downy mildew.

Today Dr. E. C. Yarwood, of the University of California,

Berkeley, told the American association for the advancement of science of discovering that fumes of sulphur would cure certain diseases of beans, clover, cucumbers, snapdragons and sunflowers.

He described a snapdragon with rust, a disease which yellow leaves, splits stems and which has meant that the snapdragon plant must be destroyed immediately.

He placed a snapdragon which had rust for five days, under a bell jar. Sulfur fumes were turned on like oxygen in a tent. In five hours the snapdragon was well.

Exactly the same quick cure happened with beans suffering from five-day-old rust.

COUNTY COURT BACK FROM TRIP NORTH

Members of the Klamath county court were home Wednesday after a trip to Portland and to Camp Clatsop.

At Portland, they attended committee meetings of the Oregon association of counties. They were jubilant over the prospects of passage of legislation in congress to give states 25 per cent of the revenues collected from lands under the administrative jurisdiction of the national park service.

At Camp Clatsop, the court

members lunched and visited with Captains Ted Case and Dewey Powell and their Klamath national guardsmen. The Klamath lads are getting along fine but are being "worked like nobody's business," the local men said.

PORTLAND, June 19 (AP)—England will give Hitler a fight and may—if the French navy remains French—stop him, Chester Rowell, editor emeritus of the San Francisco Chronicle said yesterday.
