

ROUTINE MILK BOARD HEARING HELD IN CITY

A routine hearing of the state milk board was held Tuesday in the city hall with more than 50 distributors, producers and consumers in attendance. Chairman of the board is C. E. Grelle, Portland, who said the cooperation between the industry and the board was "exceptionally good."

Other members of the board include A. E. Engbreton, Astoria; Glenn B. Marsh, Hood River; and J. H. Mapes, Portland, administrator, Cecil L. Griggs, field examiner, in charge of this territory.

Morning hours were taken up with general discussion of milk prices with distributors as well as producers offering testimony which the board will consider at its next meeting.

Portland. Hearings are given in each of Oregon's counties and the purpose is to establish marketing areas and prices.

Testimony was given by Dr. J. C. Hunt, Klamath Falls milk and meat inspector, and E. B. Hall, chairman of the city board of health.

Feeling between consumers, producers and distributors was said to be amicable.

MOOSE LODGES TO CELEBRATE EVENT

A unique celebration of the graduation of 68 boys and girls from its child city of Mooseheart is under way by the Loyal Order of Moose. Through-out more than 1700 lodges of the fraternity in the United States and Canada a vast testimonial enrollment of new members is taking place. Supreme lodge officers believe that thousands will be added to the fraternity's rolls in honor of the graduates, in this unique campaign, and on June 29, which is graduation day at Mooseheart, the graduates will receive hundreds of telegrams from lodges telling them of additional foster parents enrolled with the Moose.

Mooseheart, child city of the Moose, is a 1230-acre estate situated on the rolling prairie land of Illinois, 35 miles southwest of Chicago. There, more than 1200 dependent children of the Moose are given a home, an education and instruction in a trade. Some of the children have been at the child city since they were infants.

This year's graduating class numbers 68—35 boys and 33 girls, and represents an investment, in youth building by the Moose, of \$586,000. They were sent to Mooseheart from lodges in 28 states. Illinois sent 16, Indiana, eight, Pennsylvania, six, and so on. They have lived at Mooseheart an average of 11 years, six months. During that time they have been given, besides a pleasant home, an academic education in the Mooseheart graded and high schools and have received instruction among 14 trades and vocations. Now, at an average age of 18 years, six months, they have completed their courses and on receiving their diplomas on June 29 they are presumed to be fitted to meet life for themselves.

Temporarily most of them will visit their home lodges before taking up various jobs and

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positions which Mooseheart or the home lodges have found for them.

LABOR DANCE FUNDS TO GO TO EAGLES AUXILIARY CORPS

The Oregon state federation of labor dance will also be the pre-convention dance for the Eagles auxiliary drum corps it was announced Tuesday. All door and ticket sales proceeds will go toward the corps, the dance to be given Thursday night at the armory with Herb Cochran's orchestra playing.
