

FCC CHECKS UP ON RADIO OPERATORS

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—Approximately 100,000 radio operators were ordered today by the federal communications commission to submit proof of their citizenship.

Previous commission orders forbade amateurs to communicate with foreign countries, sharply curtailed activities of mobile transmitters, and ordered ship and other operators not to carry on unnecessary conversations.

Today's decree applies to all operators, both amateur and commercial. It calls on them to file proof in the form of affidavits, fingerprints, and photographs before August 15.

The FCC licenses only citizens for all classes of operators, but in the past has relied on the applicant's own statements.

A questionnaire, which present operators and future applicants must subscribe under oath, demands proof of citizenship by birth or naturalization, and requires information as to the nationality of immediate relatives, time spent by the applicant outside of the United States, and service with this or any foreign government.

A POLICY FOR THE TIMES

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. (To the Editor)—It is time to face certain unpleasant facts. All history shows that nations in prosperity weaken and are attacked or over-run by barbarian races. Isolation is a fatal quicksand as it has always been. Censorious pacifism, craftily fostered in our people by the vicious conspirators of world-wide chaos in the Kremlin, was seized upon by wanton politicians wooing with weasel words the votes of our citizens of both sexes. Our demagogues, Bryans, Wheelers, Norrises, Borahs and LaFollettes have kept in office by selfishly availing themselves of their opportunities to foster prejudice and defeatism in the minds of the unsophisticated voter. They have abused their democratic privilege as have all the pressure groups. Democracy is in ghastly danger from Germany, Russia and Japan. But the organic sarcasm gnawing at the body structure of our democracy are as great.

It is time for us to be Americans. If we are to continue to degenerate into great unscrupulous pressure groups raiding the public treasury and the housewife's purse we will be defeated before within in our war against German beastliness. We recognize incredible danger from the dictators. And yet we do nothing to put ourselves into efficient, unified, co-operative effort for the common good.

It is time for us all to be Americans. Not CIO Americans. Not AFL Americans. Not treasury-raiding Americans. Not profiteering Americans. Not AAA Americans. Not Four-Brotherhood Americans. Just Americans with a great heritage, a sacred trust that can only survive against cynical monsters by intelligent, all-for-one and one-for-all, devoted effort. And to do that we must first efface ourselves.

We must temporarily abandon the 40-hour week, we must stop plowing under our crops. In doing so we will be facing the facts. And facing the facts we can yet save the great democracies and the world from a relapse into a second Dark Ages. And one of our first tasks will be the purge of criminals and communists from high strategic posts in organized labor.

Labor today has its responsibility. It must clean house. It must rid itself of disorderly, irresponsible, treacherous, treasonable leadership. Labor must become a respected American institution. Ever this dark night of terror has passed, our young men of high ideals and far-seeing patriotism will be on the high seas and abroad lest they fight for a better world on our own soil while their loved ones are bombed, gassed and machine-gunned. Our young men must

have backing them up the ultimate total production of all our factories. Shall labor let them down? Before a few days are gone Harry Bridges will probably be shorn of his power. And that will be the opportunity for the two great labor movements, on this coast at least, to effect a patriotic approachment. Labor must not give aid and comfort to the dictators.

We, the last free people able to stem the flood of ruthless tyranny can waste no time. If our president has his own Munich, if we delay as did Chamberlain, and France and Britain go down into slavery, it will be too late. Our smug self-satisfaction will not avail. Build ships as we may, our resources could not build ship for ship against Germany in possession of the shipyards of France, Germany and the low countries. Sacrifice we must, and it must begin now, at home.

With equal suffrage we became a supine, impotent matriarchy. Our policies became weak, impractical, unworthy. We led England and France down the path of sentimentalism to disarmament and worldly scorn. "Sank you," said the Jap when, in the most supreme folly of all time we sank our navy. Unarmed, wishful, we announced our "Good Neighbor" policy and little Mexico defied us. The Jap beamed, Stalin nodded sardonically, Hitler whispered to his yes-men and Mussolini looked furtively out of his hole. The democracies had given aid and comfort to the enemy because politicians heeded the strident voices of the Fellow Travelers who influenced the women's vote. It is high time for the man to assert himself again, as the master of our national house. We must govern ourselves by cold, hard facts, not by subliminal feminine intellectual emotionalism.

As a volunteer in the first stage of the World War, I can assure your lady pacifist correspondent that the American nation still can boast of having courageous, unselfish, high-minded young men who believe their country, their mothers, sisters, wives and children are worth fighting for and protecting. We are not a nation of cowards. We are not a craven, cringing, abused slave race. We are men, suffering from a bad dose of feminine sentimentality.

During this troubled time we must keep our heads. We must empower responsible authorities to suspend naturalization papers, for just one reason, against fifth columnists. Their powers must be broad, but their first thought must be to avoid injustice. Their powers must be great enough to enable them to take immediate action without red tape or the interposition of legal technicalities and injunctions to hinder them.

Our post-war younger generation, unhappy, is proof of the incredible success of our enemies in their propaganda campaign against our ideals and institutions. They have been taught that we who fought before were "suckers." They believe that we who warned against isolation and disarmament were ourselves evil propagandists. Our young

people are befuddled, innocent, unsophisticated, mis-taught, mis-informed. The second and third generation of our immigrants are largely aloof, strange or contemptuously callous to the privileges and responsibilities that are theirs through our Bill of Rights.

We are undoubtedly facing the greatest crisis in the history of the world. Our heritage is at stake. Machinery and calculated paganism, extraordinary mendocities, impudent sophistries, cunningly taught nihilism, deliberate international anarchy are overthrowing the ideals first brought into general thought by the Ten Commandments.

The great force of Christianity which ultimately abolished slavery, which was the very foundation of the ancient world, is being blacked out over scores of millions of people whom Hitler intends to pervert to his epistemological, cruel, vicious doctrines. Gay, happy nations have again been enslaved as did the Romans enslave their conquered victims. Were there galleys today, Hitler's tireless would be filled with helpless, hopeless, pitiful Polish, Norwegian, Dutch and Danish wretches. The groans of enslaved white people are heard under the lash of the barbarian overseer. The Bible is verboten, the Christians are martyred again because our great nation, lost in fleshpots, luxuries, selfishness and our sense of security thought we were not our brother's keeper. And now in this dark hour when Gaul is again crucifying the flower of her land in our defense we vacillate. In the dark days to come England, our mother country, may be bombed and burned, her navy, our great safeguard for a hundred years, surrendered perhaps, as the price the surviving British may have to pay for their lives.

The wild, cruel, Asiatic Mongoloid strain throbbing in the virile blood of the barbarians of Germany has created an unscrupulous, high-strung race of few true emotions that Germany stream-lined savages. The palcan boast of authentic history are a warning to the world that the savage marsh dwellers and woodland tribes emerged from ignorance too soon. They must be curbed at any cost, ruthlessly dominated, relentlessly leashed for centuries to come. When the final peace is written let not our sap idealists sabotage the agony-bought termination of this modern thirty years war.

Germany must again be divided into petty, jealous states, stringent tariff barriers erected between them and the rest of

the world. Their customs must be managed by those who are competent to carry the white man's burden, or the Hunnish peoples will rise again as they have risen after only a score of years. The weak treaty of Versailles, emasculated by impractical idealism, was too lenient. It is barely possible that our blatant di-hardards may now realize that they have been gulled for 20 years by Germany's propagandization of the sophistry that the treaty of Versailles was unjust. It was not sufficiently unjust. It is less unjust to confine a pathological murderer in a straight jacket than to turn him loose on his gulfeful expression of contrition.
