DENTISTS OPPOSED TO COMPULSORY HEALTH INSURANCE

PORTLAND, June 22 (U.P.) — The American Dental association is unalterably opposed to compulsory health insurance, Dr. Wilfred H. Robinson of Oakland, Calif., president-elect of the association, told the 47th annual state dental convention Friday night.

Robinson said satisfactory dental service cannot be rendered under a compulsory insurance system. He said the association has given approval to setting up voluntary health insurance systems to provide protection against the costs incurred by dental diseases.

RAILROAD MEN FORM CLUB IN CASCADE AREA

The long awaited Southern Pacific club of Klamath Falls made its initial appearance in the gold room of the Willard hotel on June 20 when representatives of all groups of Southern Pacific employees met for the purpose of election of officers, constitution and by-law framing. Working in conjunction with the S. P. clubs over the Southern Pacific system, the foundation is being laid for a strong permanent organization, which will soon be the largest group of its kind in this part of the country.

The purpose of the organization as stated in the constitution will be "to further the welfare and social activities of Southern Pacific employees, its affiliates and their families." The club will be non-political and non-sectarian in all of its far-reaching activities, and membership will be open to all employees and families of Southern Pacific company, railway express agency, Pacific Fruit express, City Transfer, and the Oregon, California and Eastern railway. The district setup by the club will include Grass Lake to Crescent Lake on the Cascade line, to Likely and Lakeview on the Modoc line, and the OC&E railway.

The meeting, which was called by T. A. Fante, representative of the Brotherhood of Railway clerks, was attended by the following representative committee: J. J. Pex, BRT, J. A. Burke and Sam Oliver, Roundhouse Employees, A. F. Condry, BLE, R. J. Scholthauer, BLE&E, Mrs. R. S. Kemp and Mrs. F. E. Wilkes, Ladies Auxiliary, BRT, M. L. Bratton, store dept., C. J. Van Dutton, traffic dept., E. Wilkes, BRT, L. E. Hubbard, ORC, C. F. Garrett, Carmen, R. G. Stein, clerks.

The purpose of the club, which will be known as the Southern Pacific club of Klamath Falls, was explained by Acting Chairman Fante, and following discussion and explanation of work

to be undertaken, officers were elected as follows: T. A. Fante, president; Floyd E. Wilkes, vice president; C. J. Van Dutton, secretary; Mrs. R. S. Kemp, treasurer; board of trustees, C. F. Garrett, R. G. Stein and Calvin Davis. Several committees were appointed to work on the program of membership, by-laws, etc. Membership, it was stated, was expected to pass the 1000 mark before the drive is long underway, and the club has set 1500 as its goal for membership.

Social activities, welfare work, sports and amusements as devised by the membership in the future will round out the program of the club. A good example of what can be done will be featured by the appearance of the San Francisco club's world famous band which will play at Klamath Falls during Buckaroo days.

Members and officers of other railroad clubs and organizations are lending their support and sending delegates to assist the local officers and committee in the strenuous program that lies ahead.
