Service Club Hears Talk

Mrs. McClelland Talks
At Weekly Meeting
Of Soroptimists

Acting as guide, Sylvia McClelland asked her audience to follow her in thought through a moulding plant Thursday noon at the regular luncheon meeting of the Soroptimist club of Klamath Falls, held at the Willard hotel.

Not least among the interesting vocational talks given by members of the club this year was this trip through a local moulding plant. Starting with the log from which is taken the outside or select part of the lumber and ending with the residue as it is carried to the saw-dust pile, Mrs. McClelland took her audience step by step along the journey.

"The moisture content must be reduced to eight or ten percent," said Mrs. McClelland, "so the lumber before being formed into moulding must be either air dried or kiln dried. Too wet lumber is stringy and lacks smoothness." Among the interesting things told by the speaker was the fact that it took three men to operate a moulder—one man to feed the lumber, one opposite to receive the moulding as it comes from the machine who also grades and trims, and a third man to tie each separate length into bundles. Speaking of the thousands of patterns of moulding in use, she mentioned that this company has knives for making over eighteen hundred different patterns, all of these patterns being made in their own plant.

Explaining the use of so many different patterns, the audience learned that in an ordinary window about fourteen different types of moulds are used. For instance there is first a pulley stile, then a parting bead which goes between the two windows to keep them apart, stops to keep the windows in place, outside and inside casing, window sill on the bottom and a window stool on top of it which projects a little way into the room, screen mould and the screen itself which contains three different patterns of moulding and that generally three different kinds of sash are used to hold the window glass with probably a back band around the inside casing.

Another example of the use of a great variety of patterns is in the beamed ceilings of large hotels where the architect has to devise beauty to hide the utility of steel girders. Here some of the mouldings may be as small as a quarter of an inch thick while some may be as large as six inches wide, all of different patterns.

The speaker brought out the necessity of care in using clean box cars to ship the finished product in order that when it arrives it is free from soot, dirt and moisture. To insure this cars are lined with a heavy grade of paper. The audience was interested to learn that the taste in mouldings differ with varying parts of the United States, the Atlantic seaboard people having a liking for one type, while in St. Louis, Arkansas and the south an entirely different type is used and California will have none of any of these but prefers something entirely different.
