UMPQUA LINK ENDS 57-YEAR ROAD CAMPAIGN

Review, was master of ceremonies and introduced a list of speakers who told the story of the North Umpqua highway's slow progress during more than half a century and expressed the joy felt by the various communities because of its final opening to limited traffic.

High point of the program was presentation by H. P. Bosworth Jr., president of the Klamath county chamber of commerce, of a deed of gift conveying to the Roseburg chamber of commerce a share in Klamath county's interest in the lake now that it can be reached directly from Douglas county instead of by a circuitous route through other Southern Oregon counties.

The deed, inscribed on Klamath pine veneer donated by Don Drury, of the Cal-Pine products company, was accepted by W. C. Harding, secretary of the Roseburg chamber of commerce. Mayor Furness, of Medford, laughingly protested that through the Union Creek highway Jackson county has always felt it had a predominant interest in Diamond lake and so should have some say in its transfer, and this sentiment was good-naturedly echoed by Glenn Jackson, president of the Jackson county chamber of commerce.

Senator C. A. Clark, of Douglas county, representing Governor Sprague, who was unable to be present, told of the importance of the North Umpqua highway in Oregon's scenic setup, and Henry F. Cabell, chairman of the Oregon state highway commission, told of the state's interest in its construction, admitting that it is one highway project that has been carried to near-completion with very little state help. Funds for the highway have come chiefly from Douglas county, the forest service and the CCC.

V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua national forest, introduced James Frankland, of Portland, assistant regional forester, and Col. Harvey Fletcher, regional commandant of the CCC, who told of the work done by the forest service and the Civilian Conservation corps in the construction of the highway. A. C. Marsters, of Roseburg, who was instrumental in obtaining the first survey in 1883, expressed gratification at its opening to traffic. The first survey was financed by a fund of \$600 collected in Roseburg, then a village of 900.

Other speakers were County Judge Morris Bowker, of Douglas county, and Howard Merriam, of Eugene, president of the Pacific Highway association. The new highway, it was announced by V. V. Harpham, Umpqua forest supervisor, will

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istry said the damage was not extensive. One eyewitness said the Germans had resorted to "hit and run" tactics.

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, June 22 (AP) — Italian bomber sprayed explosives over Alexandria's harbor early today in Italy's first attempt to blast the British and French fleet here, but no warships were hit and most of the bombs fell harmlessly into the sea.

Anti-aircraft guns of the British and French fleets went into action when the first group of tri-motored bombers appeared at 1:15 a. m., and British fighter planes went up.

French Still Fight (This dispatch indicated that at least part of the French fleet, whose whereabouts have been unreported since France requested an armistice with Germany and Italy, is still cooperating with the British and is based beside British warships in Alexandria.)

Anti-aircraft fire and fighter planes forced the Italians to veer eastward along Alexandria's waterfront, where civilian casualties were reported.

A British naval communique later said two persons were killed and 23 were injured. The injured included two Italians, the British added.

Libya Bombed Planes approaching from the western desert gave Alexandria its fourth air raid alarm in 24 hours, but anti-aircraft fire turned them back.

British airplanes and soldiers also were active in Africa. The royal air force at Cairo reported a bombardment yesterday at Tobruk, Italian Libya, was followed by the spurt of heavy smoke from a large warship in the harbor.

Also from Cairo came a British report that British forces patrolling the northern Kenya frontier captured an Italian post and destroyed well-stocked barracks. An Italian counter-attack with one armored fighting vehicle was held off while the work was completed, the British said. The British reported three soldiers were slightly wounded.

WILLAMETTE BUS HEARING SLATED

Final hearing on an application of the Greyhound Bus Lines for through passenger service between Weed, Calif., and Eugene, Ore., over the new Willamette highway will be held June 28 in Portland, it was announced here Saturday at the chamber of commerce.

The new service, which would begin as soon as the Willamette highway is opened in August, would bring Greyhound buses through Klamath Falls on regular passenger trips on the new north and south route.

The hearing will be held before the interstate commerce commission at 9 a. m. on the morning of the 28th. Applications for intra-state commerce have already been granted the bus company, it is understood here, but approval of interstate commerce must be obtained before the new service can be started.

LIGHTNING CAUSE OF SMALL FIRE

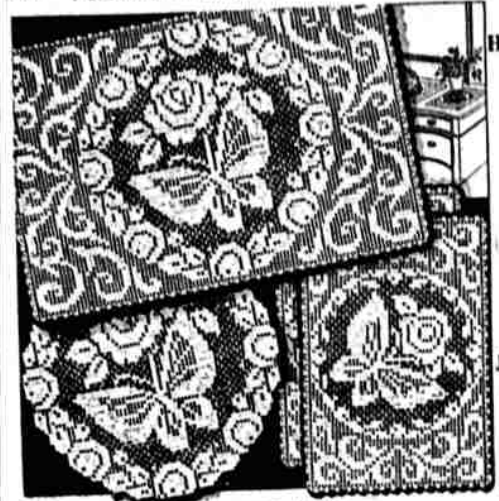

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WAR TO CLOSE WHEN ITALIAN PACT SIGNED

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who agreed to the armistice are leaving by plane for Rome, the announcer said.

Terms Not Listed The terms of the armistice have not been disclosed.

The armistice was reported signed by Col. Gen. Wilhelm Keitel, chief of the German high command, for Germany, and General Charles Huntziger for France, head of the French delegation.

William C. Kerker, the NBC reporter with the German forces, declared in the broadcast that the terms would not be revealed until the Italo-French armistice has been effected and may not be made public then for some time.

Left for Rome Kerker said the hostilities between France and the German armies would cease six hours after the Italo-French pact signing.

He added that the French emissaries left at once for Rome in a plane flown by a German pilot. They will seek a French-Italian settlement as quickly as possible.

Kerker said Adolf Hitler was not at Compiegne for the signing.

Col. Gen. Keitel spoke for the German delegation and General Huntziger for the French.

General Huntziger signed for the French in the two-minute ceremony, the report said. One of the French delegates wept. Col. Gen. Keitel addressed the French with a few words in tribute to the French dead. He requested all members of the French and German delegation to rise in respect for the soldier dead.

The Compiegne negotiations lasted 27 hours and 20 minutes. They were conducted in several sessions between the delegations and long telephone calls on a specially-opened line to the French government at Bordeaux.

AFL CONVENTION DELEGATES LEAVE

Last of the delegates to the 38th annual convention of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, which closed here Friday noon, were leaving local hotels Saturday and banners which had decorated the city during the five-day conclave were cleared from the streets.

Final business of the convention was disposed of Friday afternoon at a meeting of the executive committee, which concurred on one resolution and carried several other measures over until a meeting in September.

there was no cause for alarm, stating that the Japanese were cleaning up Chinese guerrillas. It is understood that Japan shortly will send Britain a demand that she stop arms traffic to China by way of Burma and permit Japanese inspectors there also.

Some extremist elements in Japan declare that this nation must actually occupy Indo-China to protect her interests.

Japanese reaction to President Roosevelt's nomination of Henry L. Stimson as secretary of war generally was unfavorable.

The independent newspaper Yomiuri said that during the Japanese conquest of Manchoukuo, when Stimson was secretary of state, "his hatred of Japan was such that he fairly heaped curses on Britain for evading him when he wanted to attack Japan."

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
