Among the New Books

At the City Library

GENTLEMAN OF STRATFORD, by John Brophy. This is a novel which tells the story of Shakespeare's life, keeping as close to the known facts as possible. It endeavors to interpret the man Shakespeare by a study of his writings. This is a vigorous and convincing enough portrait of the world's greatest poet, and the historical background is well done. Naturally Mr. Brophy has invented freely, but where the facts were known they have been used. This is a book for a comparatively few of the reading public—if history wearies you, you won't be able to stand this for five minutes. Furthermore, if you're irritated by people who quote poetry, or are not interested in imaginative souls, don't waste your time on this. But it is somehow novel and absorbing news that Shakespeare was a human, with many of the foibles of less brilliant men. The authors' conception of the poet does no damage to preconceived notions—merely rounds them out, and completes the picture.

THE GOOD OLD DAYS, by David Cohn. This is a half-serious, half-humorous survey of the contents of the Sears, Roebuck catalogs from 1905 to 1939, as source books for a history of American morals and manners. This is recommended as a book on the immediate past which can hardly be equalled. The illustrations are incredibly funny (it just doesn't seem possible that anyone in their right senses could have appeared in such atrocities.) Mr. Cohn is perhaps a little laborious at times, when goodness knows that wasn't necessary to make this book entertaining. With all its humor, however, this is still a book to be taken seriously. It offers an instructive picture of America as it was a comparatively short time ago and no history could be as vivid. Here is an illustrated account of the styles and sports and cultural interests of all sections of our country, and it should fascinate most readers.

WOLVES AGAINST THE MOON, by Julia Altrochi. Joseph Bailey, heir to great wealth in the Quebec of 1794, felt the call of the open spaces of Canada. Against his family's wishes he became a fur trader, his chain of trading stations ultimately extending from Macinac island to New Orleans. He married the French-Indian girl, Marie, and together they built up a family and a fortune. In the mid-nineteenth century Joseph transferred his activities

to the safer realms of Detroit real estate and lake transportation. This book is half history and half fiction and it is a colorful narrative. There is something rather wild and strange about it, and it is not a novel for the followers of Kathleen Norris and other "nice" stories. For there is bloodshed and suspense here, scenes of cruelty and violence that make you realize that not all the evil is crowded into our lifetime. "Wolves Against the Moon" is an exciting story if you're not too squeamish.

NOT TO MENTION THE WAR, by Elmer Davis. This is a group of essays written for Harper's, the Forum and the Saturday Review of Literature, here collected for book publication with only slight revision. There are 11 essays in all, and nine of them are masterpieces of beautiful prose, stinging wit, and bracing candor. The other two essays may be all of that likewise, but unfortunately the subject matter was beyond me; in self defense I must add that they deal with the logic of history and notes on a new Bible. Mr. Davis has plenty of penetration, and he points his observations with astringent humor; the essay on the Jews entitled "On the Gentility of Gentiles" contains as suave and nasty a jibe at Hitler's treatment of the non-Aryans as any I've seen. In short, Mr. Davis is perfectly capable of being murderous when murder is called for. On the other hand, few people of this age are as deeply cultivated as Elmer Davis, and you will find his book perfectly delightful.
