

HOMEMAKERS PLAN ROCKY POINT CAMP

The homemakers' vacation camp for Klamath and Jackson counties will be held from July 14 through July 18 at Rocky Point instead of Lake o' the Woods as formerly announced, according to Winnifred K. Gillen, home demonstration agent.

Registrations are being accepted at Mrs. Gillen's office, 208 Federal building, and all homemakers in Klamath county are eligible to participate. The fee for the entire period is \$5, one dollar of which is due July 1 as a registration fee.

The Klamath county camp committee includes Mrs. Bert Schultz, and Mrs. Lee Holliday. This committee and Mrs. Gillen will meet the Jackson county camp committee at Rocky Point on Wednesday to make detailed plans for the camp.

This is one of 13 different camps in Oregon to be directed through the extension service of the state college this summer. In practically all of these camps the forest service and local organizations are cooperating in making the camp possible. Counties which are scheduled to hold camps are Benton, Clackamas, Columbia, Deschutes, Jackson, Josephine, Lane, Linn, Marion, Malheur, Multnomah, Washington and Klamath.

In each camp a home demonstration agent or specialist in home economics will direct activities and will be assisted by local staff members who will provide instruction. Every camper will be free to spend her time as she wishes. Instruction in crafts will be provided for those who wish to participate. It is desired that this be a real vacation for everyone who comes.

KLAMATH INVITED TO SEND BUNDLES FOR BRITAIN

Interested Klamath people are invited to participate in the "Bundles for Britain" campaign, according to Mrs. Nelson Reed, who has been in touch with Portlanders in charge of Bundles for Britain in Oregon.

Mrs. Reed has a limited supply of yarn for knitting garments for British fighting forces. A total of \$20,000 worth of raw yarn has been knitted since January in the campaign. The garments go particularly to men on trawlers and warships, most of it through a bureau in London. There is no overhead cost.

President O. D. Matthews announced the appointment of Les Finley as director in charge of the chutes, and this is a hard job any way you look at it. Unless the stock comes out of the chutes in rapid fire order, the show is slow, and any rodeo which fails to zoom right along loses the necessary thrill.

Director J. E. Hosking is working out plans for the dances to be given each night of the show. Dewey Powell, secretary of the committee, was in charge of the queen's contest and will be on hand to take care of entries, the pay off and other secretarial work which keeps the committee working far into the night each day of the show.

Advertising and making up the program is being done this week by George Barth. The program will be distributed each day of the show and will contain numerous cuts including those of Queen Nora and the five princesses, and directors.

Appearance here of the 65-piece Southern Pacific band with its majorette, one of the finest in the west, is anticipated by rodeo fans. Assistant majorettes will be two Klamath girls, Gale and Dale Motley, twin sisters, who appeared with the Klamath Union high school band last year.
