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one, just now," Richey replied.

When reporters asked what the "just now" meant, Richey said:

"Oh, of course I can't tell you what he might think or do tomorrow. I'm just telling you there's nothing to the story you ask me about."

While the platform was being read in the big convention hall, Willkie announced from his headquarters that Gov. Harold Stassen of Minnesota, who earlier today announced his support of the utilities executive, would act as his floor manager when voting starts on presidential nominations.

Stassen, Willkie said, will be aided by Governors Raymond Baldwin of Conn., Ralph Carr of Colorado, and Reps. Charles Halleck of Indiana, Frank Horton of Wyoming, and Bruce Barton of New York.

As for himself, Hoover told reporters he was not seeking public office. But he said there should be no interference with the selection of a nominee and would not say he would not accept the nomination himself if it were offered.

Sarcasm, Ridicule

The former president, speaking last night for more than an hour, analyzed his view of what was wrong with President Roosevelt's policies.

Upon those policies he poured sarcasm and ridicule and such epithets as "stabilizing depression," "the flabbiness of the new deal," and "totalitarian liberals."

Defense Only

In a section dealing with foreign policy, prepared later than other portions of his address, Mr. Hoover asserted that "there is no such thing as our isolation from wars which envelop two-thirds of all the people in the world."

However, he said, "the most vital realism in all our relations requires that we keep out of these wars unless the western hemisphere is attacked."

Mr. Hoover told the delegates that "the first responsibility of the president of the United States is to abate war, not to stimulate it."

Dangerous Talk

"It is not the province of the president of the United States to create hate," he added. "Irresponsible talk in explosive times may bring danger."

Japan meanwhile was reported preparing a sweeping pronouncement that would be tantamount to an oriental Monroe doctrine. The Tokyo newspaper Asahi said the proclamation would warn all powers against interference of any kind in all territories in east Asia.

Both White House and state department turned aside questions about the fleet with cryptic remarks that they had no news. Other sources were equally non-committal.

Undetermined was whether the big battle force was steaming toward the United States mainland, for South American waters, or farther out toward the orient.

Some diplomatic quarters, however, found it difficult to reconcile withdrawal of the fleet with the repeated insistence of the government on maintenance of the status quo in the Pacific.

The British forays were described as "successful reconnaissance of enemy coastlines."

Diversion Move

Neutral military observers expressed belief that the coastal raids by British expeditionary force shock troops might become so active as to keep the German army diverted from invasion of Britain.

No one regards the raids as preliminary to a large-scale thrust against the German army which now holds North Sea, channel and Atlantic coastlines.

But the neutral sources emphasize the damage which the RAF and the shock troops could do in repeated attacks.

Destruction

British observers said it was quite possible that the first raiding parties included demolition groups especially schooled in destruction of supply depots, docks and quays.

"Our parties may have attacked one of the numerous submarine bases which the Germans have constructed in Belgium, as they did in the last war," said a naval informant.

Another commented that "the Germans obviously are resting the crack troops who fought steadily for almost a month."

The announcement of the raids gave but scant detail.

"Landings were effected at a number of points and contact made with German troops," the ministry of information said.

"Casualties were inflicted and some enemy dead fell into our hands. Much useful information was obtained. Our forces suffered no casualties."

Air Raids

These thrusts into the German camp—the precise spots were not given—were made while British and German air forces clashed in the expanding struggle in the skies which is seen as a prelude to the actual battle of Britain.

Official sources, besieged with requests for some explanation of the landings, refused further to identify the raiders or even hint in what country they had landed.

The aerial conflict brought another onslaught on the British Isles today and British reports of a victory in a battle of planes and bombardment of German-occupied air bases in Norway and The Netherlands.

Scotland bore the brunt of Germany's fifth midnight-to-dawn attack in eight days. At least four English and Scottish civilians were killed and at least five of the raiders shot down. The attack covered a wide area of England, Scotland, Wales.

The British declared they lost no planes.

Another unit of the royal air force made a daylight attack yesterday on an airdrome at Waalhaven, near Rotterdam, in The Netherlands, and still another raided an airdrome at Bommen, near Bergen, Norway.
