

McShain's Somersaults Beat Dude

WHEELER AT BAT

There might have been movie cameras grinding Tuesday night at Recreation Park when Roy Wheeler, shortstop for Lowell's softball nine and an old-timer in Klamath baseball circuits, stepped to the newly christened plate.

True, the efficient Lowell batsmen had a 6-0 edge over their nightcap opponents, Kalpine, and it was only the fourth inning. Otherwise the setting was perfect. Jack Lloyd was fidgeting on third, Paul Bernadou on second, and Marshall Eystone, one of the heavy hitters of the Dorris-Klamath Lumberjacks' lineup, had just been passed to first.

That made Wheeler a hero of the contest when he squarely met the offering of the Kalpine hurler and whammed out a homer into the shadows against the fence just inside the first baseline. Left Fielder Derrah of the Kalpine crew took it on the first bounce off the newly white-washed boards.

This was not, however, the first legitimate home run in 1940 competition. Honor of going out that four-base clout goes to Swisher, hefty left fielder for Copco, who tallied his homer in the first inning of the Copco-Elks game.

Clyde Carlstrom, playing right field for Lowell, traveled around the four bases in the third inning of the nightcap contest, but was aided and abetted by an error in Kalpine's left field by Ray Derrah, who muffed Carlstrom's drive.

BRIDGES HANDLES THIRD

Some of the prettiest infield work of the Lowell-Kalpine contest was turned in by Dave Bridges, Kalpine third baseman. The Mills school physical education teacher handled a number of hot ones in the air and muffed but one fielding chance.

Kujack, Kalpine right fielder, also handled a host of fielding chances, making several hard catches on the dead run.

FANCY TWIRLING

Fanciest twirling of the evening was turned in by Ray Genesee, Los Angeles boy who pitched for the third-place Kesterson crew last year. He took the mound in the fourth from Aiello, another former Kesterson hurler, and gave the fans and the Lowell sluggers entertainment for the rest of the evening.

With better control, Genesee would serve the fastest and most startling ball in the league. His windup never runs twice the same. Sometimes he cuts loose from the bottomside of one fast, verticle whirl, and the next time he wraps his long right arm around his head, nicking his left ear in double-jointed style, then turning loose his sizzler before the man at the platter knows where, or when, it's headed his way.

Champs Line Up For Men's Play

SEATTLE, June 26 (AP) — A fancy array of champions, former champions and would-be champions was lined up Wednesday for the start of four days of grueling match play in the Pacific northwest men's amateur at the Broadmoor Golf club.

Harry Givan of Seattle, recently crowned British Columbia amateur champion, had no chance to rest from gleaming medalist honors with a 72-67-139 and was matched against Lloyd Byerly of Portland, Oregon state champion, in one of the day's top events.

Bud Ward of Spokane, the national amateur champion who last week won the northwest open for the second straight year, was second low qualifier with a 71-69-140 — even par — and was to meet six-foot-four Ralph Whaley of Seattle, who may have to use his bow and arrows, at which he is even more proficient than golf clubs, if he hopes to wing the tournament and gallery favorite.

Jack Westland, 1938-39 northwest amateur titlist, stakes the works in his match against the deeply tanned Jack Burns of Yakima, while Scotty Campbell, the Washington state champion, plays 58-year-old George Butterfield of Seattle, oldest man in the tournament, who is 58.

ANGRY PRINCE TAGS WAGNER IN CLOSE ONE

Danny McShain can thank Dude Chick's bad leg for his victory in last night's main event on the armory wrestling card. That and a new somersault hold accounted for two falls after Dude had won the first tilt.

Other events on the program saw Prince Nihalakis, angered at his failure to get a good grip on George Wagner, a newcomer here, wade in with fists flying and grab the winning fall in the opener, and saw Frankie Clemens, Indian wonder boy, win in straight falls, one on a foul, over Jimmy Goodrich, Notre Dame griddler.

Asks For Trouble
McShain really asked for trouble as the main event started, by using fists and chokeholds on Chick, who is always a dangerous man to get rough with. Chick took the best the Irishman could ladle out and then smashed McShain to the canvas for the first fall with about three applications of his airplane scissors.

McShain, however, evened things up after some seven minutes of meanness and wrestling which wound up with a toehold that had the added efficiency of a series of somersaults that twisted his victim around the ring.

The same hold won the deciding fall immediately after Chick's fatal lariat spin had folded up because his right leg wouldn't hold up after a long series of McShain's stampings and twistings.

Arabian Jolted
Another fancy toehold accounted for the middle fall in the curtain raiser when George Wagner, whose specialty seems to consist of various means of flipping his opponents over his head, brought Prince Nihalakis jolting to the mat several times in succession by putting the Arabian in a stepover toehold and then diving headfirst into a complete somersault.

Nihalakis did some fancy work himself in spite of being thrown right and left about the ring and won the first fall with a complicated double leg hold. He also won the final fall when his third attempt at a crabhold succeeded after he had softened Wagner up in a hugging match.

Frankie Clemens was on the receiving end of a good deal of punishment at the hands of Jimmy Goodrich before he finally came out on top. Goodrich's favorite hold was an armbreaker that he used for most of the match. Clemens slipped out of one of them to win the first fall with a rolling figure four scissors and was awarded the deciding tumble on a foul called by Referee Bobby Chick when numerous warnings failed to deter Goodrich from breaking Frankie's arm over the ropes.

Numerous challenges to the winner of the main event were recorded by Announcer Jack Franey, including those of Prince Nihalakis, Ernie Piluso and Bulldog Jackson.

STARS WALLOP OAKS 19 TO 0 WITH 16 HITS

The Hollywood Stars staged a super-colossal movietown hitting extravaganza Tuesday night and the Oakland A's of the Pacific Coast Baseball league found themselves on the short end of a 19 to 0 score.

The hapless Oaks contributed little except the comedy element as they gave up 16 hits and 12 bases on balls and committed four errors.

While Pitchers Cotton Poppen and Lefty Verne Johnson were ducking baseballs off Hollywood bats, Bill Fleming of the Stars held the Oaks to six scattered bingles.

Outfielder George Mandish homered with bases loaded in the sixth. He and Fleming each got three hits and batted in five runs. Infielder Bob Kahle scored five personally.

The Seattle Rainiers widened their margin of league leadership by trimming San Diego handily, 4 to 1. It was their seventh straight win, their 13th in 14 starts. Kewpie Dick Barrett gave the Padres six hits.

Still skidding, the Sacramento Senators slumped into seventh place by dropping a 7 to 0 shut-out to the tail-end Portland Beavers. The Sacs got just four safeties off Ray "Hardluck" Harrell, who struck out 12.

San Francisco climbed to the top of the second division by coming from behind to curb the Los Angeles Angels, 5 to 4.

The Seals' new shortstop pride, Froilan Fernandez, from Wilmington, Calif., via Yakima in the western international league, maintained his .500 batting average for his three coast league appearances by rapping out a double and a single in four tries.

It was taken off the fence on the first bounce by Derrah, Kalpine left fielder. 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Pirates Wallop Phillies, 9-7; Yanks Defeated

NEW YORK, June 26 (AP) —

It seemed Tuesday that Manager Frankie Frisch had at last found the success formula for his Pittsburgh Pirates.

Baseball men began to fear for the sanity of the former St. Louis Cardinal manager after the first few weeks of the 1940 baseball season had gone into the record and Frisch's new charges had registered exactly six victories in 24 games. During that miserable streak, which included a nine-game losing string, Frisch watched only five pitchers go the full distance, three for winning efforts.

Over the Lot

Tuesday the Pirates, perhaps imbued with some of the "fight" associates of Frisch's fiery record, slammed the Philadelphia Phillies all over the lot for a 9-7 triumph which gave them undisputed possession of fifth place in the National league.

St. Louis at New York and Cincinnati at Boston were rained out.

In the American league, the Cleveland Indians took a page out of the Yankee book, defeating the champions on three home runs. Rain shortened the game to five innings after the Indians had taken a two-run lead on Hal Trosky's 17th homer and singles by Beau Bell and Ken Keltner.

The Detroit Tigers split a doubleheader with the Boston Red Sox to remain in second place, 1 1/2 games in front of the Sox.

Led by Lou Finney, who connected for four hits, the Red Sox slammed out 15 basehits for an 11-7 win in the first game. Young Hal Newhouse held the Sox to four hits for his fifth victory as the Tigers won the nightcap, 5-1.

In the three night games played in the major leagues the St. Louis Browns walloped the Philadelphia Athletics, 12-10. Washington shaded Chicago, 7-8.

and Chicago's Cubs beat the Brooklyn Dodgers, 8-3 in 13 innings.

The Browns rushed over 12 runs in the last three innings to win their game and move into fourth place in the American league over the Yankees, who dropped to fifth.

Sid Hudson, freshman pitcher star of the Senators won his second straight as he held the White Sox to nine hits before 21,223.

A five-hit outburst in the 13th on three hits, a walk and an error won for the Cubs before 26,104 at Ebbets field. The loss dropped Brooklyn to two full games behind the leading Reds.

Portland Vet Gets Release
