

VISITOR SAYS ANTI-BRIDGES MOVE DOOMED

Efforts to deport Harry Bridges, west coast CIO leader and head of the International Longshoremen's union, in a movement now under way in congress will be stopped in the senate, it was predicted here Thursday by R. L. Randall, roving reporter for the three CIO labor publications of the Pacific coast.

Arriving for a week's visit in the Klamath basin to gather material for labor articles, Randall said the CIO is solidly organized in defense of Bridges against "congressional persecution."

"The movement to deport Bridges is a bill of attainder and therefore unconstitutional," Randall said. "Men on the coast consider his persecution not an attack on the man but an attack on union conditions. The movement will be stopped in the senate."

Randall, a member of the National Maritime union, said another issue solidly supported by organized labor is the movement for five-year contracts for waterfront employees. In this connection he said both seamen and shippers are suffering from war conditions in that there is a shortage of ships brought about by transfer of vessels to foreign registry.

Randall said the two centers of organizational activity on the Pacific coast for the CIO are the Klamath basin and the upper Willamette valley. He is particularly interested in getting material here on increased organizational work and on the current Lamm Lumber company strike.

The three publications Randall serves are the Timberworker, at Seattle; the Labor New Dealer, and the Voice of the Federation, at San Francisco.

GAIN SHOWN IN HOOVER '40 POLL

Results of a poll of registered voters in 14 states showing that if Franklin D. Roosevelt and Herbert Hoover were drafted as the respective nominees for the presidency again this year, Mr. Roosevelt would gain 16.7 per cent over his 1932 total and Mr. Hoover would lose 14.2 per cent of his 1932 vote were made public today by four prominent New York and New Jersey republicans.

The poll covered democrats and republicans of more than 100 scattered communities in 14 states, with questionnaires mailed to every tenth or twelfth voter on the official voting list. More than 40,000 returns were received. They revealed that in every community Mr. Roosevelt's vote as compared with

1932 would be smaller and that of Mr. Hoover larger, although Mr. Hoover is not a candidate. The results of the poll were announced today by Richard W. Lawrence, publisher of Printer's Ink, Mrs. Ruth Pratt, former member of congress from New York; Everett Colby, former republican national committee man from New Jersey, and John Jay Hopkins, former assistant to the secretary of the treasury.

DON BENTLEY ARRESTED ON U. S. CHARGE

Don Bentley, who operates on the old Frank Hoover ranch on Spring creek near Chiloquin, was placed under arrest by federal authorities Thursday on a charge growing out of alleged use of government cattle in a rodeo.

In custody of Indian Officer John Arkell, Bentley was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Burt C. Thomas Thursday morning and was ordered held in lieu of \$5000 bond. He was represented by Attorney J. C. O'Neill.

The federal statute involved in the case provides a maximum sentence of \$10,000 or 10 years for stealing, purloining or committing depredations against property of the United States. Bentley is alleged to have rounded up Indian cattle, in which the government had an interest, for use in a rodeo. The case is said to be unprecedented here.

The bond of \$5000 was set on the request of United States District Attorney Carl Donagh, through Officer Arkell. Attorney O'Neill urged a lower bail, pointing out that the defendant has a wife and four small children. Commissioner Thomas said he will reduce the bail if so recommended by Donagh.

O'Neill asked for a hearing, which will not be held before July 9.

Bentley is well known in this area as a buckaroo, entering both professional and amateur events.
