Reds Extend Drive

In The Day's News

IF you were pulling for Willkie, don't celebrate. PRAY. If he wins in November, he'll need your prayers.

No President since Lincoln has faced a task comparable to that which will confront Willkie if he is elected.

(EVEN if one leaves the war out of consideration, Willkie's task, if elected, will be immense. He must yank us out of pleasant dreams of something for nothing, of working less and having more, and bring us back to realities. And MAKE US LIKE IT. If we don't like it, we'll throw him out.)

WENDELL WILLKIE'S nomination, in sober reality, was an answer to prayer—the prayers of millions of people who wanted an outspoken, sincere, able MAN; not just another politician peddling ancient political patter.

It was these unspoken prayers, pulsing in the air of the convention hall at Philadelphia, that brought about Willkie's nomination. Politician-minded delegates knew they dared not go home and face the people if they disregarded what was coming to them so plainly.

WILLKIE, speaking after the vote that made him the Republican nominee, said simply: "I'm very appreciative. I'm very HUMBLE."

He spoke undoubtedly from the heart. When a man is given a spontaneous outpouring of confidence and good will from millions of people, as Willkie was, it must leave him humble—humble and fiercely determined to GIVE EVERYTHING THAT IS IN HIM to deserve the confidence so dramatically displayed.

AS these words are written, the convention is proceeding toward the choice of a vice-president. Its overwhelming desire appears to be to name McNary of Oregon.

Greece Signs Trade Treaty With Germany

BERLIN, June 28 (AP-Via Radio)—Greece and Germany signed an economic agreement today by which Germany obtains goods of particular interest to the reich, the German wireless reported on advices from Athens.

In addition to the unspecified goods going to the reich, Germany will ship coal to Greece in return for Greek ore. The agreement covers one year.

(Greece is the second country which was aligned with Britain and France to sign an economic agreement recently with Germany. Her neighbor Turkey has concluded a trade pact with the reich.)

TURKISH FLEET TO PROTECT GATEWAY

Warships Stripped for Action in Defense of Dardanelles

ISTANBUL, Turkey, June 28 (AP)—The Turkish fleet, fully fueled, loaded with munitions and stripped for action, moved into the Black Sea today, ready to defend the Dardanelles against any attack.

The first Turkish naval movement was reported last night in Ankara when it was disclosed that a naval squadron had steamed through the Bosphorus to the Black Sea.

Turkey was said to feel deep concern over Russia's demands on Rumania which were reported to have included naval bases on the Black Sea and Danube river as well as the province of Bessarabia and northern Bucovina.

The fleet was headed by the battle cruiser Yavuz. It represented approximately two-thirds of the total Turkish naval strength.

The warships turned northward and were expected to cruise past the southern Bulgarian coast as a warning that Turkey is ready to defend herself. The ships were expected to make no "provocative" demonstrations.

Hungary Starts Campaign Against Rumania With "Gangster" Charges

BUCHAREST, June 28 (AP)—Officials of the German legation charged today that the soviet Russian move into Rumania was a trick "inspired by Britain," to create a new warfront but they declared Germany is avoiding any such trap.

BUCHAREST, June 28 (AP)—Soviet troops occupying ceded parts of Rumania moved today beyond those areas into old Rumania itself.

After taking over Cernauti, a city yielded by King Carol in his surrender to the Russian ultimatum, they swept into Dorohoi, a town in the province of Moldavia.

Urgent Appeal
As soon as this news seeped out, the Rumanian government filed an urgent appeal with the German minister that Berlin put hard pressure on Moscow to halt the red advance and force the Russians to retire to the line named in their original, and accepted, demand.

All this was not the end of this unhappy country's troubles. Budapest informants advised that while Hungarian official quarters were denouncing as "typical Rumanian gangsterism" published reports of a Russian ultimatum to Hungary, a campaign against Rumania was opened in the officially inspired Hungarian press.

Alarm Only
The papers there asserted that the Bucharest newspapers had published the story about a Russian ultimatum against Rumania only to alarm the Rumanian people "and make them think that other people are also in trouble."

Red Cross Goal Of \$4000 for Klamath Passed

Klamath county's American Red Cross war relief goal of \$4000 was achieved this week and contributions are still pouring in, it was announced Friday by Earl B. Redman, chairman of the Klamath county Red Cross chapter.

To date a total of \$4244.57 has been collected under the voluntary campaign being conducted locally. Klamath county is the second county in the state to go over the top, it was made known by Red Cross officials, Coos county being the only unit in Oregon to reach their goal earlier.

A. L. Schafer, Red Cross manager for the Pacific coast area, sent a wire to Chairman Redman and Vern Owens, vice-chairman, expressing his "sincere congratulations and deep appreciation" for the success of the Klamath county campaign. Contributions are still being gratefully received despite the fact that the goal has been passed, Red Cross officials said.

Willkie Promises Aggressive Campaign for American Unity

CONVENTION HALL, Philadelphia, June 28 (AP)—Promising to conduct "an aggressive and fighting campaign," Wendell Willkie told the republican national convention today "democracy and our way of life is facing its most crucial test."

He pledged to "join with you in this great crusade" to preserve American institutions in this "last firm untouched foothold of freedom in all the world."

"I call upon you to join me, help me. We cannot fail if we stand together in one united front," Willkie said.

Delegates and galleries shouted, cheered and stamped their applause for the newly nominated presidential candidate. Hair tousled and perspiration pouring from his face under brilliant lights above, Willkie greeted the delegates who had named a ticket of Willkie and McNary for the 1940 campaign.

Opening his remarks with praise for the impartiality and fairness with which Chairman Joseph W. Martin of Massachusetts had presided over the convention, and closing with a remark that he was "going to sleep for a week," the dynamic utilities executive said:

"As your nominee I stand before you without a single pledge or promise or understanding of any kind except the advancement of your cause and the preservation of American democracy."



Wendell Willkie (left), who climaxed one of the strangest political careers in history by winning the presidential nomination, and Senator Charles McNary, Oregon's favorite son who polled a landslide vote as the choice for vice president, will head the republican forces in the November election. Willkie, a former democrat, was unheard of in political circles a little over a month ago, but McNary has maneuvered the republican senatorial forces for years. Willkie undermined the voting strength of Thomas Dewey and then of Robert Taft for five ballots before winning a unanimous vote at the end of the sixth roll call.

SALEM JUBILANT AT M'NARY CHOICE

Governor Wires Support for New GOP Ticket; Capitol Excited

SALEM, June 28 (AP)—Charlie McNary's home town was jubilant today when the republican national convention chose him as its vice-presidential candidate.

But Gov. Sprague, who started the McNary presidential campaign last October 7 in a speech to Oregon young republicans at The Dalles, was the happiest of all.

"Just think," the governor said, "a few days ago we were dreaming about what a great thing it would be if Charlie were chosen as a vice-presidential candidate. It seemed remote then, but now that dream has come true."

The governor, although the Oregon delegation to the republican national convention wouldn't agree with him, had visions of a Willkie-McNary ticket. The delegation wouldn't support Willkie, and it resented the governor's telegram Wednesday urging support of Willkie if McNary couldn't win the presidential nomination.

Little business was transacted in the capitol buildings today, as state officials and employees anxiously awaited the news that "Charlie" was placed on the ticket.

After pledging his "loyal support" in a telegram to Wendell Willkie, the governor sent the following telegram to McNary: "Heartily congratulations on your nomination as vice president. Salem and Oregon are proud of this recognition of you and commend you for agreeing to serve as nominee. I pledge my loyal support to the ticket."

CANADIAN LOSS

McNary Takes 'Good Soldier' View of Race

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—Senator Charles McNary of Oregon, accepted the vice presidential nomination of the republican convention today.

Informed of his nomination as the republican vice presidential entry, McNary said: "Of course I'm proud of the confidence reposed in me by the convention. I wish they'd imposed the chore on someone else but I'll be a good soldier and do the best I can."

While he has "never met Wendell Willkie," his running mate, McNary declared that Willkie was an "excellent presidential candidate," that the convention had prepared a "very good platform" and that the "ticket should be successful in November."

McNary is extremely popular in his home state. In the May primary, he got more votes for president than President Roosevelt and Vice President Garner combined.

His friends say "Charlie isn't much of a talker, but he's a mighty good listener." When he is in his beloved Oregon, where he was born 66 years ago, he tours the state talking to farmers about their problems.

He has served in the senate since 1917. McNary never had much trouble being reelected until 1936, but even then, he survived the Roosevelt landslide and won by 9000 votes.

Ham 'n Eggs Fail To Get on Ballot

SACRAMENTO, Calif., June 28 (AP)—Californians will not have a chance to vote next November on the "Ham and Eggs" old age pension plan which they have twice defeated. The initiative failed to qualify by midnight for the ballot.

FIRST BALLOT GIVES OREGON MAN POSITION

New Yorker Ends Strange Campaign With Cheers Ringing in Hall

CONVENTION HALL, Philadelphia, June 28 (AP)—The republican national convention adjourned its five-day session at 4 p. m. (EST) today.

A convention that had stampered to nominate Willkie for the presidency in the early morning hours, chose McNary for his running mate on the first ballot of its final session.

Big Vote
The Oregon senator, who is republican leader of the senate, received 890 votes to 108 for Rep. Dewey Short of Missouri, and two for Senator Styles Bridges of New Hampshire.

In a brief speech which brought delegates to their feet cheering, Short said this was the time to bury "personal ambitions" and work for a united party in the campaign to capture the White House. On Short's motion, McNary's nomination was made unanimous.

Accepted
In Washington, McNary announced his acceptance of the nomination although previously he had expressed reluctance to do so.

Shortly before they met, Willkie had outlined to reporters what he regarded as the outstanding issues of the campaign. He listed them as "national unity, building an adequate national defense and rehabilitation of the national economy."

Other plans for the campaign were being developed rapidly. Formal notification ceremonies probably will be held at Elwood, Indiana, Willkie's birthplace.

Petersen-Johnson Employs Settle Brief Labor Rift

A brief, orderly strike at the Petersen-Johnson lumber mill, east of Quartz mountain, was adjusted by negotiation Thursday after both day and night crews remained off the job for a short time, it was made known here Friday by Joe Boyd and Mike Pavolka, AFL organizers in the Klamath country. The AFL has a union shop agreement with the mill.

The strike was brought about because of the discharge of a trimmer man whose name was not learned in Klamath Falls. According to Boyd, the man was entitled, by negotiation, to pay of 75 cents per hour and was receiving only 65 cents before his discharge, which Boyd asserted came without cause.

The local plant committee negotiated with company officials but the case was deadlocked. The men struck, by a 70 per cent action, to protest the discharge, and the night crew remained off the job Wednesday night. The day crew reported at 11 a. m. Thursday after an agreement had been worked out at a meeting of the plant committee and Marius Petersen, company manager. Boyd said the dispute was adjusted quickly and amicably and the trimmer man was rehired at a wage of 75 cents.
