

NORTHWESTERN DELEGATES IN FINAL TUSSLE

PHILADELPHIA, June 28 (AP)—Delegates from the three Pacific northwest states and Alaska fought against the nomination of Wendell Willkie until the bitter end last night, Oregon and Washington even requiring roll calls by the convention chairman to settle arguments as to whom they were voting for after Willkie's nomination had been assured.

But when the smoke of battle cleared, members of the delegations praised the republican presidential nominee and promised him their support.

Idaho and Oregon joined the rising tide and finally turned their support unanimously to the nominee but the Washington and Alaska delegations had to be forced by the unanimous action of the entire convention.

Washington wound up with three different totals on the last ballot. When Washington was called after Willkie had already been nominated and Ohio had turned its 52 Taft votes to the New Yorker, Chairman Nat Brown announced 11 Willkie votes, 1 Taft and 4 not voting.

Ralph Horr jumped to the mike and demanded the convention chairman call the roll of the Washington delegation. The roll showed Willkie 10, Taft 4, Dewey 1 and not voting 1.

At the last minute Brown announced Washington wanted to be recorded as voting 15 for Willkie with one absent. Cameron Sherwood had declined to vote and so was marked absent.

Alaska's last ballot gave Willkie 2 and Taft 1. Chairman Albert White declined to divulge how his delegates voted individually.

The Oregonians had trouble making up their minds on the final ballot but finally climbed aboard the bandwagon with the unanimous count. The first announcement on the sixth ballot was Willkie, 10.

Chairman Walter L. Tooe then demanded the delegation be polled. This vote showed Willkie 7, Taft 3. After Willkie was nominated Tooe asked that the Oregon vote be tabulated as unanimous.

Idaho hung solidly to Dewey for four ballots but the shift came when one delegate voted for Hoover on the fifth tally. Six swung to Taft, two for Willkie on the last ballot. With Willkie's nomination Chairman Stanley A. Easton asked to make it unanimous.

Oregon had supported its favorite son, Sen. Charles McNary for three ballots. On the fourth ballot W. E. Sawyer changed to Dewey and Walter Norblad to Willkie. Sawyer switched back to McNary on the fifth ballot.

Washington opened its voting this way: Dewey 13, Taft 3. The next three ballots showed Dewey 12, Taft 3, Vandenberg 1.

On the fifth ballot dogfight between Taft and Willkie, Horr, with the aid of Charles Taft, brother of the candidate who visited the Washington section,

swung the entire delegation of 16 to Taft.

Willkie was nominated on the sixth ballot just ahead of Washington's call when Pennsylvania announced it was ready to record its previously passed vote and Willkie went over the top.

However, this failed to stop Washington from calling the roll and arguing how to record its final figures.

After the session the nominee was hailed as a great man worthy of support in November by various Pacific northwest delegates and leaders.

Here's some of their comments:

Bill Reed, Seattle, national committeeman: He's the best nominee in years. I am convinced he can carry the nation this fall, including the western states. I am sure people of Washington will find his views on tariff and reciprocal trade very satisfactory. I have been strong for Willkie all along. All of the permanent officials of the Washington republican party who have been here have favored Willkie all through the convention.

Nat Brown, Washington: We got an outstanding man of America for the presidency. Although we were anxious to honor Thomas Dewey, we are all satisfied with the result and will get behind Willkie 100 per cent. Those of us who have met Willkie know he will appeal to all classes of voters.

Ralph Horr, Washington: While I have been an ardent supporter of Taft, I recognize the fact we nominated a man with unusual ability and whom I believe represents the best interests of America. I will do all in my power to assist in electing Willkie.

Walter Tooe, Oregon: He is

our candidate and we will go down the line for him.

Stanley Easton, Idaho: His nomination will be very popular in our state. We have heard from friends and constituents who wanted him. His selection meets with great approval. Willkie is a western sympathizer.

Thomas Heath, Idaho: It was the will of the convention and all will be in there pitching to lick the new deal. Idaho will support Willkie.

David Sweeney, Idaho, chairman of the Idaho Young Republicans: Young Republicans will abide the decision and support him 100 per cent.

FIRST FATALITY MARS BRIDGE JOB

TACOMA, June 28 (AP)—After 19 months of hazardous construction and with only three days remaining before the Tacoma Narrows bridge is finished and opened to traffic, the first death on the \$6,000,000 span was recorded today.

Fred Wild, 56, of Tacoma, died last night of injuries suffered Wednesday when he fell 12 feet from a ledge on a bridge approach.

During dangerous construction work—sinking piers 120 feet into tide-torn water, erecting catwalks and the bridgeway while working 175 feet over the water—there were no serious accidents.
