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DEATH CLAIMS LIN ANDERSON OF KENO AREA

Death called another early Klamath county pioneer resident late Wednesday night, June 26, with the passing of Leon Wilred "Lin" Anderson, resident of the Spencer creek district near Keno for the past 46 years. Mr. Anderson was past 63 years at the time of his death and had lived on the Anderson homestead since he was 17. He died in Klamath Valley hospital following a 10-day illness resulting from an attack of pneumonia.

Following the death of Mr. Anderson's mother in Ashland, his father brought him and his eight brothers and sisters to Spencer creek where he lived the remainder of his life. On February 13, 1901, "Lin" Anderson and Miss Nellie Spencer, daughter of Eugene and Elizabeth Spencer, pioneers of this section, were married and left shortly after the ceremony for the valley.

The bride and groom were snowed in at Jenny creek for 18 days and finally returned on horseback to their home, abandoning their buggy in the road until the heavy snows melted in mid-April. Old timers remember snow was eight feet deep at Jenny creek that winter, and five and one-half feet deep in the Keno section.

Mr. Anderson was a rancher, a former stage driver from the Parker Mountain station to Klamath Falls, and also drove freight wagons from Pokemong to Keno for Sam Padgett's store in Keno.

The old Spencer ranch was formerly known as the Wampus postoffice, and before the roads Mr. Anderson carried mail on horseback from that point to and from Pokemong. The Wampus postoffice is now the Jung Spencer place. The Anderson homestead was located next to the Spencer ranch.

Mr. Anderson was born in Hamilton, Ore., February 24, 1877. He is survived by his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Esther M. Simmers of this city; a son, Merle W., of Keno; two sisters, Mrs. Zora Biehn of this city; Mrs. Bertha McGillivray of Bremerton, Wash., and one brother, Chester, of Linden, the only surviving son of Mr. Anderson.

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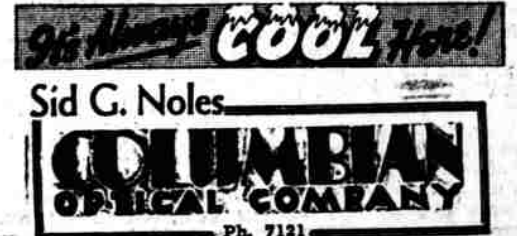
