BRITISH ORDER EVACUATION OF CIVILIAN AREA

(Continued from Page One) sent to Australia or New Zealand.

TOKYO, June 29 (AP)—Foreign Minister Hachiro Arita warned the western powers today to make no move which might upset the status quo in East Asia or the South Seas and emphasized that the future of these regions is "a matter of grave concern to Japan."

Arita, who delivered his warning in a radio broadcast to the empire, clearly enunciated an oriental "Monroe doctrine" in which he envisaged East Asia "uniting under a single sphere" with Japan as the "stabilizing force."

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Mackay's report came from the American export liner Excalibur, somewhere in the Mediterranean en route to the United States. The Excalibur received its information from the British coastal wireless station GYW.

The message placed the attack approximately 500 miles southwest of the southern coast of Ireland.

methods employed in both assaults were to toss a rock from a passing car into the stage windshield, the missile striking with terrific force due to the speed of the vehicles.

The sheriff said there were no clues to the identity or number of miscreants, due to the darkness. All the drivers saw were approaching headlights, they said.

Officials attributed the attacks to strike difficulties.

The scenes of the vandalism were both on the Pacific highway 20 miles north of here where the road skirts the Rogue river with high banks on either side. Both drivers kept their machines under control and were able to stop them speedily.

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Dealings were inconsequential throughout. Transfers for the two hours approximated 200,000 shares.
