St. Paul's Episcopal Church Scene of Wedding Ceremony When Couple Exchange Vows

Before an altar banked with a profusion of white gladioli and palms and lighted with tall white tapers, Miss Carol Dawn Calvert, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil C. Calvert, and Mr. Lloyd C. Rauw, son of Mr. and Mrs. Matt Rauw of this city, exchanged their wedding vows in St. Paul's Episcopal church Sunday afternoon at four o'clock. Rev. Victor E. Newman read the Episcopal ceremony.

Just before the service Mrs. George McIntyre played Schubert's, "Serenade," and, "At Dawning," on the organ. "The Nuptial Song," by Friml was played as the processional and Mendelssohn's march for the recessional.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was lovely in a gown of white silk jersey fashioned on Grecian lines. The sweeping, full skirt ended in a train, and on her head she wore an Elizabethan coronet edged with seed pearls, the three-quarter length veil caught at the crown with three large pearls. A string of pearls about her throat was the bride's only jewelry. She carried a white prayer book from which hung sprays of lilies-of-the-valley on white satin ribbons.
