Delegates Report on Salt Lake Convention

Soroptimist Federation Votes Fund to Red Cross; Elects New Officers

A five hundred dollar contribution to the Red Cross and another five hundred dollars for Soroptimists in war-torn Europe were voted by delegates attending the biennial convention of the American Federation of Soroptimist clubs, that has just closed in Salt Lake City, according to reports given at the Soroptimists' weekly luncheon Thursday noon at the Willard hotel by those attending from Klamath Falls, Mrs. Ida Odell, the president, and Mrs. Laura Bertram.

In addition to the funds for aid, an ambulance was given to the British government for use in Europe. Before being shipped abroad it will be taken through Canada as a tribute to two Canadian women, Mrs. Anna E. Spratt and Mrs. Mercy Ellen Crehan of Vancouver, British Columbia, both of whom have served the federation as president.

Klamath members also brought home the news of the reelection of an Oregon Soroptimist, Miss Flora Kemp of Portland, as treasurer of the American federation, a post she has held with much credit to her organization during the past two years.

Mrs. Ada Jean Bennett of Washington, D. C., is the newly elected president, succeeding Canada's Mrs. Spratt. Other new leaders elected at the convention include Miss Harriett Tyler of San Francisco and Miss Celia McCann of New York, vice presidents, Miss Edith M. Schober of Topeka, Kansas, secretary.

The federation's publicity trophy for clubs in cities of more than 250,000 went this year to the Los Angeles club. The class B award for cities between that population and 50,000, presented in 1936 by the Portland club, was won by Atlantic City, and the class C trophy for clubs in cities below 50,000 went to Alhambra, California. The Klamath Falls club, which was the youngest having representation at the convention and which competed with sixteen other clubs in the class C division, received honorable mention on its publicity.

While the convention was in session, announcement was made that Mrs. Zola Vincent of the New York club, for years a member of Portland Soroptimist, had won a national award for the greatest contribution made to advertising in America by a woman during 1939.
