

## Mrs. Wendell Willkie Is Woman of Interest

Wife of Republican Presidential Candidate Holds Spotlight in Feminine World Today

Whether or not Mrs. Wendell Willkie is the next first lady of our land, the women of America from the Atlantic to the Pacific, are intensely interested in the woman who will certainly hold the spotlight until next November, at least. Following is a story which came over the wire from Philadelphia and is about Mrs. Willkie:

PHILADELPHIA, (AP) — Mrs. Wendell Willkie, "a little bit numb" at the idea that her husband will contend for the presidency, said today she would help in the campaign if his co-workers don't "think she's excess baggage."

There is one thing she won't do. She won't make speeches.

She sat through the entire exciting day at Convention hall yesterday as the votes fell by blocks into her husband's campaign kit. But no one around her recognized her.

When the Willkie votes began to climb near the 501 needed for nomination, Mrs. Willkie slipped out of the hall and down to a telephone to call her husband.

For minutes she couldn't get any of the phones in his suite. They were busy with other jubilant calls.

But finally she got through. Neither conceded the nomination was clinched. But they agreed that "it looked good." Then Mrs. Willkie went to the Warwick hotel, near the fashionable Rittenhouse square, where the republican nominee is going to rest from his vote-getting fatigue.

She was waiting, with a few women friends, when her husband came in. He stepped quickly across the room and kissed her. Neither said anything.

There was a question of her speaking on the radio. She opened her blue eyes wide at her husband and said, "Do I have to?"

"Not if you don't want to," he said.

Smiling at her husband, she said, "he has never let me down." Theirs was a World war wedding. They married on January 14, 1918. She says she's "forty plus" now. They have one son, aged 20.

## DUCK DISEASE SHOWS UP EARLY AT TULE LAKE

TULELAKE — Botulism has shown up this year in ducks on Tulelake, earlier than last year. It was announced this week by Ray St. John, assistant to C. G. Fairchild due in part to flooding of additional land in the pump area and to the extreme heat of the past few days. Two ducks now impounded at headquarters are being treated and while the disease has not reached an alarming outbreak a frequent check is being made. No indications of the "duck illness" as reported from either Clear Lake or upper Klamath lake.
