Through the long years since our Declaration of Independence was signed, many men have died for the liberty that it upholds. They may not have understood fully the lesser issues involved in the wars in which they fought. The planning and the scheming and the statecraft they left to others. They perhaps did not even hear the disputes and the charges and the stratagems of statesmen.

They knew only that America had a need. And for that need they died.

Now to die for a cause is a simpler thing than to live for it. One dies in a moment. One lives through the years, subject to temptation and to weakness and to indecision.

Are we living for America today? Let us ask it of our hearts. Are we?

Have not cynicism and the insincerity of politics misled us? Have we not let ourselves be swayed by the self interest of demagogues? Have we always asked ourselves, "Is this the best thing for America?" instead of "Is this the best thing for me?" Have we misused those precious liberties for which the shattered frigates sank and the last trench was stormed? Haven't we listened to the sophists whose words pleased us instead of to advisors whose counsel was earnest and sincere, though unpleasant?

We must admit these things. We have not been worthy of America.

But we can here highly resolve that henceforth we shall do them no longer, that, from this moment, we shall, in reaching any decision, in exercising any franchise, ask ourselves, "Is this what America needs? Will it help to keep those American ideals for which uncounted dead have given their lives?"

Let us live for America! "Visit Memory Garden during the holidays."

Bible Association Coast Conference Set for Klamath

Klamath Temple will be host to the Pacific coast conference of the Open Bible Standard Evangelistic association on July 24, announces Rev. Roy E. Southard, pastor and vice-chairman of the association.

Ministers and delegates from all the coast churches were expected to arrive Monday evening and Tuesday morning for the business session. Representatives from the midwest district will also be present at the annual meeting, including Rev. Frank Smith, chairman of the official board and pastor of the First Church of the Open Bible in Des Moines. Other association officers will attend, including Rev. E. J. Fulton, superintendent of the Pacific coast division and pastor of Lighthouse Temple at Eugene; Rev. Fred Hornshuh, district superintendent for Washington and pastor of Faith Tabernacle at Tacoma; Rev. Harry R. R. Neat, northern California district superintendent and pastor of Bethel Temple, Lodi; Rev. D. V. Alderman, Riverside, district superintendent for southern California.

Other prominent workers in the association will be Rev. Hart R. Armstrong, former dean of the O. B. S. Bible Training school in Eugene, and Rev. Ralph Isbill, former general secretary of the association in Des Moines, outgoing missionaries who expect to sail with their families for the Dutch East Indies in the fall.

Each day of the conference will be devoted to a special program. Tuesday will be church day, Wednesday, home missions, and Thursday will be given to the interests of foreign missions and young people's work. The conference program for Tuesday and Wednesday will be as follows: 10 a. m., prayer meeting; 10:30 to 12 noon, business session; 1:30 p. m., devotional service; 2:40 p. m., business session; 6:30 p. m., vesper service with visiting ministers in charge; 7:30, evangelistic

service with Rev. Fred Hornshuh principal speaker at the Wednesday night service. Rev. E. J. Fulton, Pacific coast superintendent will act as chairman of all business sessions.

An all-day young people's rally has been scheduled for Thursday and no business sessions will be held. Young people's workers and representative groups from most of the northern California, Oregon and Washington churches will be present for the rally. Three services are scheduled for the day, 10:30 a. m., 2:30 and 7:30 p. m. Rev. Frank Smith will be the evening speaker and other speakers for the day will include missionaries on furlough and out-going missionaries, as well as young people's leaders. A basket lunch will be served at noon.

Arrangements are being made to entertain out-of-town visitors in local homes and the cooperation shown by the local people is greatly appreciated.

All of the meetings during the three-day conference are open to the public and everyone is cordially invited to attend.

WARMEST JUNE IN 22 YEARS RECORDED

Residents of Klamath Falls weren't surprised Monday, July 1, to learn that the past month of June was a warm one, but they didn't realize it happened to be the warmest June in 22 years. This was the figure presented by the US weatherman from the bureau of reclamation Monday.

Warmest June on record was that of 1918, when the mean went to 68.2 degrees. This compares with the past month's mean of 67.9 degrees, or 0.3 degrees above average.

Chalked up as the warmest day of the past month was June 24, when the mercury rose to 97 degrees. Minimum occurred on June 8, with a temperature recorded at 38 degrees.

Mean maximum for the month was 83.5 degrees; mean minimum 52.4; maximum, 97; minimum, 38. Total precipitation for the month was .26 inches, or .510 of an inch less than average.

There were 20 clear days in June, eight that were partly cloudy, and two cloudy days.

Reviewing Junes of other years, 1926 saw a warm 30 days when the mean temperature was 66.6 degrees. In 1922, the mean was recorded at 65.6 degrees.

The past 16 months as a whole have been far above normal in temperature, the US weatherman stated. Since February, 1939, all months have been above the usual figure. The state of Oregon has recorded 12 consecutive months of temperature above normal.

Following is a table prepared by the weatherman which gives the mean temperature as compared with normal temperature: June, 67.9 degrees, normal, 59.1 degrees; May, 59.0, 53.4; April, 48.2, 46.5; March, 43.5, 39.4; February, 37.4, 33.0; January, 34.4, 28.7 degrees.

The month of July, first month of the summer quarter, was off to a typical hot weather start with a brassy sky, slightly overcast, high temperature and sultry, heavy air. Forecast for Tuesday is for fair weather.

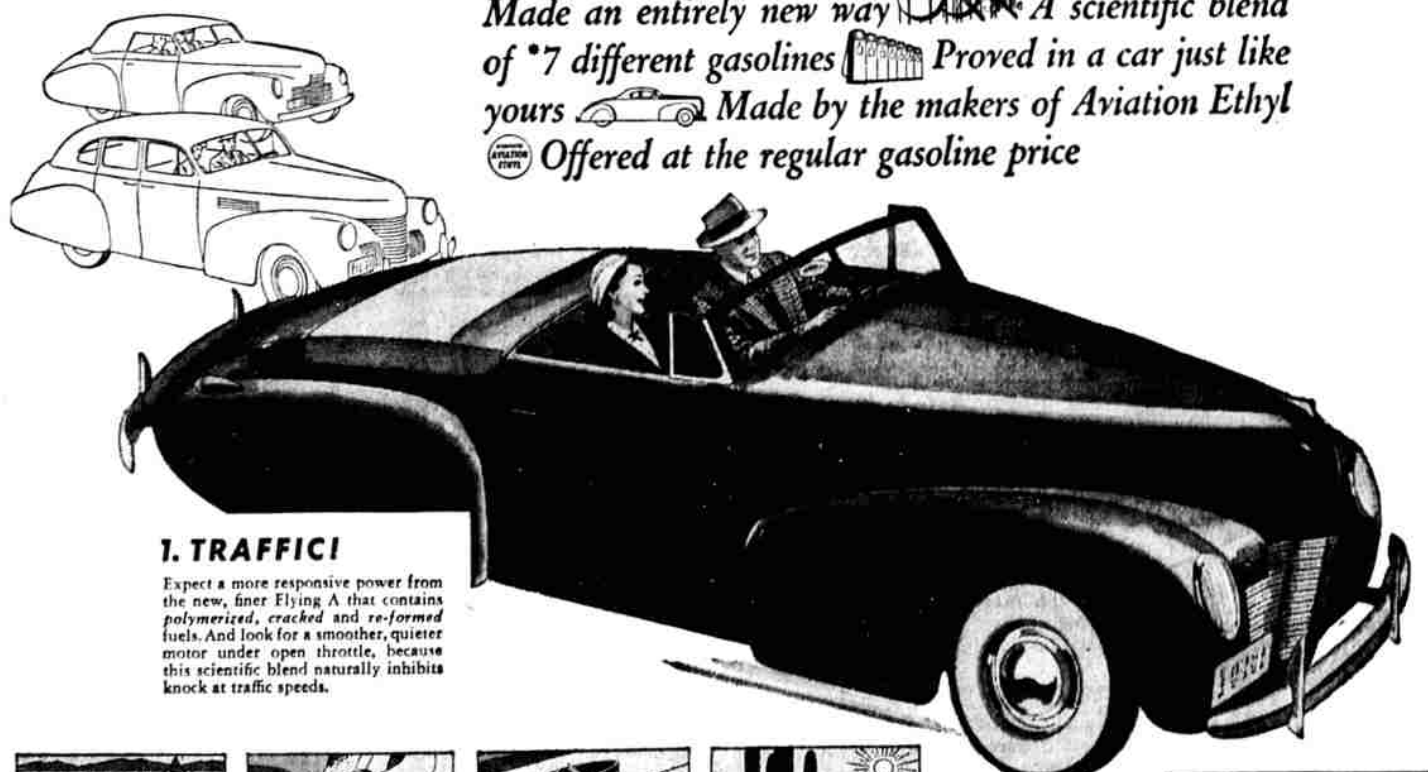
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
