Mr. Shasta stretched their winning streak to nine games in a row by dumping over the Weed Sons and remained at the top of the pile. Weed is holding down fourth place.

Redding edged out McCloud 8 to 5 but not until after a free-for-all took place on the playing field. The defeat kept McCloud in fifth position. Hilt pounded out a win over Yreka to keep the latter in the cellar and the winners in seventh place.

**Anacker Homers**  
Dorris-Klamath's only run of the day came in the fourth inning when Bob Anacker, outfielder, lifted a homer over the right field wall with none aboard. The Lumberjacks collected but five hits during the fray, four off the slants of Monzo and one bingle off Bill Marshall.

Monzo and Marshall were given fine support by the Dunsmuir team, only one error being charged. The Railroaders turned in two double plays.

Jack Shaw started on the mound for the Lumberjacks and pitched air-tight baseball for two frames but in the third inning he was blasted for four doubles and two singles before retiring the side during which time Dunsmuir tallied five runs.

**Reese Relieves Shaw**  
Walt Reese relieved Shaw on the hill but wildness proved his downfall. Reese seemed to have plenty on the ball but could not find the plate. After hurling the fourth inning and filling the bases in the fifth, he was waived to the dugout and replaced by Clyde Carlstrom.

With the score 8-1 for Dunsmuir, the bases loaded, and none out, the veteran Carlstrom found it tough going during the remainder of the contest. During his four-inning trick, Carlstrom was pounded for 10 hits and 10 runs.

Sulik, outfielder, and Harlan Poole, catcher, sparked the Dunsmuir nine. Both players are former coast league stars and Sulik played major league baseball for a number of years. Of the thirteen players in uniform, only three were Dunsmuirites, the other 10 being imported for league play.

In the short second game George Darrow delivered in the pinches to wreak vengeance on the Stars, who once released him. His teammates scored nine runs in the first three innings and then coasted in.

The hex that Aldon Wilkie, Seattle hurler, holds over the San Diego Padres worked Sunday, as it did Wednesday. He pitched two-hit, shutout ball for his sixth straight win, 5 to 0, in the second game. The Padres took the first, 10 to 3, sending Kewpie Dick Barrett to the showers in the second inning and going on to hammer three more Rainier hurlers for a grand total of 14 hits.

The whipping boys of the Coast league, the Beavers of Portland, made a brave finish in their series with Sacramento, taking the short second game, 7 to 3 after dropping the first 12 to 6.

The Sacs won the series, five games to two—a great satisfaction, after losing seven out of eight to Seattle the week previous.

Inspiration for Portland's finale win was the stork's visit to the home of Forest Gordon Orrell, Beaver hurler, a few hours earlier. The stork left Forest Gordon Orrell Junior, and Father Orrell celebrated by yielding only six hits.

## Records Tumble in AAU

## VAULTER UPS MARK WITH 15' 1" LEAP

FRESNO, Calif., July 1 (AP)—More new records than the 52-year-old national AAU championships have ever produced in one meet went into the books Monday, topped by man's highest leap over a cross-bar—a spectacular pole vault of 15 feet 11 inches by Cornelius Warner.

Warner, a school teacher at Tuolumne, Calif., cleared the bar on his first try at the record height.

The vault bettered his unofficial world record of 15 feet, set at Berkeley, Calif., earlier this year and now up for approval, and the official mark of 14 feet 11 inches set in 1937 by Bill Sefton and Earle Meadows.

Warner is a school teacher at Tuolumne, Calif.

The meet here Friday and Saturday night was an "American Olympic games" for the country's greatest track and field talent, denied international competition because of the European war.

Run on one of the country's fastest cinderpaths, it saw the world's 200-meter hurdles record tied, three American records bettered and two equalled, and eight new national AAU marks posted and two tied.

Fred Wolcott of Rice institute tied the world's 220-meter hurdle mark with a clocking of 22.6 seconds, equalling the time set by Jesse Owens in 1935. Wolcott also won the 110-meter hurdles, timed in 13.9 seconds, two tenths of a second faster than Forrest "Spec" Towns' American record set in 1936.

Other double winners were Harold Davis of Salinas, Calif., junior college winner of the 100 and 200-meter dashes, and Billy Brown of Louisiana State, victor in the broadjump and hop-skip-and-jump. Davis' 10.3 in the century was only one-tenth of a second slower than the world's mark.

The veteran Glenn Cunningham, who hoped to end his competitive career by winning the 1500-meter race, lost out in the last few strides to Walter Mehl of University of Wisconsin, who marked up a new American record with a time of 3:45.9, only one-tenth of a second off the world's record.

## Two Champions Named in Golf

SEATTLE, July 1 (AP)—Jack Westland of Everett and Mrs. Mary Moezel Wagner of Portland are the new Pacific Northwest Golf association champions.

Westland won the men's amateur crown Saturday at the Broadmoor Golf club with an overwhelming 11 and 9 victory over Harry Givan of Seattle.

Mrs. Wagner defeated Muriel Veatch, the Washington state women's champion, 6 and 4.

For Westland it was his third consecutive northwest title. He was the defending champion, having won in 1938-39. Givan had been northwest titlist in 1936-37, and both former U. S. Walker cup golfers were shooting for their third trophy.

It was Mrs. Wagner's first tournament victory of any consequence. The trim little 25-year-old housewife has only been playing golf seriously the last four years, but she showed well the training given by her brother, Joe Moezel, Portland professional, in her rout of the long-hitting Miss Veatch.

## FREDDIE WINS NO. 199 AS BROOKS SPLIT

It will be better all around for the Brooklyn Dodgers when fat Freddie Fitzsimmons wins his 200th major league victory. He chalked up No. 199 Sunday—and the Dodgers were so tired from helping him win that one that they dropped the second game to the Boston Bees and lost valuable ground in their wild attempt to catch up to the league leading Cincinnati Reds.

Freddie fidgeted through nine innings, scattering eight Boston hits, winning by 9-2. By the second game the Dodgers were dog-tired, and Manuel Salvo's steady nine hitter beat them, 7-2.

The Reds climbed a game and a half ahead of the Brooks when Bucky Walters pitched and Linus Frey batted them on a 7-4 win over the Cubs in the first game and Eddie Joost came through with a ninth inning single to win the nightcap, 7-6.

Johnny Rizzo, "the man nobody wanted" earned a spot for himself in the heart of Philadelphia fans when he homered the Phils to a 7-4 victory over the Giants in the first game of their twin bill. A six run uprising in the second game gave that one to the Giants by 7-3, after they broke the spell that rookie Clyde Smoll had woven around them for seven innings.

Mort Cooper bested Bob Klinger in a mound duel, giving the fame of the St. Louis-Pittsburgh duo to the Cards by 1-0, but then Max Butcher hurled a four hitter and scored the winning run as the Pirates took the nightcap, 2-0.

The Cleveland Indians were busy tightening their hold on first place in the American league when they smashed the Chicago White Sox by 7-5 in the first game of their twin bill, but they reckoned without Edgar Smith, who brought them up sharply with a five hit job in the second game, and the Sox won, 3-1.

The closely pursuing Tigers didn't help their title chances much when they dropped the first game to St. Louis 7-6, although they evened the day's count with a 10-1 victory in a seven inning afterpiece, largely due to Johnny Gorsica's five hit hurling.

Marvin Breuer pitched the Yankees to their third straight victory over the Philadelphia's 4-3 in the first game but the stylish Monte Pearson bowled to Johnny Babich in the second game, and the A's made off with a 3-2 victory. Babich allowed the champs only five hits.

The Boston Red Sox made good on two chances against the Washington Senators, claiming the first one by 6-5, thanks to homers by Joe Cronin and Bobby Doerr, and the second one by 5-4 in spite of opponent Walter Masterson's five seven hit game.
