

FIRST OF BIG DAILY PARADES SET JULY 4TH

Klamath Falls residents are planning a gala Fourth of July celebration which will be the first of a four-day program planned by Klamath Buckaroo Days. First event of Thursday is the big parade which will leave Second and Main streets promptly at 10:30 o'clock and the line of march will proceed along Main street to the armory where it will disband.

Les Finley, Klamath Buckaroo director of parades, asks that all persons wishing to participate in the parades be on hand promptly at 10 a. m. Parades are scheduled for Thursday, Friday and Saturday mornings. Cars will not be permitted on Main street during parade hours Thursday by order of Chief of Police Frank Hamm.

Sheriff Lloyd L. Low will serve as marshal of the day on each morning of the parade. Here is the list of prizes offered for the big parade on Thursday and the other two parades on Friday and Saturday mornings:

For best equipped outfit consisting of the following, saddle, bridle, chaps, lariat and spurs: first prize, \$50 silver spurs donated by Walter Waggoner; second prize, \$15 cash; third prize, \$10 cash, fourth prize, \$5 cash. Trophy donated by Matt Finigan for the oldest horse-drawn vehicle in parade.

Trophy donated by Bob Elder for the community making the best showing.

Belt donated by Charlie Reed Saddlery for the oldest buckaroo riding in the parade.

Youngest boy handling own horse, \$2; youngest girl handling own horse, \$2; youngsters riding Shetland ponies cannot compete for this prize.

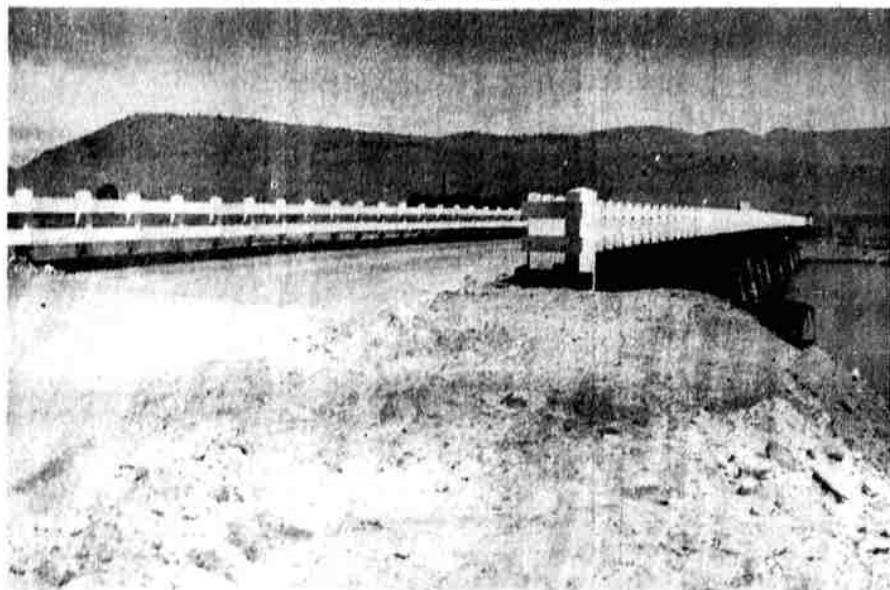
Prize of \$15 for the youngest musical organization in parade, this to be based on an average in years. Group must have 16 or more players.

Most unique, popular, and outstanding attraction that does not belong to the categories of other prizes, first prize, \$5, second prize, \$2.

WILD RIDE ENDS IN COUNTY JAIL

Charles A. Condon, a cook employed by the Great Northern railroad at Hager, was in the county jail Tuesday after a wild Saturday afternoon ride in a stolen car which ended in a meadow east of the junction on the Lakeview highway.

According to police, Condon was given a ride into Klamath Falls from Hager Saturday by Oak Meyers, owner of the sedan. Upon arriving in town Meyers stopped at the Klamath Medical clinic for treatment, leaving Condon in the car outside. When he came out, about an hour later, the car and Condon was gone. He notified police who in the meantime had found the car, and Condon, in the field whence they had landed after plowing through a fence and rolling over four times.

Condon was taken to the hospital for some repairs to his front teeth and later removed to the county jail where he was booked on a charge of larceny of an automobile. Bond was set at \$1000 cash or \$2000 property.

KLAMATH YOUTH GETS NUMBER 1 FOR BIG RODEO

First of the cowhands to sign up for Klamath Buckaroo Days rodeo slated to open at 1 o'clock sharp Thursday afternoon, was not one of the Texas boys, but Clyde Clark of the Klamath basin, who signed up in the amateur boy's calf riding event. Throughout the four-day show Clyde will carry the numeral One.

Wearing No. 2 oilcloth will be Elmer Smith who entered in the amateur bucking horse contests. Don Hancock, No. 3; Del Haskins, No. 4; Eugene House, No. 5, all signed up in rapid fire order in the calf riding events.

First professional to sign was Ray Laird who will wear No. 6 on his back during the entire show. Laird entered in the professional class, best reined cow horse, gentleman event of the show.

First girl to sign up is Esther Collman, No. 7, who will ride in the amateur best reined cow horse event. Hugo Lanouette is No. 8 in the amateur calf riding.

Few of the top hands sign up until the eleventh hour. Then the Buckaroo office is jammed to both doors with the bronc busters, bull riders, ropers and doggers, who have satisfied themselves that the purse is big enough for their consideration, and they'll stay with the rest of the fellows.

Seventeen had registered for various events at headquarters at noon Monday.

Plans were completed for the three parades starting Thursday morning which, because it is July 4, will see the biggest parade of the celebration. Director Les Finley asks that all participants be on hand at 10 o'clock sharp each of the three mornings, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, to take part in the line of march which will move promptly at 10:30 a. m. along Main street from Klamath and Center.

INVENTION SHOW MANAGER IN CITY

J. T. Anderson, patent and industrial coordinator was in Klamath Falls, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, contacting people with inventions who wish to protect them and reach the market.

Anderson is the director of the State Fair Inventor's show, which is sponsored by the State of Oregon for the encouragement of new industries based on new inventions. He is now preparing an Inventor's show to be staged

at Jantzen beach in August of this year at Portland. Motion pictures are taken of the inventions in operation and run in these shows so that the manufacturers can see what is being done by the inventor from distant parts and enables him to contact the inventor through Mr. Anderson. EAGLES DRUMMERS TAKE STATE TITLE

With a score of 99.6, or just a fraction below perfect, the Klamath Falls Eagles' senior drum corps again captured first place in state-wide drum corps competition during the annual state Eagles' convention held over the weekend at Marshfield.

It was the third time in four years that the local corps placed first, the initial state championship coming to Klamath Falls in 1937. Next year the Klamath Eagles played host to the state convention and stayed out of competition, but again took first in 1939 at Roseburg.

In other competition, the ladies' drum corps, unopposed, took first place in their department and the senior drum corps also won a trophy for the best music. The Klamath ritualistic team, headed by Andy Meek, worthy president, placed first in their class in the state ritualistic contest. Other members of the local ritualistic team are A. R. Renner, vice president; M. L. Shepherd, chaplain; G. C. Purcell, past worthy president; R. M. Book, conductor; O. C. Spindler, inside guard; M. L. Bratton, secretary.

The ladies auxiliary also won second prize for their ritualistic competition.

The Klamath first aid squad was well received in a demonstration on the field.

Meek was elected state conductor of the lodge.

President of the senior drum corps is Jack Benner and Don Forrest is in charge of the music department.

About 150 members of the local lodge went to the three-day conclave, which was held Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The 1941 convention will be at Bend.

ASHLAND, July 2—Klamath Falls will be well represented here when this community opens its three-day Fourth of July program starting next Thursday and continuing through Saturday night.

Phyllis Collier, a prominent member of the younger set in the pelican city is participating in the court of Queen Elizabeth, representing the Oregon Shakespearean Festival productions, and will follow a well-rounded program of activities throughout the entire period.

The queen and court, of which she is a member, will take over the keys to the city the morning of the Fourth, will head the first division of the mile-long parade, be guests at a special luncheon, be honored at the rodeo, participate in special swimming parties and launch a radio broadcast series. They are also slated to be guests of the "Cavalcade of the Siskiyou" the evening of July 5; will be honored at the Queen's ball; officiate at informal teas and appear in the cast

of the cavalcade itself the final night.

Following the celebrations, Miss Collier will join Mary Shreve of Medford who portrays the official "Queen Elizabeth"; Carol McCollum of Ashland, and Marilyn Sherlock of Grants Pass, and embark on a special good-will tour, climaxed at Salem late in July with an interview with Governor Sprague.

She will appear at a number of service clubs throughout southern Oregon advertising the productions, scheduled for August 9 to 17, here.

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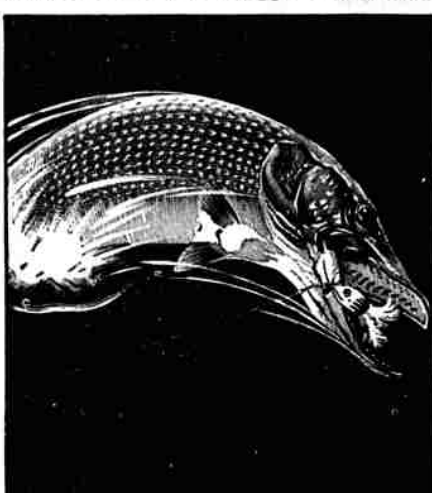
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
