

KLAMATH HAS RELIEF BUDGET BALANCE LEFT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 3 (Special)—Klamath county's 1939 budget of \$74,075 for all public welfare purposes, had an unspent balance at the end of last year of \$32,011.

The county's 1940 welfare budget of \$65,335 was 3.52 per cent of all taxes levied in Klamath county for this year, and was 9.30 per cent of the 1940 taxes levied for county purposes only. The 1940 per capita cost of public welfare in Klamath county was \$1.77 based on 1937 population estimate.

Thirty-five Oregon counties had a total of unspent public welfare budget allowances of \$310,224 as of December 31, 1939. Only one county, Marion, spent more on all public welfare than provided in its 1939 budget.

These figures were recently compiled for all counties in the state by Oregon Business & Tax Research, Inc.

The 1940 tax levy for all welfare purposes in all counties, including county farms and hospitals, indigent soldiers and sailors, also old age blind, dependent children and general (relief) assistance, was \$3,209,823 against \$3,200,001 levied by all counties for the same purposes in 1939, the tax organization's report indicated.

The principal reason why 35 of the 36 Oregon counties spent less for all public welfare in 1939 than was levied for those purposes, was inability of the state to match county tax levies with profits from the state liquor system. This inability of the state caused a slowing down of aid to new public welfare applicants. The Oregon Business and Tax Research, Inc., statement points out that the \$310,224 unspent welfare budget balance at the end of 1939 was not a cash but a bookkeeping balance. County millage tax levies might have been reduced by the unspent balance had the state's inability to match county taxes on property with liquor profits been foreseen when the 1939 county budget was prepared.

KLAMATH JUVENILE CASE LOAD HIGH

June's juvenile case load in Klamath county was high, according to the final report of Phyllis Corbett, juvenile officer pro tem who has turned her duties back to Mrs. Ethel Wilson, regular juvenile officer.

"June case load, totaled 233," said Miss Corbett. "Of these 121 were dependency cases, 75 were delinquent children, and 37 were cases in which an attempt has been made to prevent them from becoming serious delinquents. Four boys were committed to the Oregon State Training school this month. One who had never been brought into court before, and the fourth was also a local boy who had failed on probation. Records indicate that most boys succeed on probation regardless of how serious their delinquencies have been. Three boys were released this month, having been successful during their year's probation.

"Two girls were placed in the Christie home for girls in Portland, and one girl placed in the Louise home. Another girl was released from an institution for the summer vacation. Seven juveniles were held in the county jail for a total of 36 days. Of these, three were Indians. There were seven juvenile hearings, two concerning dependent children, and the rest delinquent boys. Twenty-six cases were closed during June, leaving Mrs. Wilson with a total of 207 cases with which to start the month of July."

CITIZENSHIP CANCELED

SAN FRANCISCO, July 3 (UP)—American citizenship of Rafael Guillen, 39, naturalized native of Spain, was ordered cancelled today following a short trial before Federal Judge Martin I. Welsh.

It was Guillen's second trial for revocation of his citizenship on grounds he withheld information that he was a communist.

Delegates From All Parts Of Coast Here For Bible Meet

Ministers and delegates to the Open Bible Standard convention, now in progress at Klamath Temple, are arriving from all parts of the Pacific coast and a record attendance is expected. More than 100 delegates and ministers were registered by Tuesday evening and more will arrive on Wednesday for the annual business session.

Among the early arrivals on Tuesday were Rev. L. E. Welshons of Ottumwa, Ia., one of the representatives from the midwest conference division; R. O. Melby, veteran pastor and evangelist of Los Angeles; Rev. Harry R. R. Neat, superintendent of the Northern California district from Lodi, Calif.; and Rev. E. J. Fulton, district superintendent for the state of Oregon from Eugene.

All Tuesday meetings were well attended. Rev. Lawrence Fox, evangelist, had charge of the 6:30 p. m. vespers service and inspirational talks were given by several of the visiting ministers. Rev. Harry R. R. Neat was the main speaker at the 7:30 o'clock evangelistic service and his subject was "The Two Ways."

The conference will continue through Thursday of this week with business sessions on Tuesday and Wednesday only. The Wednesday schedule will begin at 9:30 a. m. with a short devotional service led by Rev. Cole of Sprague River. A business meeting will follow from 10 o'clock until noon, at which time the program of home missions will be considered. The session will again assemble at 1:30 p. m. for devotions and continue at 2 o'clock with conference business. At the conclusion of this meeting, all ministers present will give short talks. The vespers service at 6:30 p. m. will be

in charge of Rev. Wright. The regular evening evangelistic service will be held at 7:30 o'clock, at which time Rev. Fred Horns-hub of Tacoma, former pastor of Klamath Temple, will give the main address.

There will be no business sessions on Thursday which is scheduled as foreign missions day, but an all-day young people's rally will be combined with the missionary program. Delegates are expected from most of the churches on the coast for this day which will be devoted largely to the activities of the Over-coming organization of affiliated young people's groups. Among the speakers for the day will be Rev. William Patterson, missionary on furlough from Java, Rev. Hart Armstrong and Rev. Ralph Ishill, outgoing missionaries to the Dutch East Indies. Rev. Armstrong was former dean of the Bible Standard training school in Eugene and resigned his position to take up duties in the missionary field. Rev. Ishill has been general secretary of the Open Bible Standard conference and editor of the "Messenger," the official organ of the conference, for several years with headquarters in Des Moines.

The rally program on Thursday includes services at 10 a. m., 2:30 p. m., 6:30 p. m., and 7:30 p. m. Special music, both vocal and instrumental, will be a feature of each service. Rev. Frank Smith, chairman of the official board of the Open Bible Standard association, will be the main evening speaker. Rev. Smith is pastor of a large church in Des Moines and also connected with the Open Bible Institute of that city. All meetings are open to the public and everyone is cordially invited to attend.

SEMI-SKILLED IN PLACEMENT NEED

Semi-skilled workers found the most jobs during May through the State Employment service, a study recently completed by the research section shows.

Of the 6031 placements, 2037 were classed as semi-skilled, 490 were skilled and 1752 were unskilled. Personal service accounted for 802, while the remainder were distributed among professional, clerical, sales and other "white-collar" occupations. None of the seasonal labor or other casual jobs were included in the analysis.

In the breakdown by age groups, women about 20 were shown to have the best chance for jobs, while men in the 25-29 division were placed most often. After 30, men's chances gradually faded, but women placements reached a new peak in the early forties.

REFUGEES ARRIVE

MANILA, Wednesday, July 3 (UP)—The American President "refugee" liner President Coolidge arrived from Hong Kong today with approximately 100 Americans and was followed immediately by the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Japan with 1640 British women and children.

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PAROLE REVOKED, MAN SENT TO PENITENTIARY

The parole of Thomas V. Davis, sentenced to one year in the state penitentiary six months ago, was revoked Tuesday by Circuit Court Judge Edward B. Ashurst.

Davis was sentenced on a charge of passing bad checks, but was paroled at the time on condition that he make good on all checks he had issued.

Failure to do so in the allotted six months resulted in Judge Ashurst's action.

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'MAIL ORDER' COWBOY TO BE RODEO MASTER

Jack Story, known wherever there are rodeos, as the "mail order cowboy," will appear at the Klamath Falls Buckaroo Days rodeo from July 4 to July 7 as announcer and master of ceremonies.

Story, whose career is as romantic as any blood and thunder fiction-thriller, has devoted much of his time in recent years to announcing and broadcasting of sports events. He has been in action at such events as the national air races, the important auto races all over the country, and the top-flight rodeos.

Story started his long climb to national prominence when a barnstorming plane set down one day at the county fair in Pawnee, Oklahoma. In the plane was a pilot, now unknown—and Slim Lindbergh, parachute jumper. Story became interested in flying on the spot!

In a few years he was a licensed pilot and had opened a flying school and plane sales agency in Tacoma. While there he became the first aviator to fly a forest patrol over Mount Rainier and Olympic national forests. Subsequently he became an involuntary member of the famed Caterpillar club when he was forced to bail out one night over Davenport, Ia.

Two years ago Story, a complete tenderfoot, began to announce rodeos. He is now one of the two members of the famous Turtle association, organization of professional cowboys, who have never competed in the arena.

Last year at Houston, Tex., Story received an "official" initiation into the rodeo clan.

Everett Bowman, president of the Turtles, selected Story's horse to ride in the grand entry. The horse bolted and headed for the barn—with Story desperately clinging to the saddlehorn.

Jack will ride again at the rodeo at Klamath Falls, but his sponsors, Montgomery Ward and company, promise to furnish him with a docile mount—and a complete outfit of riding equipment, from sombrero to spurs, direct from the shelves of the local Ward store.

AGED RESIDENT OF MEDFORD DIES

Clyde L. Carter, 1038 Laguna street, engineer for the Southern Pacific, was called to Ashland Sunday by the death of his father, Major Arthur Carter, for the past 76 years a resident of the valley city.

Major Carter was born February 10, 1860, Watertown, Wis., son of John L. and Fannie Moore Carter. He crossed the plains at the age of six months with his family in a covered wagon and settled at Lincoln, Calif., later going to Jackson county where they located at the old mining diggings known as Fredricks. Later the family moved to Ashland where Major Carter has resided since that time.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Mary R. Givan Carter, and three children, C. L. of Klamath Falls, A. L. of Eugene, and Mrs. S. F. Kelly of Dunsmuir, Calif. Funeral services were held Tuesday at 10 a. m. in Ashland with interment in the Hargadine cemetery.

"Miss Corbett is a girl of fine character, resourcefulness and ability," said Judge Ashurst. "Her fill-in work here during Mrs. Wilson's absence points definitely to an excellent career for her."

"I feel that the work was ably handled by Miss Corbett during my leave," said Mrs. Wilson. "She deserves credit for a job well done."

Mrs. Wilson said she felt she gained much from her studies in Chicago but is glad to be back at her duties in Klamath.
