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NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

 WASHINGTON, July 3—Hitler has been figuring he would get through with the British and be ready for Russia before September 1—and he has a few interesting things in mind for the soviets then.

Don't ask how such things are known here, but it is the official business of this government to try to find out more than is public knowledge about what is going on in the world. The following simplified guide to the latest turn of events in eastern Europe is accepted here with some credence in view of its source:

An ambassador of a Baltic nation rushed to Berlin immediately after the reds moved into Lithuania, Latvia, and Estonia. He saw Von Ribbentrop and asked for advice as to what his country should do to resist the reds.

Von Ribbentrop suggested a passive course for the present but promised definite help later. He said the German military plan contemplated conquest of Britain and peace there before the end of next month, at which time, Hitler will seek a new understanding with Russia—the kind he has inflicted on France.

He prophesied the establishment of a Hitler puppet government in Moscow, either by revolution or after German invasion. Conquest of the Russian capital might be necessary, and September 1 is a little late in the year for inaugurating military adventures so far north, but he anticipated little resistance from the weak red army.

SWEDEN

The Baltic bone of contention between Berlin and Moscow is Sweden, as the invisible diplomatic wave lengths report the story. The original Von Ribbentrop-Stalin agreement in September apparently did not settle Sweden's future status. (It settled Poland, Ukraine, Bessarabia.) Obviously German ambitions for Sweden have expanded since the start of the war, and especially since the conquest of France. The excuse for whatever Hitler wants to do in Russia can easily be found in that situation.

COFFEE COMBINE

The coffee conference, New York agents of South American producers and their governments, sounded authorities here a week ago regarding establishment of a cartel for coffee. The scheme would follow the line of the Stevenson plan which the Reconstruction Finance corporation is setting up for purchases of rubber and tin.

Word was sent back from on high here through an intermediary that such a project would be looked upon with favor.

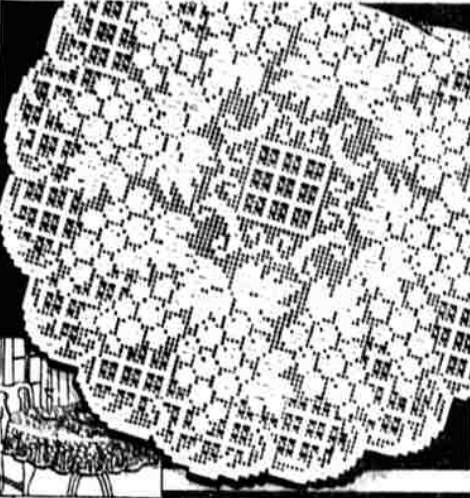

a permanent factor in American industry.

Sometimes the change from individual bargain over to collective bargaining is fairly spontaneous and simple. In other instances, the change takes place only after long efforts, the effort being more educational than organizational.

It is after the union has been recognized that the real business of unionism takes place as the process of collective bargaining starts to function in the shop.

Now then, if management has given a stiff fight to unionization, if workers have suffered discrimination as fast as they have changed their minds and have become collective bargainers, if men have crouched in fear of the ready club in the hands of management, then management is quite apt to be greeted with militant union committee and a fighting set of officers.

If, on the other hand, management has not actively opposed organization of the workers and meets the complaints and requests of the employees with fairness and calmness, management is quite apt to be greeted with a set of men who have no grudges and no antagonism against the management. In the latter case the transition to a state of joint responsibility and industrial partnership is fairly easy to make.

A Day of Patriotism

NOW comes the Fourth of July. Not in years has the day found the nation in such vital need of unity in support of its fundamental democratic principles.

Fourth of July will be celebrated as usual with noise and festivities and holiday pleasures—the very evidences of freedom which we enjoy under the "American way" in such sharp and favorable contrast to the tragedy that prevails over millions who live elsewhere.

Among loyal citizens on Independence Day will run a feeling deeper than the superficialities of "just celebrating." More people will read the Declaration of Independence, a one-time Fourth of July tradition that has been all but forgotten in recent years. More people will think, on this day in 1940, of the true significance of the contents of that famous document.

More flags, we hope, will fly on this Independence Day. For the flag is the symbol of America and the things that make America a great light in a darkening world.

Yes, the Fourth of July should be a day of unashamed, forthright and positive patriotism—a day when we honor America and its flag, a day when we give thanks that they are our country and our flag, a day when hearts quicken in resolve to support and defend them.

It is a day to celebrate, to be sure—but not to celebrate without a thought for its true significance. The channels of information from throughout the world are choked with words that make that significance plain to all who think.

Human Wolves

ON Monday of this week an incident occurred on Mitchell street which is typical of the sort of thing that has been happening here with alarming regularity.

Two women, while walking on Mitchell street, noticed the weeds in a vacant lot moving and rustling. At first they believed a dog was moving about in the weeds, but on glancing back they saw a man, bent over and following them. When he realized he had been detected, he dropped to the ground. They ran on to the home of one of the women, with the man pursuing them part of the way.

There have been many reports of men following women along dark streets, of men at the windows of homes, and similar activities of night prowlers. It is well that the citizenry should be fully warned of this situation, that no one will take unnecessary chances with the human wolves who are evidently abroad in the community. It is unfortunate that it is so, but it is true that women or children should not walk alone on the streets at night until this condition is cleared up.

Prowlers are not easily caught by the police, and the closest public cooperation with the authorities is needed in order that reports may reach them in time for quick and immediate searches.

Be Careful

FIRE and automobile accidents will again take a heavy toll over the holiday period.

Forests are tinder dry and the great influx of visitors for the weekend promises greatly increased danger. Fireworks have no more place in the forests than in the cities. Campfires should be carefully built and completely dead when left. Smoking should be confined to the established camps.

Use of fireworks in the city is banned by law, and the county fair board has ordered them prohibited from the fairgrounds.

Auto traffic will be heavy and many will be driving fast to distant pleasure spots.

Those who would avoid tragedy will exercise extreme caution over the Fourth of July and the succeeding celebration days.
