

RETAIL TRADE UP OVER LAST YEAR

NEW YORK, July 5 (AP)—Pennies and dollars crossed retail store counters from 4 to 9 per cent faster than a year ago, Dun and Bradstreet said today in a weekly survey.

Buying prior to the Fourth of July holiday highlighted demand from the ultimate consumer, according to merchants' reports to the agency.

"Although shoppers for summer terms were said to be bargain-minded," the review continued, "as is usual at this time of the season, a satisfactory volume of business was done at regular prices."

"Turnover in the three pre-holiday days fully met expectations despite rather unfavorable conditions."

"Sportswear and shoe buying was especially heavy and some stores reported that in view of lower stocks initial price concessions were not so large as last year's."

"Apart from seasonal ready-to-wear, customers main interest was in auto accessories, luggage, picnic equipment and summer furnishings."

"Liquor sales declined, following last week's pre-tax boom."

"Electrical goods continued strong, with fans and unit air conditioning accounting for substantial volume; city stores reported broad interest in the new 4-pound personal radios."

"Automobile buying continued at a better than seasonal rate, with sales recording striking gains over 1939."

ARMY AIR CORPS NOW ACCEPTING NEW RECRUITS

For the first time in several months the regular army air corps is accepting recruits. Recruits enlisted for the air corps will be sent to two detachments in California for training before assignment to an air corps unit. These detachments are the west coast training centers at Moffett field and at Stockton. The minimum educational requirement for enlistment in the air corps is a high school education or its equivalent. The only exception is made in the case of young men with a journeyman's rating in a mechanical trade.

The Portland recruiting district, which has been functioning as a unit of the regular army for 18 years and which has included all of Oregon and parts of Idaho and Washington has been discontinued. In its place has emerged the Oregon recruiting district with headquarters at Portland. Lieutenant Colonel H. D. Bagnall, who commanded the Portland district, is the recruiting officer for the Oregon district.

Enlistments made through the Klamath Falls sub-station during June numbered 15. The Portland district, which was in operation during June accomplished 215 enlistments.

The latest enlistment in the regular army through the Klamath Falls station is Walter A. Harris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Murray Harris, 60 Main street, for the 38th infantry, Fort Douglas, Utah.

Yellow Document Masterpiece of Muted Eloquence

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—For a piece of paper that's yellow, dog-eared, and almost illegible, the Declaration of Independence is a masterpiece of muted eloquence.

"Watch their faces," said the library of congress guard, nodding to the sightseers, "and see what it does to them."

Three girls of high school age came up the marble stairs with two older people—a man and a woman. One of the girls took out a lipstick. A companion frowned. She put it away.

Two of the girls giggled. . . . Single file they walked into the section which modestly houses the declaration and the constitution. . . . They stopped giggling.

The man who had been talking to the woman stopped and took off his hat. . . . All five of them peered at the historic paper—the declaration on the wall and the constitution in a marble desk. . . . They shuffled away, silently.

"Two or three thousand people look at them every day," the guard explained. "Ten thousand see them on the fourth."

Many persons kneel before the two documents. No, the guard said he didn't know any of their stories.

"I figure," he said, "they must have a pretty good reason. I never ask them anything, and they never tell me."

Fashion Designer Declares Fall of Paris Not Fatal To American Style Business

Statement by Maurice Rentner, chairman of the Fashion Originators' Guild of America, Inc., on the probable effect of the cessation of activity of the French style market upon this country's fashion trades:

"There has been so much conjecture as to the probable effect of the cessation of activity of the French style market upon this country's fashion trades that it has become essential for spokesmen for the American creators to set forth the facts and to dispel any misconceptions on the subject. The matter is of vast industrial interest."

"It is, of course, axiomatic that France's contribution to the applied as well as the fine arts has been of incalculable importance. Paris has been the capital of a civilization in which beauty and charm and dignity have been fundamental factors. Its significance to artistry in apparel has comprised merely one of the many facets of its vast aesthetic structure. Merely to set foot on French soil had a richly refreshing reaction upon the 'merchants of fashion' from all parts of the world."

"To be compelled to forego, even temporarily, recourse to this veritable treasure trove of ingenious ideas and zestful inspiration is to be deeply deplored. While the consciousness of the terrifying ordeals to which the French creators—with whom we have been in such friendly association for so many years—are now enduring, is acutely painful to us, we find some small consolation in the thought that their genius and culture are

equalled by their patience and fortitude."

"The fact is that this country's designers have never sought more than broad inspiration from the couturiers' work. They found in their visit to the Parisian showings, an exhilarating interlude for their own endeavors. The American creators have not aped the French fashions. Although France has been an international fount of fashion for centuries, the American originators have, for years, dressed the women of this nation. Fortunately, our talents have long since been perfected to a degree that makes possible the successful fulfillment of this important task."

"We feel that the greatest tribute that we can pay to the stricken French couture is by upholding the tradition of fashion as a vital force in cultured and enlightened civilization. Stirred by their profound sorrow over the catastrophe to their fellow originators abroad, the American creators will scale new heights in the exercise of their designing genius. But we shall never cease fervently to hope that the light of French artistry will flame forth again, with its radiance augmented by that greater power which is the gift of suffering and sacrifice to artistic endeavor."

"We shall, of course, hold ourselves in constant readiness to extend whatever encouragement we can to the rehabilitation of the French couture and we shall, at the first opportunity, whether in the near or distant future, resume our relationship with it."

1,500,000 Frenchmen Lost In Last Month of Battle

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, July 5 (AP)—French casualties in the disastrous final month of the war with Germany were estimated unofficially Monday at 1,500,000 men, most of them listed as dead or missing.

60 Days
It took Adolf Hitler's mechanized army approximately one month to destroy what 60 days ago still was described as the most efficient military machine in the world—the French army—and to overrun and occupy in its blitzkrieg more than half of France.

When France decided on June 12 to plead for an armistice the situation was so desperate it is reliably reported, that General Weygand told the historic mid-night meeting of the French cabinet in a chateau near Tours that the French army had only cartridges enough to last three more days.

French ministers who had watched the army melt away along the line of the Somme and Aisne rivers wept as the generalissimo described how the Germans advanced, "slaughtering men who no longer have the means to defend themselves."

Nation Stunned

The full collapse of France as a military power is just beginning to be realized in France itself. The destruction of the army left the nation stunned.

French leaders, including aged Marshal Henri Petain, whose tragic task it was to sue for peace, now admit that the collapse of the army was due to three causes:

1. Lack of equipment.
2. Lack of man-power.
3. Lack of determination.

The lack of equipment, which is emphasized as the outstanding reason for France's defeat centered in aviation and tanks, Germany's main weapons.

RAILROADS SPEED FREIGHT SCHEDULE TO EASTERN POINTS

CHICAGO, July 5 (AP)—Speedier movement eastward of perishable freight, with a 24-hour reduction possible in trips between the Pacific coast and New York sales centers, will be inaugurated by a majority of western railroads tomorrow.

The first shipments to leave the west under the new program will reach here and St. Louis on July 11, rail officials said.

Sent from concentration points in the north Pacific and California areas, shipments will arrive at St. Louis at 12:30 p. m. (CST) on the sixth day, a reduction of 12 hours from existing schedules and will arrive here at 4:30 p. m. (CST), a reduction of eight hours.

With prompt connections with eastern lines, the freight will reach the east coast 24 hours earlier than under present schedules for the transcontinental run.
