Spices Give Added Zest to Popular Summertime Coolers

In hot countries, they use spices to take their minds off the heat. Let's try spices in our summer coolers for the same reason.

Spiced Chilled Fizz (Serves Six to Eight)

Two teaspoons tea, 4 cups boiling water, 1/2 teaspoon powdered cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon powdered cloves, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 1 cup orange juice, 1 cup lemon juice, 1/3 cup granulated sugar.

Place tea in a pot. Add water and spices. Cover for 10 minutes. Strain. Cool for 10 minutes. Add the rest of the ingredients. Chill. Serve in glasses which have been half-filled with chopped ice. Garnish with fresh mint leaves.

Rhubarb-Tea Punch (Serves 12)

One cup tea infusion, 6 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 small bunch fresh mint, 2 cups slightly sweetened stewed rhubarb, 1 stick cinnamon, 1 orange, 1 quart ginger ale, 1 pint carbonated water. Chill.

To tea infusion add all ingredients except orange, ginger ale and carbonated water. When ready to serve, remove cinnamon and add 1 quart cracked ice, orange thinly sliced, chilled ginger ale and chilled carbonated water. Serve in tall ice tea glasses with straw.

Root Beer Milk Shake

One-half cup root beer, 1/2

cup rich milk, dash of nutmeg, whipped cream. Make individual serving. Mix the milk and root beer and then add a dash of nutmeg topped with whipped cream for each glass and then another tiny dash of nutmeg over the whipped cream.

Spiced Orangeade (Serves Four to Six)

Sixteen whole cloves, 1 one-inch stick of cinnamon, rind from 1/2 orange, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 cup orange juice, 2 teaspoons lemon juice, 2 glasses of ginger ale.

Put into a saucepan, 1 cup cold water, 16 whole cloves, a one-inch stick of cinnamon and rind from 1/2 orange. Simmer 5 minutes. Add 1/2 cup sugar. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Boil few minutes longer. Add 1 cup orange juice, 2 teaspoons lemon juice. Chill. Just before serving add 2 glasses of cold ginger ale.

Except for one more film, "Four Wives," Gail is through with Hollywood. She's started a new NBC series with Jim Ameche and she said she would celebrate the occasion with a whopping big hunk of Kansas steer. ACCIDENT AGENCY

SALEM, Ore., July 5 (UP)—Records of the secretary of state's office show that the bulk of drivers involved in auto accidents have had at least six years of driving experience. In most instances, the records show, drivers and pedestrians are apparently normal at the time of the accident. Drinking, mechanical defects and law violations cause only about 10 per cent of the mishaps.

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
