SOME STOCKS MAKE CLIMB AFTER FOURTH

NEW YORK, July 5 (AP)—Slightly more bullish sentiment prevailed in Wall street today, after the Fourth of July recess, and selected stock market issues managed to tack on gains of fractions to a point of 60.

Traders were scarce in board-rooms, the majority extending their holiday to Monday. Transfers for the five hours approximated only 300,000 shares. Closing prices were well under the heat in most cases.

Speculative spirits, brokers said, apparently were buoyed to a mild degree by the apparent stiffening of the British war attitude and hopes domestic industry would soon get a lift from rearmament demand.

Steels and aircrafts were in front the greater part of the day. Itals held their own as last week's freight loadings were up seasonally to a new year's peak for the fourth consecutive week.

Ahead at one time or another—some slipped eventually—were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Douglas Aircraft, Sperry, Chrysler, American Smelting, Westinghouse, N. Y. Shipbuilding, Great Rock, American Can, White Northern, Chesapeake & Ohio and Brooklyn-Manhattan Transit.

Backward were Anaconda, Kennecott, United Aircraft, Loft and Eastman Kodak.

Secondary rails stepped forward in the bond department.

PROFIT TAKERS CUT PRICES FOR WHEAT

CHICAGO, July 5 (AP)—Combined profit taking after Wednesday's sharp wheat price gain and hedging of the new crop wiped out another rally in the wheat pit here today and the market closed with net losses of about a cent for the session.

Promises of moisture relief in the spring wheat belt loosened selling by many traders who had bought during Wednesday's advance. Hedging sales came from commercial interests who absorbed some of the new wheat coming to market in the southwest. Chicago received four cars of new grain, the first to arrive here this season.

After advancing as much as 1 1/2 cents in early dealings, wheat tumbled 2 1/2-3c from the highs and closed 1-1 1/2c lower than Wednesday, July 7 1/4-1c, September 77 1/4-1c. Corn closed 1-1 1/2c higher, July 61 1/2c, September 58 1/2-1c; oats 1-1 1/2c lower.

The Tacoma Tigers put an appropriate finish on Tacoma's celebration by bombing the Vancouver Caplans for two victories in a Fourth of July double-header. The twin triumph gave the Tigers a 3-1 victory in their Western International league series.

A six run rally in the seventh inning gave the Tigers a strong enough lead to withstand a closing rush by the Caps to win the nightcap 9-8 after they had registered a 4-2 victory in the afternoon contest.

Ralph Samhammer led the batting assault, getting four singles in the afternoon game and two doubles in the second engagement.

The rampaging Salem Senators made a sweep of their four-game series with the Wenatchee Chiefs in Wenatchee by taking both ends of a double-header, winning the afternoon game 7-6 and the nightcap 5-3.

The Solons won the night game on three bases on balls and two hits in the ninth inning.

The Yakima Pippins and Spokane Indians divided a twin bill, the Pippins winning the first game 15-13 and the Indians the second 10-2.

Pole Vaulter Fails to Clear Prison Walls

SALEM, July 5 (AP)—Guards said the annual Oregon penitentiary track and field meet Thursday was a success—the winning pole vaulter stopped at 10 feet, 6 inches.

More than 1000 persons watched Luke Crosswhite, the prison baseball team's pitcher, add to his laurels by winning the broad jump, high jump and pole vault by anchoring the winning relay team.

Crosswhite's pole vaulting was four and a half feet short of the walls.

Vic Ramis of Portland drove his way to the quarter finals by defeating the 15-year-old Seattle southpaw, Jim Brink, 6-2, 6-4. Brink is still the favorite, however, to capture the junior and boy crowns.

Gurley's sister, Helen, found her way to the finals in the women's and girls' singles. She defeated Patty Greenup of Tacoma, 6-2, 6-1, in women's play and Marge Neils of Portland, 6-0, 6-2 in the girls' division.

WE MUST PREPARE!

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. (To the Editor)—In 1936 Prime Minister Baldwin in an amazingly naive confession, told the house of commons that for three years he had deceived his sovereign people in Britain's shocking lack of aerial preparedness. Concluding, he said, "Had I built up our aerial defenses I would have lost the election!"

I must point out that cheap political opportunism as exemplified by Mr. Baldwin is the fundamental weakness of our own government. That a great political party in these perilous times is still defeating our security, our commercial outlook, our form of government is an indictment too appalling to contemplate. The republican stand for a "short of war" policy is inexcusable, treasonable pacifism, aid and comfort to our enemies, treachery and political chicanery.

Let not the press go undisciplined. All up and down our fair land the press has for 20 years coddled subtle enemy propagandists, evaded large issues, made wishful talk on isolation, howled down common sense with demagogic platitudes. Our press, no longer free, but a glorified national shopping guide influenced by America's main street-space-buying patriots has instead been a subservient instrument in the hands of the type of men whose interest in our government is best shown by their advocacy and promulgation of "Green River Laws."

The American people demand a free press, a courageous press, an inspired press, an honest press. We demand that our press give voice to the clear obvious resurgence of patriotic unity that is seen on every side, that it cease publishing disingenuous, calculated, cunning propaganda inspired by communist pacifist sources through simple-minded dupes, women whose thinking is done by their emotions, others whose loyalty is inimical to our form of government and demagogues who are willing to sell us down the river lest they lose the election. Our youth must be told in no uncertain terms of their duty to their country. Their minds must be disabused of the idea that the government owes them a living.

We must have, in peace and war, universal military service for four year terms to meet this strange, hideous, mechanized menace that has already enslaved hundreds of millions of people and given us in peacetime a standing army of unemployed.

CRITICIZING JACKSON

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. (To the Klamath Indians of the Klamath Indian reservation, Oregon)—Late in the year 1939 Boyd Jackson and Dice Crane were delegated by the Klamath Indians of Oregon to represent the said Indians of Klamath Indian reservation in Oregon before the committees in congress and the various departments of the federal government having jurisdiction over Indian affairs for remedial legislation, and other matters, looking towards other benefits for the said Klamath Indians. How far this mission has gone forward the Klamath Indians have not learned, as the above mentioned delegates have elected to keep silent.

However there appeared in the issue of the Humbolt Times, a California paper published in Eureka, Calif., April 27, 1940: "Boyd Jackson, Klamath delegate at Washington, D. C., who is assisting Stella Von Bulow in efforts to obtain passage of the enlarged California Indian court of claims bill, has informed the Humbolt council of the California Indian Rights association that Fred A. Baker has been appointed by Attorney General Earl Warren to make a journey among California's 25,000 remaining Indians to determine whether a majority wish to employ private attorneys or remain with the policy advocated by the association of having Attorney General Warren continue as attorney of record in the case."

Bills pending in both houses of congress, namely, H. R. 3765 and Senate 1402, providing for a claim of \$18,000,000, according to the Humbolt Times.

In this matter it is doubtful whether a majority of the Klamath Indians would be in favor of financing the delegate or delegates to work for the California Indians without an understanding with the Indians who are to be benefited by the claims on the government or without the consent of the Klamath Indians who authorized the delegates to represent them on specific matters.

If Mr. Boyd Jackson wishes to serve the California Indians he ought to do one of two things: First, secure the authority and consent of the Klamath Indians

who sent him and also are financing the mission, or to resign his post and go back to California and work for the Indians down there, where he has spent most of his life.

Moreover, it is evident from reports that have come from California, that Mr. Jackson called a meeting near Eureka, Calif., last spring and must have had some understanding at that meeting, which his activity now indicates.

In conclusion, let me say that if such unfairness be tolerated by the Klamath Indians, then a lifetime job should be given Mr. Jackson. Maybe we will get more done by so doing.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. (To the Editor)—What the outcome will be of the war in Europe is a live question these days. mand his respect to show the history of the world from that time to the end of time as we know it.
