BRITISH PLANES BOMB WARSHIPS

In The Day's News

WAR news on Saturday is quiet. (After the spectacular destruction of the French fleet by the British, to keep it from falling into German hands, almost anything might seem quiet for a few days.)

Saturday's quiet is probably the calm before the next storm.

THE German military commander in Amsterdam issues a sharp statement accusing the Dutch of an "unloyal" attitude toward the German occupation. He claims the British are obtaining information regarding bombing attacks from the Dutch people.

All conquerors face that trouble. The more Hitler conquers, the more of it he will have to face.

ONE of the features of today's (Saturday's) news is Hitler's triumphant homecoming to Berlin, where he is hailed with the wild enthusiasm that since the beginning of time has been given to conquerors.

As to conquerors, it is well to keep in mind this impressive statement: "They who live by the sword shall perish by the sword."

Surprisingly often that has worked out.

(If the sword is ALL that Hitler is able to wield, if he has no conception of wise and tolerant administration after conquest, the empire he is building so swiftly and so spectacularly will go the way of innumerable other empires built in the same manner.)

RUSSIA, in a rumor mentioned in today's dispatches, is said to be beginning to fortify the new Russian-Rumanian frontier along the Prut river, which divides the Rumanian area seized by Russia from old Rumania.

When one gangster begins to build defenses against another gangster, it is a sign that trouble is brewing.

(BUT don't jump to conclusions. There is an old saying to the effect that all signs fall in dry weather.)

"HIGH sources" in Washington are saying this week that FDR has decided definitely to accept a third term nomination and wants State Secretary Hull as his running mate.

This writer is guessing that FDR doesn't know now whether he will or will not accept the third term nomination the Democratic national committee will hand to him on a platter.

Mexican Army to Guard Election

MEXICO CITY, July 6 (AP)—The Mexican government, reinforcing an appeal from President Lazaro Cardenas for an orderly election, took extraordinary measures today to hold disorders to a minimum when an expected 3,000,000 voters go to the polls tomorrow to name Cardenas' successor.

The entire Mexican army—52,000 men—was kept in its barracks, except for small precautionary patrols, under orders to be "on the alert" until after the election. In Mexico City, about 3500 cadets from military schools stood ready to support the 4000-man police force in quelling partisan clashes which are expected to mark the voting.

BRITISH SHIPS RUMORED NEAR FRENCH ISLAND

Nazi Answer To Monroe Doctrine Pondered As Threat to Americas

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—Secretary Hull reported today that the American nations jointly were gathering all possible information on the reported British blockade of the French island of Martinique in the Caribbean.

While he continued neither to confirm nor to deny the reports that British warships had taken up stations around the island, the secretary of state told a press conference the reports were being studied in all phases in line with the hemisphere policy of continual consultation on all common economic, political and military problems. Such consultations, Hull asserted, are a means of defense against actual or threatened danger.

Air Bases
He said that the question of establishing United States air bases in Latin America was one of 10, 20 or 50 questions which would be coming up as consultations moved forward.

Asked whether this country, in support of the Monroe doctrine, might call the reported blockade of Martinique to the attention of the British and French governments, Hull replied that American nations had not yet gathered full information on the situation.

Another question asked was whether this country — after consulting other American nations — stood ready to seize British and French possessions in this hemisphere should Germany attempt to take them. Hull's reply was that we will (Continued on Page Ten)

NEW FIRES STRIKE OREGON FORESTS

Flames Spreading North Of Santiam, In Mount Hood Fire

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6 (AP)—New fires and uncontrolled old ones scarred the northwest's evergreen timberlands today.

A fire exploding at the head of Blowout creek in Marion county, Ore., quickly ran across 300 acres of the Mill City logging company holdings. Three hundred CCC firefighters and a number of civilians called in from western Oregon and Vancouver, Wash., hastened to the conflagration five miles from the North Santiam highway. A spot fire two miles from the main blaze divided control efforts.

2000 Acres
The Mount Hood national forest fire near Dee, Ore., continued out of control along 2000 acres. Much of the burn was limited to rough country, but flames had licked into some sections of green timber and menaced others.

Absence of wind assisted firefighters in making headway against flames in northwest Oregon's Wolf creek country. A hundred oil drums filled with water stood ready in Timber City for transport to danger zones in case the town was threatened.

Legion Criticizes Citizens For Lack of Flag Courtesy

Klamath people were criticized for asserted failure to show courtesy to the American flag, in a statement made public here Saturday by the American Legion post No. 8.

At the same time, observers paid tribute to local people for the manner in which they reacted when the band played the Star Spangled Banner at the fireworks display on Modoc field Thursday evening. The crowd stood up, as one man, and hats came off.

This is the statement from the Legion:

"The members of Klamath Post No. 8 of The American Legion wish to call the attention of the general public of Klamath Falls to their complete lack of courtesy to the flag of the United States of America, when it passes by in a parade.

Hitler Hailed On Return to Nazi Capital

BERLIN, July 6 (AP)—Adolf Hitler arrived at Anhalter station at 2:58 p. m. (7:58 a. m., PST.) today on a triumphal homecoming from his conquests in the west.

Berlin was ablaze with celebration. Church bells pealed. Bands and orchestras played on every street corner.

Shouting Welcome
From the railway station to the splendid chancellery, all the streets leading to the Wilhelmstrasse were packed with Germans shouting a welcome to their fuhrer.

Hitler climbed into an automobile with his entourage and started on his triumphal journey through his capital.

All gauleiters (nazi district leaders), all available admirals and high army officers stood along a red carpet beside Hitler's train.

Youth organizations in the station raised a tremendous din with bugle and drum corps and shouting.

At the exit of the station hung a huge iron cross among clouds of flags and swastikas and laurel wreaths.

Great masses of flowers stood about the station. Tens of thousands of citizens stood in the hot sun in the station square and along the streets to the chancellery.

NAZIS, BRITAIN EXCHANGE BLOWS

German U-Boat Credited With Destruction of British Vessel

BERLIN, July 6 (AP)—German high command today told of sweeping air attacks against British objectives on land and sea and credited a nazi submarine with the destruction of 65,587 tons of merchant shipping.

Lieut. Capt. Gunther Prien, already hailed as one of "Hitler's heroes" for his feat at the outset of the war when he shocked the British by torpedoing the battleship Royal Oak inside the naval base of Scapa Flow, was credited with a "record" for a single cruise by a German submarine.

At the same time the German high command announced that air raiders had sunk a British submarine and had badly damaged another in the North sea.

One unit of the German air armada was reported to have fired oil tanks at Plymouth, England, causing heavy explosions.

Other fighters raided with "good success" several sections of southern and central England, bombing airports, port facilities, railways and oil tanks, the communiqué said.

LONDON, July 6 (AP)—Bombing planes struck at strategic points in Britain, Germany and the Mediterranean today while the British were calling 300,000 more men to arms.

Strategic Gibraltar experienced its second air raid warning of the war, with anti-aircraft blazing at a high-flying, unidentified plane almost directly over the British fortified zone.

LONDON, July 6 (AP)—British bombers again raided Germany's naval bases of Kiel and Wilhelmshaven last night, the air ministry announced tonight.

Docks at Cuxhaven and Hamburg also were attacked and several fires started, the statement said. A railway junction at Cologne was bombed.

Satko Under Way For New Home

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, July 6 (AP)—With an early morning start Paul Satko and his family sailed north on his "Ark of Juneau" after a three-weeks stay here.

Seeking a permanent home in the northland for his wife and seven children, Satko said his first stop would be at Anan Creek, 60 miles from here, and that he might look for a site there to build a cabin. His wife is an expectant mother.

LAKE GENEVA, Wis., July 6 (AP)—The American youth congress was committed today to a policy on support for national defense and nonintervention in foreign wars.

FRENCH NAVAL UNITS ESCAPE TO HOME PORT

Two Planes Shot Down In Attack on Grounded Cruiser At Oran

LONDON, July 6 (AP)—British warplanes scored six hits on the grounded French battleship Dunkerque in an attack today, the admiralty announced.

Two British aircraft failed to return from the attack by naval planes, the admiralty acknowledged.

The communiqué: "As a result of the British naval action against units of the French navy at Oran on July 3, the French battle cruiser Dunkerque was damaged and driven ashore. (Jane's Fighting Ships lists the Dunkerque as a battleship.)

Damage Not Known
"The extent of the damage to this ship is not known, but it was considered essential that the ship should be in no condition to take part in the war in case she should fall under enemy control."

"After the engagement on July 3, (French) Admiral Gensoul, commanding French forces at Oran, signalled that his warships were hors de combat, and that he was ordering the personnel to evacuate the ships."

"In view of this statement by the French commander, it was not considered necessary to give warning before carrying out further operations against the Dunkerque."

Investigator to Face Trial on Kidnap Charge

SACRAMENTO, July 6 (AP)—The governor's office approved the request of Lane county, Oregon, authorities, yesterday for the return of William J. Hermann, private investigator, to Eugene on charges of kidnapping and assault.

Hermann was charged with forcing Edward Campbell to go with him to Klamath county and from there to Redding, Calif., to testify in connection with the investigation of the alleged murder of Emit Roessler, Redding musician.

An extradition hearing earlier in the week developed the fact that Hermann was employed by the Shasta county district attorney to find the belt buckle he believed was used to fatally beat Roessler last April.

Hermann said Campbell and a companion purchased the buckle, which he declared was made in the Oregon State penitentiary, from Nathaniel Wright, Indian held on murder charges at Redding, and that they threw it into the Sprague river where the investigator found it.

The Lane county complaint asserted that Hermann had no authority as an officer in Oregon. It said, however, he posed as a federal officer and that he struck Campbell with metal handcuffs.

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
