GUN SHORTAGE?

Rumors of an impending shortage in guns and ammunition in the Klamath country can be put at rest, although in other sports channels effects of the war in Europe are being felt in this community.

One local sporting goods dealer reported trouble in getting full shipments of ammunition, and several others said they noticed difficulty in getting late model guns. Otherwise the European fracas is having no serious ill effects in this part of southern Oregon on the gun and ammunition business.

Most dealers in Klamath Falls have already received a major part of their ammunition shipments for the forthcoming hunting seasons. Others are feeling pressure from the government in ordering guns of newest design, which go to Uncle Sam first and sporting goods dealers next.

Lorenz company, local wholesalers, reported that ammunition shipments are coming through all right but that shipments on new guns are slower than usual. The general situation is better now than a few months ago, this company finds.

BACK-TO-HEALTH

Along other lines, the war is making itself felt in the sporting as in the business world.

The first trend to be publicly expressed was the announcement of National Sports week, July 1-7, by the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States. Appeals from public officials have been made in this connection for improved health conditions among the people as an aid to national security. Such physical-fitness drives were accentuated in the president's preparedness speech in which he referred to a need for the development of the national morale.

PREPAREDNESS OFFSHOOTS

Other offshoots of the nation's preparedness drive have been forecast, some of them in the nature of promotional freaks and others being mass trends which may have important effects in various sports activities.

Along this line these developments have been forecast by the sporting goods trade magazine, Sports Age:

1. A wave of popularity for all types of gun-shooting games and sports.

2. A great back-to-the-outdoors vacation movement.

3. A possible decline in attendance at spectator sports exhibitions. This has already been noticeable in some Klamath sports events.

4. Organization of national civilian rifle-shooting groups.

5. Possibility of the development of a "parachute troops" target which will be projected to convenient shooting height.

6. If the situation grows serious, the possible revival of 8 and 4 gauge shotguns in modernized, repeating form.

7. More stringent laws on sale to individuals of firearms, with prohibitory rules for non-citizens, concurrent with an official drive to encourage American-born citizens to possess firearms and practice in their use.

BROTEN STOPS VISITORS WITH FOUR BINGLES

Weyerhaeuser's softball nine defeated the highly-touted Chico Diamond Matchmakers Friday night at Recreation park, 7-1, behind the four-hit hurling of Ivan Broten, speedball specialist.

Broten had allowed only two hits up until the last frame of the nine-inning tussle. Successive safeties by Picanco and Urbina, shortstop and third baseman, respectively, of the invaders, with only one away in the ninth failed to develop into a rally as Broten retired the next two batters with ease.

The Matchmakers from the California city apparently were bewildered by the 40-foot pitching distance under which the contest was played. The Chico club is accustomed to the 43-foot distance which is the National ruling under which California teams play. The visitors, too, usually play with 10 men on the field, using a short fielder, specified in National rulings.

Joe Derrah, peppery little catcher, led the Timbermen to victory by slugging out four hits, one a homer, in five trips to the plate. Eddie Wakeman, 1 ft. fielder, was instrumental in the one-sided win with three singles in four attempts. Every man in the Weyerhaeuser lineup except Harold Derrah and Jack Waits participated in the 12-hit attack on the Matchmakers.

Hank Urbina, Chico third baseman, singled twice off Broten to account for one-half the hits garnered by the visitors. M. Westlake made some nice catches in left field for the Match crew while Harold Derrah and Ed Burkland did yeoman service for the Weyerhaeuser team on defense.

Preliminary to the Chico-Weyerhaeuser clash Chet Smith's All Stars downed Estlin Kiger's All Stars, 6-2, in a seven-inning game. Ralph Ramon, on the mound for the winners, set the losers down with four hits.

An announcement was made at the field last night that the Chicago Colored Ghosts will tackle Lowell's Tigers next Wednesday night at the Recreation diamond with the fracas slated to get underway at about nine o'clock. Two regularly-scheduled league contests will precede the special attraction.

PADRES AGAIN BOUNCE SACS; ACORNS WIN

San Diego scored its third straight win over Sacramento Friday when Bill Thomas checked the Solons with 5 hits while his mates ganged up on three Sacramento hurlers for eight timely hits and a 6-1 victory.

The Padres sent George Munger, starting Sacramento pitcher, to the showers in the sixth after scoring three runs. Munger's successor, Frank Riel, gave way to Frank Gamler in the eighth as the Padres hopped on him for two tallies.

Thomas would have gained a shutout but Mel Almada, Sacramento left fielder, southpawed a home run over the right field fence to give the losers their only run. The win gave the Padres a 3-2 edge in this week's series.

Cotton Phippen held the San Francisco Seals to five hits to chalk up a 5 to 0 victory for Oakland. The Oaks bunched eight hits for four runs in the first inning and another in the sixth to clinch the one-sided contest. Frank Dasso was charged with the defeat.

Angels Victors

Los Angeles took a free-hitting affair from Hollywood, 8 to 6, to assume a 4 to 1 series lead and replace the Stars in fifth place. The Angels drove Hiram Bithorn from the mound with a four-run barrage in the second inning, scored two more off Freddie Gay in the fifth and another pair off Charlie Moncrief in the sixth. Wayne Osborne was called to the mound in the ninth to quell a threatened uprising.

For their part, the Stars, trailing 8 to 0, put on a four-run burst in the sixth, driving Fay Thomas to the showers, and scored another pair off Johnny Fallon in the seventh. Joe Berry finished for the Seraphs.

The Seattle Rainiers made it five straight over the Portland Beavers when they pounded out an 18 to 8 victory. The league leaders collected 19 bingles off Joe Gonzales and Byron Speece. Tight fielding aided the Seattle moundsmen, Aldon Wilkie and Ira Scribner, who yielded 15 hits. Scribner was credited victory.

Wilkie, who has six straight victories to his credit, had a narrow escape. He was removed in the fifth when the Rainiers were trailing 3 to 5.

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., July 6 (AP)—Al Patnik, Ohio State's lanky diving star, successfully defended his three meter springboard title Friday in the 1940 senior national AAU swimming and diving championships.

Patnik defeated his teammate, Earl Clark, by a scant margin in the Santa Barbara Biltmore Coral Casino pool. He scored a total of 163.8 points while Clark had 160.94.

John Hood of Hayward, Cal., was third with 147.22 points, followed by Sammy Lee of Occidental college with 137.9, and Harry Perry of Beverly Hills, Cal., with 136.42.

The mile swimming event championship was won by Bunei Nakama, Hawaiian island, champion.

Nakama was timed in 21:31.4 ahead of Bill Smith of Honolulu, who finished fast to nose out Rene Choteau of Yale university. The winner displaced Ralph Flanagan of Austin, Tex., as the titleholder since Flanagan did not enter the meet.

The order of finish behind the first three swimmers was Jose Balmores, Hawaii; Steve Woxniak, Buffalo, N. Y.; Abel Gilbert, Ecuador, and James Gilhula, Santa Monica, Cal.

Netmen Meet Californians In Final Play

REDS TROUNCE PIRATES, 5-4; CARDS LOSE

NEW YORK, July 6 (AP)—Outfielder Morrie Arnovich's only drawbacks in a baseball sense are his small stature and his self-effacing personality but talk to any member of the Cincinnati Reds and they'll tell you that their new teammate's bat and "hustle" more than compensate for either.

Arnovich was traded by the Phils to the Reds for Johnny Rizzo almost a month ago and as time passes his value to Cincinnati has mounted accordingly. A 100 per cent team man on or off the field, Morrie tears after every fly on defense and runs out every hit at the plate and his average since coming to the Reds reflects his spirit.

Marathon Struggle

The Brooklyn Dodgers defeated the Boston Bees, 6-2 in a 20-inning struggle to maintain their one game advantage over the Reds. The Dodgers used five pitchers to run their winning streak to six straight and the Bees called on four.

Joe Sullivan pitched the last 10 innings for Boston and lost his control and the game in the 20th. He walked Dolf Camilli with the bases loaded to force in Dixie Walker and the Dodgers counted three more on Eddie Miller's error and a single by Pee Wee Reese. Newt Kimball, who came in in the 19th, was the winning pitcher.

Cincinnati pushed over three runs in the ninth inning Friday and beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-4 and Arnovich's single with two out and runners on second and third won the game. He collected three singles in four trips to bring his total for 16 games with the Reds to 20 hits and seven runs batted in in 59 trips to the plate. His average with Cincinnati shapes up to .339. Not bad for a man who hits in the seventh slot.

Phillies Humbled

The New York Giants ended a four-game losing streak with a 17-hit attack that humbled the Philadelphia Phillies, 15-2. Starter Hugh Mulachy was battered from the mound in the second when the Giants put together seven hits for eight runs. Cliff Melton scattered seven Phil safeties to gain his eighth win.

Three homers off an equal number of St. Louis pitchers accounted for nine runs and gave the Chicago Cubs an 11-5 victory over the Cardinals. Augie Galan, Glen Russell and Bill Nicholson hit the Chicago homers. Billy Herman collected "four for four" for the Cubs.

Boxing Triumph

In the American league, the Boston Red Sox slugged out a 9-4 triumph over the Washington Senators, making 14 hits good for 28 bases. Jimmy Foxx and Ted Williams each hit homers for Boston while Jim Bagby went the route for the Sox, allowing 12 hits.

The Chicago White Sox marked up their fourth straight triumph, 10-8 over the St. Louis Browns. Harold Clift homered in the sixth and Walt Judnich in the eighth for the Browns. Cleveland and Detroit were unscheduled.

Home runs by Frank Hayes and Bob Johnson, each with a man on, provided Johnny Babich and the Philadelphia Athletics with a 6-3 victory over the New York Yankees tonight. Babich held the Yanks to seven hits for his second victory in as many starts against them and his seventh of the year.

DRIVER KILLED IN PLUNGE OFF GRADE
