OREGON MEN TO TRY RUN DOWN SALMON CANYON

EUGENE, Ore., July 9 (AP)—Idaho's river of no return—a sobriquet which has been disproved by three river-runners before them—will be defied again by a quartet of Oregon rivermen this summer.

Prince Helfrich and Woody Hindman, veteran guides of this district, George H. Godfrey, Eugene, and Harold Dobbin, Pendleton, left today for the headquarters of the Salmon river. They plan a run down the foaming stream's 108 miles in three plywood riverboats 14 feet long and 44 inches wide.

Incomplete records indicate the river has been run three times—once by Conquill's famed Haldane Holmstrom—but survivors of the three trips say the Salmon's canyons and cataracts are littered with the wreckage of boats that didn't make it. Hindman himself made the run last year.

The party will launch its adventure on the headwaters of the Salmon's middle fork and will cover what some white water men call the roughest stretch of water in America. It goes through perpendicular canyons and penetrates inaccessible areas described as primitive in the extreme.

The quartet hopes to make the dash in about a week.

VFW CONVEVE FOR 20th ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

CORVALLIS, July 9 (UP)—The 20th annual encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, department of Oregon, convened here yesterday with sightseeing tours and a meeting of the council of administration on the first day's program.

The national organization will be represented at the sessions by Neil Kline, executive assistant at Kansas City headquarters.

Main business of the encampment got under way today with a joint session at which George Benson, general encampment chairman was master of ceremonies. Business sessions will continue Tuesday and Wednesday with election and installation of officers and selection of the 1941 convention city scheduled for the closing day.

Big public event of the meeting will be a parade Tuesday night at which 15 bands and drum corps and at least 30 floats will participate.

"BUSINESS MAN'S" ARMY IN TRAINING

PLATTSBURG, N. Y., July 9 (AP)—Eight hundred student soldiers, many prominent in industry, the professions, finance, sports and society, awoke Saturday to 5:45 a. m. reveille and the fact that they're in the army now.

The devotees of "the Plattsburg idea" ranging in age from 25 to 50 and selected from 3000 applicants because of their "potentialities" found the first of a four-week schedule awaiting them featuring a series of drills, marches and work with rifles, machine guns and heavier weapons.

In one soft spot on the program for the "business man's army" was the four-hour induction ceremony (beginning at 2 p. m. DST) when the temporary privates hear addresses by Governor Lehman and Lieut. General Hugh A. Drum, second corps area commander.

AMERICAN PLANES CALLED 'WIZARDS'

AT BRITISH AIRDROME, July 8 (AP)—Ordinary American transport planes with the seats taken out and bomb racks and gun turrets put in have become Britain's "wizards" of the air.

Young pilots who showed American reporters around this airdrome and took them on a short over-water demonstration flight, called their stubby, twin-motored California-made Lockheed "wizards" because:

1. Although they started out primarily as scouting planes, they were found fast enough for fighting and bombing, and have shot down more German planes than any other British type except the Spitfire and Hurricane fighters.
2. No German Messerschmitt has been able to shoot one down.
3. They have been dived more than 400 miles an hour.
4. They are so sturdy that one came back from Germany with a hole in the wing big enough for a mastiff to jump through.

Flying out over the coast as the eyes of Britain for convoy protection, they look almost like any airliner carrying passengers and mail over an Oklahoma prairie.

FIREMAN GETS SCANT ATTENTION FROM BUDDIES

SEATTLE, July 9 (AP)—We've often wondered what would happen if a fireman fell off one of those fire trucks speeding to a fire. Now we know.

Fireman Joseph E. Miller hadn't got himself a good hold on the rear rail as an engine roared from the Second avenue station house last night and when the "rig" turned, south he toppled off. The truck didn't stop.

A few seconds later a second truck found the unconscious fireman in its path. Two men jumped off, scooped him up in their arms, placed him on the curb and the apparatus continued to the alarm-brush fire.

Miller was taken to a hospital and found to be suffering from bad bruises.

Fair officials greeted the Hardys as they entered the grounds after parking their automobile. Guests of the exposition, the Hardys dined at the Cafe Continental and saw performances of Billy Rose's Aquacade, the Folies Bergere and America, Cavalcade of the Nation.

Gifts showered on the Hardys ranged from a basket of champagne to a free seaplane ride.

YOUTH COMPLETES FIRST 2000 MILES OF THUMB TOUR

SAN FRANCISCO, July 9 (UP)—Rod Turner, 19-year-old son of a Niagara Falls, Canada, dentist, Monday breezed into San Francisco in somebody else's car and pulled out a book of statistics to prove that hitchhiking still is an effective mode of transportation.

Completing the first 2000 miles of a 13,000-mile circle tour of the United States, young Turner said his longest wait between obliging drivers was 11 minutes.

"And my thumb's not out of joint, either," he said, explaining he used more subtle methods of inviting lifts.

SPRAGUE ATTACKS LETHARGY OF U. S.

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 9 (UP)—Gov. Charles A. Sprague of Oregon said Monday too many people are saying "God Bless America" and depending on God to do the rest. He spoke to the 29th annual encampment of Veterans of Foreign Wars.

The governor called attention to the lethargy of most people who he said have too much the attitude of "just raise the money for defense." He declared America needs a more thorough defense system through increased manpower.

He urged a resurgence of patriotism and that all Americans think in terms of manpower instead of necessary money appropriations alone. He asked that interest in recruiting and enlistment be aroused anew in order to man airplanes, ships and mechanized equipment.

Secretary of State Earl Snell told the convention that had people of America heeded the calls of service organizations for the last 20 years, the nation would not now find itself unprepared. He predicted ex-service men would be behind officials in any sound program of national defense.

ARMY ENLISTMENTS FOR JUNE DOUBLE THOSE OF 1939

SAN FRANCISCO, July 9 (UP)—Captain L. B. Downing, Ninth corps area recruiting officer, Monday said army enlistments in the area during June more than doubled those for the same month last year.

Original enlistments for the month totaled 1190, against 534 a year ago and 351 during May, 1940. The upswing was attributed to the attitude of young men in the area "enlisting for defense," as well as to "redoubled efforts of the recruiting personnel," Downing said.

Northern California district enlistments totaled 250 during June, against 111 for June, 1939, and 92 for May, 1940.

The Oregon district reported 171 enlistments, against 82 a year ago and 52 for May, 1940.

The Washington district listed 225 enlistments for June, against 126 a year ago, and 83 for May, 1940.

LARGEST GRAIN YIELD FORECAST

PORTLAND, Ore., July 9 (AP)—The Pacific northwest apparently is facing one of the largest per-acre yield of grains in its history.

Hyman H. Cohen, market editor of the Oregon Journal, returning from a 3500-mile tour of producing areas in Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and touching northern California, reported Monday:

"The season of 1940 will not show the greatest output of grains and breadstuffs in history for the Pacific northwest trio of states, but it will show one of the biggest, if not the biggest, production per acre. The drawback to producing the greatest total volume is the decreased area of wheat, which is created by action of the government itself through the U. S. department of agriculture."

Mr. Cohen said he found that the area, through its grain fields, orchards and farms, generally "is in a position to supply the most intimate food needs of a very large percent of the world."

He placed the total grain prospects at 119,792,000 bushels compared with 104,255,000 bushels for the larger increase of 1939, and 131,652,000 bush-

els for the much greater area planted in 1938.

DEMOS, GOP CARD ORGANIZATIONAL CONVENTION DATES

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8 (UP)—The republican state central committee will hold its organizational meeting at the Imperial hotel in Portland on July 13 and the democratic committee will hold a similar session at the same place August 3, it was announced Saturday.

Kern Crandall, Portland attorney, is expected to be reelected Oregon GOP chairman, but Democratic Chief Frank Tierney, Portland newspaperman, is expected to have opposition.

Charles H. Leach, treasurer of the democratic committee, has received support for the chairmanship and the name of Flavel W. Temple, secretary, has been mentioned. Clarence Hyde of Eugene may receive some support for the top democratic job from the Oregon Commonwealth federation.

BRITISH HOUSEWIFE CAPTURES 'CHUTIST'

LONDON, July 9 (AP)—A British housewife Monday captured a German aviator who parachuted to earth in north-east England after his plane was shot down in a battle with British spitfire fighters.

Mrs. Nora Cardwell saw

him landing in front of her home.

"I went up to him," she said, "and told him to put up his hands and said, 'I want it,' pointing to his revolver.

"He unbuckled it and handed it to me and I marched him to the backyard where some motorcyclists came along and took charge of him."

OREGON CAVES BECOMING MECCA FOR TOURISTS

OREGON CAVES, Ore., July 9 (Special)—The Oregon caves resort is increasingly becoming a mecca for vacationists from all over the world because of disturbed war conditions abroad, according to the number of names and places signed on the guest list.

Fifty thousand tourists visit the Oregon caves national monument annually.

Thirty-four states and 11 places outside the United States are represented by guests who have toured the marble caverns since June 1.
