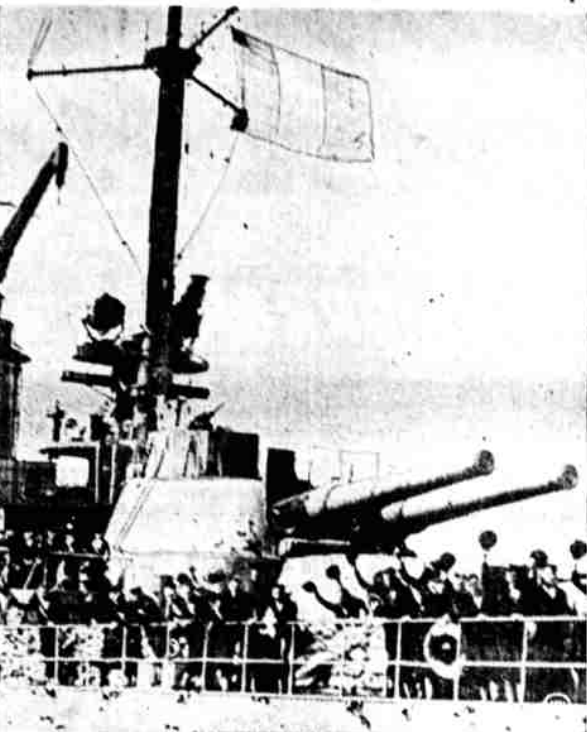
Return From Lake—Mr. and Mrs. J. C. O'Neill and children were expected home Monday from Elk lake where they spent the weekend holiday.
