DELEGATES TO GOP CONCLAVE UNINSTRUCTED

Frank Schmitz of Beatty and Mrs. Elda Beal of Klamath Falls, republican state central committeeman and committeewoman from Klamath county, will go uninstructed to the state committee meeting at Portland on Saturday.

This was decided by the county republican central committee which held its first meeting under the chairmanship of William Kuykendall on Wednesday evening at the courthouse.

It was suggested to the state committee members that they work to bring the next state meeting to eastern or southeastern Oregon.

Plans for organizing a young republican club in Klamath county took shape at the meeting and a gathering of young republicans will be held at the courthouse Tuesday evening. All interested persons are urged to attend, it was announced.

Young republican plans were discussed by J. Paul Matthews, candidate for county clerk; John Reber, candidate for county commissioner, and F. Walter Webster, candidate for the legislature. Webster proposed the meeting night for next Tuesday and urged each of those present to come with a dozen young people.

Clem Lemire, not a member of the central committee but a young republican, was called on and made a short talk. He said he believed many young people could be brought together in a live organization.

Candidates who spoke included Marshall Cornett, nominee for the state senate, and George P. Taylor, nominee for county treasurer.

Chairman Kuykendall appointed an executive committee composed of Grace Wells, Letha Murphy, R. H. Anderson and Arthur Schaupp.

The next meeting of the central committee will be held on August 6.

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
